

The Basics of New Club Extension By Past International Director Steve Glass District Extension Team Coordinator

In this issue I want to explore with you the basic requirements of new club extensions. Chapter X of the Policy Manual of Lions Clubs International governs and provides the following basic requirements (edited for brevity by the author):

Application

Application for a Lions club charter may be made to the association by any group, club or assembly, which has been duly organized and has elected officers. Such application shall be submitted to the International Office of the association through MyLCI. A Lions club shall be officially chartered when its charter has been officially issued. The acceptance of a charter by a Lions club shall be ratification of, and agreement on its part to be bound by, the constitution and by-laws of the association and a submission by said Lions club to have its relationship with the association interpreted and governed by the constitution and by-laws according to the laws in effect, from time to time, in the state of incorporation of The International Association of Lions Clubs.

Documentation

Np proposed club shall be issued a charter, entered upon the record of Lions Clubs International or be officially recognized until the day the following items are received at the International Headquarters in Oak Brook, Illinois, USA, and approved by the international board or its designee:

- Completed official application for charter.
- The names of a minimum of twenty (20) charter members, 75% of whom reside or work
 within the multiple district, unless otherwise approved by the Membership Development
 Committee, and are new Lions, except in the case of a friendly separation of a large existing
 club.
- Confirmation of full payments of charter fees The charter fee shall be US\$35.00. Lions in
 good standing, transferring from an active Lions club shall pay a US\$20.00 charter fee except
 for branch club members who are exempt. The charter fee and the new member fee are
 non-refundable.

Charter Members

All members joining a Lions club within 90 days after the charter approval date will be considered charter members, provided that charter members are reported to LCI within the 90-day period and fees are promptly paid.

Club Sponsor

Every new club must be sponsored by a club, zone, region, district cabinet, or a committee of the district as provided by the multiple district constitution and by-laws. The new club sponsor shall be provided for within the boundaries of the district in which the club is located. A sponsoring club may be assisted by up to two co-sponsoring clubs, as authorized by the district governor of the club location. The co-sponsoring club may come from another district.

Club Name

A proposed Lions club must be known by the actual name of the" municipality" or its equivalent governmental subdivision in which it is located. The term "municipality" is construed to mean the city, town, village, prefecture, county or similar officially named governmental unit. If the proposed club is not located within a municipality, it must be known by the name of the most appropriate and locally identifiable official governmental unit in which it is located unless authorized by vote of the Membership Development Committee.

Club Boundaries

The boundaries of the club shall be the boundaries of the municipality or equivalent governmental subdivision in which the club is located.

Charter Approval Date

The date the charter application is approved will be the charter date. This date will appear on the club charter and on the official association records.

Dues

Charter members dues begin the first of the month following the date upon which the member's name was reported to the sponsoring club, coordinating Lion and Lions Clubs International. The new Lions club will be billed for dues shortly after its charter is closed.

Charter Application Deadline

Complete charter applications received by the International Headquarters at Oak Brook, Illinois, USA, on or before the close of business on June 20th will be processed for the current fiscal year.

Now you have the nuts and bolts of new club chartering as outlined in Board policy. In the next issue, I plan to share with you information about the requirements for branch clubs and make a case for why new clubs are important for the growth of the district. I plan to follow that up with information about specialty, or as I like to refer to them, special purpose clubs.



A story about a trip to Peru in 2014



In 2013 Lion Lorrie and I hosted a15 year old girl from Lima Peru.

You may remember Meylin Tan. She spent 5 ½ weeks with us in January-February 2013. She returned in 2014 to stay with us again, this time for 6 ½ weeks. During the summer of 2014 we were invited to visit Lima at the insistence of Meylin and her parents. We spent 4 weeks with the Tan family and toured all over Peru. But for Lions International Youth Exchange we would have never met Meylin and her family. West Virginia Lions would have never known Meylin.

During our stay in Peru, we traveled with a tour guide and driver, both named Lucho. I spoke no Spanish and neither Lucho spoke English. We were in the city of Tarma when I learned Lucho Leon played in a band. We were parked outside of a store and all of our party went into the store to shop but I stayed behind with Lucho. When Lorrie and I lived in Maryland I sang in a barbershop chorus for 34 years. Knowing that Lucho had a musical background I thought I'd teach him my quartet's signature song: Hello Mary Lou. I asked Lucho to follow me, through hand gestures, and taught him the first 4 or 5 lines of the song. By the time everyone returned to the car we both serenaded the group out on the sidewalk in front of the store. We were nicely received by both our group and passers-by.

When we returned to our hotel, I taught Lucho and Lucho a passage from Music Man – Ice Cream. It was very easy and quick to learn. Lorrie, the two Luchos and I performed this quick little ditty in the lobby at 10:30pm. Anyone who knows me knows I like to sing and I was able to share this little bit of American musical style with some friends from Peru.

Now, fast forward to August 21, 2023. I am a regular user of Facebook as it lets me keep of with family and friends both in the US and around the world. I saw this posting on Facebook and saw that it was from Lucho.


Now you know why I tell people I have the best job in all of West Virginia Lions and how hosting a Youth Exchange student will forever enrich your life.
