# Members Messages

#### **Elkhorn Specific Land Claim update**

Ki?suk kyukyit,

We are writing to update ?Akisqnuk First Nation members ("Members") on the Elkhorn Ranch Specific Claims proceeds (the "Proceeds"), and in particular, the Elkhorn Ranch Specific Claims Proceeds Policy (the "Policy") passed by Chief and Council which enables a distribution to members. We appreciate and thank you for your patience while we have undertaken the process to ensure we are making informed decisions based on input from Members, and the best-practices of other First Nations. Elkhorn Settlement Knowledge that has been passed down from generation to generation has included, in some form, the understanding that Elkhorn ranch was illegally stolen from our people. The early settlers warned our people to put up fences and farm the lands before the white people took everything. This 320-acre allotment connected us to the irrigation waters of Windermere Creek and the rich wildlife habitat and it was known that there was an Indian farm located here, making it Indian Land. The constant reminder of this land alienation taunts us daily as we drive by Elkhorn ranch. The old timers that spoke of and reminded us of our rights to Elkhorn Ranch brought us to the Specific Claim, and subsequent settlement. The settlement that is being shared and distributed to everyone can help each of us in many ways. It is important to know, culturally, when Ktunaxa come into something big, they would "reciprocate" (share) as a way of giving thanks to the Creator and asking for continued safety. Perhaps it is a feast for the community; or bringing your friends and family to a big dinner or Bar-b-q; or maybe you gift a perfect stranger in need. In sharing, you can also send prayers that the gift you have is not cut short and that we continue to enjoy good health and prosperity long into the future. This is not to be taken lightly but remember the old timers that did not get to see this matter resolved and consider their desire for future generations to have what they did not. And like the old timers, use this gift wisely, pay off wanmunamu?nis (one's debts), prepare for times ahead. In the settlement, the Band has the opportunity (or option) to purchase up to 320 acres to add to the Reserve. It would be great if we could add to our collective land base, but we also want you to know more about your history and where these settlement dollars come from.



NOTICE: Members receiving Social Assistance/other government funded programs

Upon review of Indigenous Services Canada Social Assistance Policy and Procedure Handbook, receiving any funds from a land settlement will deem current clients non-eligible for income assistance for a lengthy period.

Financial and Other awards	One time awards that are not specifically defined as exempt can be considered "other awards" and exempt up to the family's asset level. Ongoing monthly financial awards are considered uneamed income and must be considered when calculating eligibility for assistance.	Unearned Income	Exempt up to the asset level for the family

There are a few options that can be chosen for personal disbursement.

- 1. "Eligible Members who complete the AFN approved financial literacy course will receive 100% of their PCD on the Distribution Date or Trust Release Date as the case may be."
- Opting out of the financial literacy course will result in your disbursement being broken down into 2
  pieces. "Those Eligible Members who choose not to complete the financial literacy workshop will
  receive sixty percent (60%) of the PCD on the Distribution Date as an initial release, and forty
  percent (40%) six (6) months later."

With either option here, there is a plan in place to set up incremental monthly or bi-weekly distributions that will mimic a paycheck for each month. It is encouraged that all members take time to prepare and set up safety nets for this disbursement.

For those on CPP benefits or PWD benefits, we recommend you speak with your respective representatives to assess the impact the payments may have.

Please reach out to the Social Development department for questions, and help getting your accounts set up and ready for your personal disbursement.





# Ktunaxanintik Did you know?

"The Constitution Express was a movement organized in 1980 and 1981 to protest the lack of recognition of Aboriginal rights in the proposed patriation of the Canadian constitution by the Pierre Trudeau government.

Chartered by the president of the UBCIC, George Manuel, two trainloads of people left Vancouver for Phone: 250-489-2464 Ext: 4060 Ottawa on Nov 24, 1980. The train made stops throughout Canada to spread their message to communities and the media. More supporters joined the train along the way and by the time they reached Ottawa, there were about one thousand people on board.

The train was not always met with support. A bomb threat was made against it while in Winnipeg.

The bomb threat was in fact staged by undercover RCMP officers posing as train employees in order to delay the train and to intimidate the activists.

The Ktunaxa Nation Lands and Resources Council has called for the renewal and update of the 1981 Kootenay Nation Land Claim and Declaration in today's language, to be informed by our values and responsibilities, recognize previous leaders while also re-affirming the 1981 version. A large part of this is engaging with Ktunaxa

#### Jordan's Principle



#### Jordan's Principle

Jordan's Principle makes sure all First Nations children child meets one of the following criteria: living in Canada can access the products, services and • supports they need, when they need them. Funding can help with a wide range of health, social and educational needs, including the unique needs that First Nations Two-Spirit and LGBTQQIA children and youth and those with disabilities may have. Jordan's Principle is named in memory of Jordan River Anderson. He was a young boy from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba

#### Who was Jordan River Anderson?

Jordan's Principle is named after Jordan River Anderson, a young boy from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba, Jordan was born in 1999 with complex medical needs that required him to stay in hospital.

When he was two years old, doctors said he could move to a special home for his medical needs. However, the federal and Manitoba governments could not agree on who should pay for his home-based care. Jordan stayed in the hospital until he passed away at the age of five.

#### Who can access Jordan's Principle?


A child under the age of majority in their province or territory of residence can access Jordan's Principle, if they permanently reside in Canada and if the

- is registered or eligible to be registered under the Indian Act
- has one parent or guardian who is registered or eligible to be registered under the Indian Act
- is recognized by their Nation for the purposes of Jordan's Principle
- is ordinarily resident on reserve


