We received a total of 22 names for the lion.


Lion Don Kenyon from the Valley District Lions Club won the prize as he was the first member to give Roary his name.

Clarification Regarding "Discounted Member" Definition and Its Implication for District Elections By Steve Glass, PID 29-I

On November 18, 2023 Lions International Membership Development Division issued the following message to club officers across our Association: "As you may be aware, a vote of the delegates during the 2023 international convention resulted in a new "Discounted Member" category.

This category includes all members paying discounted dues, such as a discounted family member, Leo-Lion member, student member, or young adult member. Discounted members have all of the same rights as an active member paying full dues, but do not count towards their club's delegate entitlement for district, multiple district or international conventions.

In addition, during the October board meeting, a resolution was passed to update the interpretation of what constitutes "one year and one day." This constitutional interpretation adjustment now requires members to be full dues-paying members of a single club for a continuous period of one year and one day before they count towards their club's total delegate entitlement.

For members to count toward the delegate entitlement for conventions during the 2024 calendar year, convert discounted members to a full dues-paying membership by December 15, 2023."

What are the practical implications of this ruling you might ask? There are two important take aways:

First, if a club has 20 members on the first day of the month preceding the month in which the convention is held, and the club has six family members, the club only has one delegate vote. Why? If you subtract six discounted dues members from twenty, that leaves fourteen members so that gives the club only one delegate vote. Please note that current district governors and past district governors automatically can be delegates, if certified, and do not count toward their club's delegate entitlement.

In the example above, if the club had converted those same six family members to full dues-paying members by this past December 15th, the club would be entitled to two delegate votes.

Second, members must be full dues-paying members of a single club for at least one year and a day before they can count towards their club's delegate entitlement.

Club presidents and secretaries, as well as district cabinet secretary-treasurers, should familiarize themselves completely with these new changes before assigning and certifying delegates.



Youth Exchange Reflections

No words in any language will ever do justice to my trip to Tunisia; it was truly an experience that I will treasure in my heart for the rest of my life. I was immediately immersed into the unique culture

from the moment that my first host mother greeted me at the airport with a kiss on each cheek. Even driving in the car was an adventure, attempting to read the signs flying by us on the side of the road that were written in both Arabic and French. I got to try traditional Tunisian dishes, both street food and meals my family prepared for me such as Brick, Couscous, Fricassee, and the sweet Bambalouni dessert found only in my favorite Tunisian city, Sidi Bou Said.

It wasn't only these things that made my experience in Tunisia memorable, but also the people which I met along the way. I was extremely lucky in the host families that I stayed with, both welcoming me wholeheartedly into their homes and trying their best to provide me with the best opportunities as they could, taking me to local sites, restaurants, and introducing me to their friends and family members who also welcomed my stay in their home city. These people, who mere weeks ago were strangers, are now my "Tunisian Family" and the memories we made together will live on in my heart forever.

By far, the part of my trip that impacted me most was my time at camp. It is such an incredible thing to spend 6 days with 13 strangers from 8 countries doing once in a lifetime activities. We may not share many common traits in the way we speak or our cultures, but the experiences we shared in this short week were ones that will tie us together for a lifetime. I will always remember exploring Sidi Bou Said with them, playing in the water fountains in the Medina to relieve ourselves from the brutal heat, zip lining among the mountains, our late-night conversations on the roof of our hotel, daring each other to try the spiciest of dishes, and teaching each other card games or words in our native language. In the time since we have said goodbye, I've already received two videos from campers singing along to West Virginia's favorite song "Country Roads" being played wherever they are in the world.

I am so thankful and forever grateful to the West Virginia Lions for being given this opportunity, and hope to participate in more Lions activities in the future.
