The Chapel will be open on Good Friday from 9-5. Members are encouraged to come to the chapel for a time of prayer and reflection.



freely, asking nothing in return. We have hope and faith for transformation, but we do not put that expectation on anyone we meet. We want our community to know that they are loved just as they are.



#### History & Heritage

#### A Parsonage is Built and the Church Remodeled



The Fort Hays Normal was established in 1902 and within a few years Methodist-preference students began to come to town. Drought occurred, dust storms hit, grasshoppers reappeared, but the church moved forward. In 1909 Mrs. Gottlieb Riedel made the first donation toward a new building and work was begun in October, 1909.

The old church building was divided, and the two parts were used for the north and south wings. Between them a new sanctuary was constructed, the whole forming the shape of a cross. Inclement winter weather set in, but work was resumed in the spring and on March 29, 1910, Bishop W.F. McDowell laid the cornerstone, "in the midst of a howling dust storm". He was assisted by the pastor, A.N. Smith. It was dedicated July 31, 1910 by Dr. T.C Iliff. The trustees were F.W. Kraus, H.H. Pierce, Frank Bice, Jerry Fellers, and W.S. Harrison. During construction services were held in the G.A.R. hall (in 1973, the Hays City Hall).

Early membership in the new church probably waxed and waned with the rather short supply of preachers, exhorters, and lay preachers. The first preacher, Rev. Turner, tried and after two or three failures, did establish a Sunday school. He distributed his services rather widely over the territory, organizing Methodist churches in various places, beginning with Ellis where he lived. Some of the churches received sufficient pastoral care, but the work at Hays evidently languished toward the end of the year. He did not return and no pastor was appointed in his place.

The Rev. W.G. Miller, a local preacher living twenty miles north of Hays, near the Saline River, was a "supply pastor" during the next year, but there is no record that he preached a single sermon in Hays.

The 1912 Report, differs as to the minister who succeeded Rev. Turner. It says, "Mr. Turner was followed by Mr. Brundage who had a farm near town and who probably did not rely upon a salary for his support. No records of his work is at hand.

#### Why Are We Doing This

How's your Bible reading going? I love asking people this with an anticipation of what their response will be. The answers given are usually in a wide range of things from everything from I love it, I'm learning so much, I can't wait to see what comes next, to this is so hard, it's so long, the content is so difficult to understand, there are things I don't understand why God did what he did, to this has challenged me to look at my faith differently. My response to all of those: good. We should be challenged in our faith. I hope you have been challenged in your faith, that's the idea.

First, if you're feeling that the task is overwhelming you're not alone. You have been given a difficult challenge. It is a time commitment. It does take training. If you were to look back on your scripture reading patterns before we started this what would they look like? For some people that particular spiritual practice is something they did a couple of times a week. For some people it was a spiritual practice that was done everyday. For others, it's something that was never done. Whatever your beginning point is, whatever comes next will be a challenge. But that's how you grow. Some people have decided that while they may not get done in a year, they're going to keep going and get done whenever they get done. I love that decision. The idea behind this is not to get done in a year and to see how fast we can do it, the idea behind this is to learn to develop the practice of reading scripture. Maybe you're right on track, maybe you're a day or two behind, maybe you're a month behind, whatever it is, the suggestion is the same: Just keep going. Evaluate where you're at, adjust, and keep moving forward.

Now what about this pesky Old Testament that we're in? It's difficult isn't it. There's a lot of violence, vulgarity, questionable decisions, and things that just don't make sense to who the God is that we've followed. But I love the Old Testament because it gives us a bigger picture of who God is and what it looks like under the umbrella of God's grace and love. You see we see people fall away from God in very gruesome ways but yet God always welcomes them back. We see them confront their own sin and God still pours his grace out upon them. It may look different than what we think it should but it's still his grace. We also see the constant need for Jesus even before Jesus came. We can see how God had a plan for Jesus throughout the history of Israel. We see the need for a savior. We may not understand why God did what he did, I call that a question for the creator. But we do get glimpses into God's character about how he has plans for his people and how he continually forgives his people and brings them back to him even when the people turn away. Just keep that in mind as you read through these difficult passages.

I also want to remind you of something very important, just because it's in scripture and it says the people did something doesn't mean that it was God ordained. Pay attention to when it says that God told them to do something and pay attention to when the people just did it. You see the Bible is full of history. We all have a history. Some of our history we are not proud of because it's full of decisions that we would not make again given the choice. It's no different for the nation of Israel. If they had a chance to go back and remake some of their decisions I think they probably would. But it's important that we know their history so we don't repeat their mistakes. So pay attention to God's commands and people's decisions as you're doing your reading.

The important part of this is to just keep going. Set out on a journey to know God more each time you sit down with your Bible. Start with a prayer that says God show me your heart just a little bit more today. Then open the scriptures up and watch God work.


