As soon as LCIF processes the bank information and sends it to District 29L, we will make sure the Grantsville Lions Club gets the money to get the needed supplies for the residents of southern Calhoun County. GOALS



Some of us are more formal about setting goals, for the week, or month, or fiscal year. LCIF has established worldwide and USA fundraising goals for 2023-2024. Of course, some countries, districts, clubs, and individual Lions are better able to donate than others. The USA goal equates to \$27 per Lion. LCIF Chairman and Immediate Past International President Brian Sheehan has his own more aggressive goal, that for the USA amounts to \$36 per Lion member. For a dime per day, your donation would meet that goal.

LCIF this year is offering a recognition for single individual Lion donations over \$50. Details are below.

For donations from the Club – Does your Club adopt a formal budget each year? Or does your Club have a "typical" set of causes to donate to? Please consider these as ways to remind the Club of this way to Serve.

With so many natural disasters in the news, please consider donating as an individual Lion.

Examples are LCIF has made \$100,000 Major Catastrophe Grants for the Morocco earthquake and for the Maui fires.

100% of your donations go toward LCIF grants and programs. Administrative and fundraising expenses are funded by investment income.

Presidential Pin Details

If you're making your contribution online and your one-time donation amount meets the
eligibility criteria as noted in the levels of recognition, remember to select "Yes" in the third
step titled "Who is the donor?" This ensures that your pin request is acknowledged. If you
choose alternative methods to contribute to LCIF, kindly reach out to us at
donorassistance@lionsclubs.org to initiate your pin request.

• The donation amounts are based on <u>single individual donations</u>. They are not cumulative. (For example, you cannot add two \$20 donations and a \$10 donation together to receive

the first-level Bronze Pin.)

LCIF will automatically mail the highest-level Presidential Pin for that particular donation. For example, if you donated \$200 you would automatically receive the Gold Pin. If you also want the Bronze and Silver, you will need to request them at the time of submission or send Donor Services a follow-up email requesting the Bronze and Silver.



- The pins will be sent directly to the recipient via the US Postal Service.
- The Pin(s) will be shipped to the mailing address we have on file. It is very important that members make sure their addresses are current with LCI.
- The average turnaround time for receipt of the pins is approximately 6 to 8 weeks after processing the donation due to the high volume.

FLAGS FOR HEROES



Several Lions Clubs in District 29-L hold Flags For Heroes events, as reported in My Lion. Flags For Heroes is a Service project, fundraiser, and public visibility combined: Service in that we honor our personal Heroes; fundraiser from sponsorships, both individual and corporate; and our Lions Clubs are visible to the greater public. Our Heroes can be armed service veterans, teachers, parents, children, first responders, friends, individuals or groups.

In the first year, the Club must purchase flags and medallions. Those flags can be re-sponsored in next

year, with new income at no extra cost. Any growth in numbers requires purchasing more flags. Typically, Clubs purchase and display banners, showing their Club name and recognizing corporate sponsors. Most Clubs fly the flags one or more times a year, for a limited number of days, so that each time is a special event.

The supplier some Lions Clubs use is "Flags For Heroes" http://flagsforheroes.net whose website provides much more detail. (Note the .net top level domain name. There are lots of website URLs with "flags for heroes".) The flag set includes a 3 foot by 5 foot polyester US Flag, a 10 foot PVC pole, and a ground socket which can remain in the ground between flag- flying events. Separately, Honor Medallions are available to show who each flag is honoring, and who sponsored the Hero. The medallions can be a keepsake for the sponsor.

YOUTH EXCHANGE REFLECTIONS

While in Germany, I was exposed to many aspects of German life and culture, some of which were really no different than here in the United States, and some aspects that were a shock to me. Most of my exposure was during my ten-day period with my host family, the Fungipanis, and with their son, Gianni. Early June was the time when German seniors were graduating and making their final memories in High School before moving on, and I got to experience most of these events first-hand.

First, I'll quickly summarize the things that were the same. Food, drinks, clothing, cars, movies, and especially music were no different than they are here in America, with American influence able to be seen in every corner of German society. On one occasion, at the party celebrating their graduation, the song YMCA by the Village People was played, and naturally I did the arm movement alongside it. A friend of my host brother said, "oh, you know the dance," and all I could think was, "of course, we invented it!" Music was by far the biggest similarity, as there really were no German songs played at any event or on the radio, the artists were Taylor Swift, Ed Sheeran, Katy Perry, Elton John, and other major American and British singers, that dominated the scene. They even regularly play Country Roads. As for clothing and the like, most Germans wear American brands: American Eagle, A&F, Tommy Hilfiger, Nike, and many more. On most occasions, shopkeepers and clerks would assume I knew and was German simply because there was no telling the difference between our styles of dress. In many aspects of German society, we are nearly identical.

As for the differences, it is nearly impossible to put into words. There are some fundamental aspects of how German's act, think, and work that are inherently different from us, and are not really something that could be understood unless you experienced it firsthand. Something that stuck out to me, although pretty saddening in my opinion, was the utter lack of respect people not of Christian faiths experienced, particularly those of the Islamic faith. At the school I shadowed at, I was told a story about one of the students who was caught slipping off to a janitor \$\pi\$3; closet to pray thrice a day in accordance with her faith, and when she was caught, the school refused to accommodate her, and simply put her in a Christian Education class and called it a day. This was not a private school either, this was a publicly funded, government school, and all I could think was how such a thing would never be tolerated here, and how everyone, regardless of faith or background, would receive the same rights to practice everywhere. From what I saw, this was not an isolated case either, and while a sad note to bring up in the essay, I do believe it is important to mention, as the goal of the Lions Club International is to foster understanding and respect between cultures, and some of what I witnessed in Germany was the exact antithesis of that goal. On a less serious note, as that, some more minor things I noticed was Germans typically kept to themselves more, nodding to someone as you pass them on the street, or waving to a stranger are not commonplace, and doing so would often net you strange looks. On the other hand, Germans were much friendlier when it came to crossing the street or biking, with them not hesitating to stop their cars and yield the right of way to any pedestrians at any time, compared to the wait you would often get here in America. Germans are also strangely strict about their laws, not in the sense of serious crimes, but acts such as jaywalking are frowned upon, and even if the road is completely clear for miles, you are still expected to wait for the light to signal you to cross

the road. In summary, the differences in American and German society, for the most part, are small quirks that I noticed with my time there, but the biggest differences, like the disregard for other culture's customs, are by far the most glaring issues. I owe most of my thanks to my host brother Gianni for explaining these cultural differences to me, as he has spent some time in America himself and could educate me well on the topic.

I'll end my essay with a quick run through of all I did during my times abroad.

With my host family, most of our time was spent at parties and celebrations for graduation, where the local area (The Sauerland) had some pretty unique customs.

First, the rival schools, Plettenberg (the town I stayed in,) and the neighboring town of Attendorn engaged in tree plantings, where the teams from each side raced to see who could plant all of their trees first. Another was a party where groups of people bought cheap beater cars that would not pass another inspection to spray paint and decorate to a theme of their choosing, before driving them around town in a parade. Around this time, a celebration known as Schutzenfest was going on, which was just a parade followed by target shooting, where the most accurate would be crowned King. I also went to school for a couple days while over there, which I enjoyed, but ultimately concluded that I am grateful I went through the American school system. The next stage was the actual camp, and here I met many people from around the world, a couple of whom I have been actively keeping in touch with, and have tentative plans to see again in a few months. The countries represented at this camp were: America, Israel, Mexico, Ireland, Hungary, Italy, Turkey, Georgia, Canada, and Moldova. We all got the opportunity to present our nations and make food for the group, and many of us found ourselves to have more in common with each other than we initially thought. As a group we did many team-building exercises, and by the end of the camp, we all worked fairly well together and had a solid rapport. As a camp, we travelled around cities like Dusseldorf and Gelsenkirchen as we learned more about German society and overall, just toured various parts of western Germany. The farewell party was ultimately the highlight, even if pretty depressing, as we all had one last party together as a camp and with our host families, and said our goodbyes as we funnelled out to the airport one at a time.

In retrospect, I learned a lot about German society and culture during my time with the exchange, far more than what can be achieved simply by reading or watching videos. Even still, roughly two weeks since returning home, I find myself comparing and contrasting life in Germany to here back home. Of course, not all of this was positive, I had mentioned the glaring disrespect for foreign cultures that was seemingly institutionalized in German society, something that was especially abhorrent to someone coming from a relatively diverse town of many immigrants from many different cultures and faiths. On the other hand, though, the wide variety of young people I met at the camp, all of whom had some form of common ground with each other, and who did genuinely respect each other's differences, inspired a hope that, in time, these divides would heal. Ultimately, I believe that my generation will be the ones to finally bridge these gaps, and that the Lions Youth Exchange will help greatly in those endeavors. I am thankful for the scholarship for providing me with the opportunity to take part, and I hope to participate in another exchange, and I hope that the program continues to grow, and that more people take part in it.



Car Park Marshalling, Manning Showgrounds Gates and Football Gates are a great fundraiser with the club receiving a percentage of the takings.

Market Days are an easy way to raise funds. Charging up to \$30 a stall can raise up to \$3,000 in a 5 hour market.

White Elephant Stalls are hard work and in the end low earning but a great way to recycle and being seen in the community.

Town Garage Sales are popular with charging each House \$25 to supply with a sign and bunting to the Garage Sale Holder and maps for those who attend to get great deals. Maps are handed out for a Gold Coin Donation.


Clubs also put on Antique Fairs, Dinners and Silent Auctions and other fundraising programmes.
