

Health Department Updates



COVID-19 is still alive and well but the good news is, most people who get COVID-19 will experience mild to moderate illness and not require hospital care. However, some people are more likely to become seriously ill from COVID-19 and require medical attention. <u>Vaccination</u> is the most effective way to prevent serious outcomes.

If you still need your COVID-19 vaccine, you can contact the Health Centre for help booking an appointment.

Testing

A COVID-19 test is recommended when a positive or negative result will inform decisions about treatment or care.

Testing is recommended for people with symptoms of COVID-19 and who are:

- At risk of more severe disease and may benefit from treatment
- Please visit the BCCDC website for further information on people who may benefit from treatment
- Hospitalized
- Pregnant

If you have symptoms and testing is recommended for you, please access testing. If you are local, you may call the Health Centre and we will arrange to have a rapid antigen test kit dropped off.

If you have symptoms and testing is not recommended for you, please stay home until you feel well enough to return to regular activities and you do not have a fever. You can get a rapid antigen test kit, if you like.

Rapid Antigen Test Kits are free for everyone. Visit us the Health Centre and ask for a testing kit.

Protection

There are many tools that can help protect you and your family from respiratory illnesses, like influenza (flu), COVID-19 and RSV.

Toolkit: Vaccines, Stay home if sick, Clean hands, Mask and cover coughs, Good airflow, Respect personal space, Clean surfaces

You can decide how and when to use these tools while making sure you are supporting your overall physical and mental health. For example, you may apply more tools if you are at higher risk of serious illness.



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Update on Whirling Disease in National Parks

November 13, 2023

The ?akisqnuk Lands, Resources and Infrastructure Department has been receiving updates from the Ktunaxa Nation Council and Parks Canada on the recent discovery of whirling disease in Kootenay and Yoho National Park fish species.

The B.C. Invasive website (LINK) describes whirling disease as follows:

"Whirling disease is a microscopic parasite that has serious impacts on juvenile trout and other fish species. The parasite infects the spinal column, causing the fish to swim around in "whirling" patterns, and having a blackened tail or "bent" appearance. Whirling disease was introduced to Pennsylvania from Europe in 1956 and has spread to many parts of North America, including Alberta. Whirling disease has been found in live bait shops and even pet stores. This serious disease can cause up to 90% mortality for juvenile fish in susceptible populations."

Whirling disease was discovered in Emerald Lake in Kootenay National Park in September. In order to prevent the spread of this disease, Parks Canada has closed all waterbodies and shorelines in Kootenay and Yoho National Parks until March 31, 2024. The preventative closures are designed to help protect fish species vulnerable to whirling disease, such as several trout species and Kokanee salmon. Whirling disease mortality rates can reach 90 per cent.

Whirling disease is typically spread through human activity. It can be transferred from one water body to another by boats, trailers, fishing gear, often through fish, mud, water and vegetation.

Pakisquak First Nation will continue to work with the Ktunaxa Nation Council, Parks Canada and other stakeholders in the region to minimize the impacts of this aquatic disease.
