?akisgnuk First Nation is happy to announce that Rachel Bach has accepted the position of Associate Director of New Programs, starting November 1st, 2023.

Rachel is committed to serving and working with Indigenous communities. Her work and research experience demonstrate a decade and a half long commitment to health and wellness and culturally-based services. Highlights include: supporting Indigenous youth newly relocated to the urban setting to complete high school; developing and launching the Heart Medicine Lodge program — a program offering healing and support services to Indigenous women who have experienced sexual assault; a year in health policy at the First Nations Health Authority in Vancouver; and various research internships — with Nanaandawewigamig (the First Nations Health and Social Secretariat of Manitoba), the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives (Manitoba branch), and the Population Council (Kenya branch). Most recently, Rachel served Indigenous pregnant people and their families as a Registered Midwife in the North End of Winnipeg and taught as an Instructor in the Bachelor of Midwifery Program at the University of Manitoba. Rachel's interest in midwifery

grew from her passion for reproductive safety and experience volunteering at sexual and reproductive health clinics — first as a birth control and unplanned pregnancy counsellor at the Women's Health Clinic, as a clinic assistant at Options for Sexual Health in Vancouver, and with Yúusnewas at YouthCO AIDS Society in Vancouver.

Rachel completed her Bachelor of Arts at the University of Manitoba and Master's degree in Indigenous Development at the University of Winnipeg, and a Bachelor of Health Sciences in Midwifery at Toronto Metropolitan University (formerly Ryerson University). Further to her formal education, Rachel has had the incredible opportunity to sit circle with, and learn from, a number of amazing Aunties, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, youth, and community members.

Rachel is ?akisgnuknik — daughter of Leona Daniels and granddaughter of Gina Clarricoates. Rachel, her partner Kevin, their child Wanuyit, and Leona and thrilled to be coming home to ?amakis Ktunaxa this fall.







#### Quilting Project for a healing journey

This is an opportunity for Akisqnukniks to express how you are feeling on your journey by writing a statement about your experience of the residential school, '60's scoop or the Murdered/Missing Indigenous Women Girls/Boys on a quilt square. You may have been affected by one or two or all three. I am coordinating the project, and the possibilities are endless on how this project can take its course. However, the end project will be 3 quilts to showcase in the community. Please remember that this may be difficult and do take your time with this process. You can express your unique experience in words, sentences, paragraphs, images, color, symbols, pockets and more.

#### **HOW IT WILL WORK**

We will send you quilts squares to use, or you can utilize your own to design your masterpiece. We will also be available to put on the squares whatever you would like on a square for you, if you prefer. An opportunity for individuals to assist with the sewing with be set up when all quilt squares have been submitted. The completed projects will be displayed at the Akisqnuk First Nation. Submissions for the squares will be open until all interested individuals have completed their task.



- There are no catches. There is no fine print. This is Free internet or \$55 per month subsidized for every household on reserve.
- 20 years ago the Nations wanted improved connection in communities and wanted it to be free. This is now possible.

#### WHAT IS BILL C-92? AN ACT REPRESENTING FIRST NATIONS, INUIT & METIS CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES



#### WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF BILL C-92?

- RTLL C-92 WAS PASSED IN CANADA ON JANUARY 1, 2020.
- . IT AFFIRMS THE INHERENT RIGHT OF THE FIRST NATIONS: JURISDICTION IN RELATION TO CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES.
- TO CHANGE THE WAY IN WHICH CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES ARE PROVIDED TO INDIGENOUS CHILDREN.
- ESTAPLISHES NATIONAL PRINCIPLES (BEST INTERESTS OF THE INDIGENOUS CHILD: CULTURAL CONTINUITY: AND SUBSTANTIVE EQUALITY) AS WELL AS MINIMUM STANDARDS TO BE MET IN THE PROVISION OF CHILD & FAMILY SERVICES.
- THE PEST INTERESTS OF THE INDIGENOUS CHILD IS ALWAYS THE PARAMOUNT CONSIDERATION WHEN IT COMES TO DECISION MAKING FOR THAT CHILD.

HOW CAN A FIRST NATION EXERCISE JURISDICTION OVER CHILD & FAMILY SERVICES?

- ONCE A FIRST NATION HAS AN EXISTING LAW IT CAN TRANSITION TOWARDS EXERCISING JURISDICTION OVER CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES. ONCE A LAW IS IN PLACE THE FIRST NATION SENDS A REQUEST TO CANADA AD PRITISH COLUMPIA TO ENTER INTO A TRIPARTITE COORDINATION AGREEMENT RELATED TO THE EXERCISE OF FIRST NATION JURISDICTION.
- WITHIN 12 MONTHS OF THE REQUEST BEING MADE. IF AN AGREEMENT IS REACHED BUT REASONABLE EFFORTS WERE MADE TO REACH AN AGREEMENT. THE FIRST NATION LAW WOULD HAVE THE FORCE AND EFFECT OF FEDERAL LAW AND WOULD PREVAIL OVER PROVINCIAL LAW IN THE EVENT OF CONFLICT OR INCONSISTENCY.
- THE KTUNAXA NATION HAS DECIDED TO PURSUE FULL JURISDICTION . FAMILY NETWORKS AND HAS STARTED WORK ON THE KTUNAXA CHILD WELLNESS LAW.
- THE KTUNAYA LAW IS FORWARD LOOKING, ALLOWING FOR THE FUTURE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INDIGENOUS COURT OR TRIBUNAL OR OTHER CULTURALLY APPROPRIATE SYSTEM TO DEAL WITH CHILD PROTECTION MATTERS.

#### WHAT IS THE IMPACT OF KTUNAXA LAW?

- IT REFLECTS THE SELF DETERMINATION OF THE KTUNAXA NATION BY IMPLEMENTING THE INHERENT RIGHTS OF THE NATION.
- THE KTUNAXA LAW WORKS TOWARDS KEEPING CHILDREN AND FAMILIES TOGETHER. ALTERNATIVELY, FAMILY AND KINSHIP CONNECTIONS WOULD BE PRIORITY.

 RTILL C-92 WILL HELP CHILDREN STAY WITH THEIR FAMILIES AND PROMOTE CONNECTIONS TO THEIR CULTURE AND COMMUNITY. IT PROVIDES A FRAMEWORK THAT FIRST NATIONS CAN USE TO EXERCISE

JURISDICTION IN RELATION TO CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES.

WHAT IS THE IMPACT OF BILL C-92>

WHAT DOES BILL C-92 MEAN FOR CHILDREN IN CARE NOW?

- THE IMPORTANCE OF REUNITING INDIGENOUS CHILDREN WITH THEIR FAMILIES AND COMMUNITIES IS RECOGNIZED.
- THERE IS A PRIORITY PLACEMENT FOR THE INDIGENOUS CHILD. WHICH PRIORITIZES FAMILY AND COMMUNITY PLACEMENT.

ONGOING REASSESSMENT IS REQUIRED TO DETERMINE THE POTENTIAL FOR REUNIFICATION.

WHAT IS THE IMPACT OF BILL C-92>

 12 MONTHS AFTER THE NATION GIVES NOTICE TO THE GOVERNMENTS AND DEPENDING ON SUCCESSFUL NEGOTIATION OF A COORDINATION AGREEMENT.

WHICH COURTS HAVE JURISDICTION TO HEAR CASES UNDER THE KTUNAXA LAW?

- THE KTUNAX A LAW WORKS TOWARDS KEEPING CHILDREN AND FAMILIES TOGETHER. ALTERNATIVELY. FAMILY AND KINSHIP CONNECTIONS PRIORITY AND FOCUS WOULD BE ON STRENGTHENING THESE
- THE KTUNAXA LAW MAY STILL USE THE PRITISH COLUMPIA COURT SYSTEM. PUT ALSO CREATES ALTERNATIVES TO THE COURT SYSTEM INCLUDE:
- CUSTOMARY CARE AGREEMENTS
- FAMILY SHARING CIRCLE
- COMMUNITY OF CIRCLE CARE

WHAT LEVEL OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OF THE NEW KTUNAXA LAW IS COMING?
