

Editor's Notes: "Worms Won't Hurt Me Daddy"

Happy Spring to my fellow gardeners! As the new Hosta News Scapes Editor, I thought I might share a little about myself. I joined the Miami Valley Hosta Society (MVHS) in 2010, but I've been around gardeners and plants all of my life.

My ancestors journeyed to southwest Michigan in the 19th and 20th centuries. Some of them were farmers settling rural areas. I think I must have inherited some of their love of the land and plants. My grandfather, Don Gage, purchased a 4 acre home in Portage MI, and in the mid 1950's propagated and sold Chrysanthemums under the name "Gages Gardens." My father, Terry Gage (who was about 10 to 18 years old at the time) remembers feeling less than thrilled about spending his free time planting little mums. My dad's love of gardening would not be rekindled until buying his first home and planting it full of blue spruce and pines. In retirement, he discovered hostas and has succumbed to "Hostaholism." He has some 1,000 hostas and has been working to create new varieties through planned hybridization at home. Many of you visited his yard as the first stop on the 2013 bus trip to Michigan.

As a little girl, my first memory of gardening was finding an earthworm and becoming frightened. My dad explained that earthworms were good for the soil and would not harm me. I proceeded to tell my Dad and everyone else repeatedly that "Worms won't hurt me, Daddy." A nature and plant lover was born.

I did not have much time for gardening until I retired from tax accounting in 2004. My husband and I owned a Springboro home with partial shade conditions. My dad's love of hostas was contagious and in my tiny back yard I created a private



oasis filled with the 4 H's of shade gardening (hostas, hydrangeas, heucheras, and hellebores).

In 2013 we moved to Kettering to be closer to work, church, and friends. Not by accident, we purchased a yard that was ideal for gardening and had only a few sad plants on the property. Over the last three seasons, I have yanked out almost all the sickly plants and planted around 200 perennials, shrubs, and trees. I have had a few conversations with the local deer about not eating my hostas and rubbing my saplings with mixed success. Since moving to a yard with both sun and shade, I have become a "Conehead" (member of the American Conifer Society) and a Master Gardener Volunteer (intern). I still have room for lots more plants, so I welcome everyone's advice about garden design and plant choices. My ten year goal is to create something that would be worthy of a garden tour.

So I sit alertly in the MVHS meetings taking notes about all the varied aspects of gardening. I love to learn from the expertise of the experienced members of the group and our

guest speakers. I am inspired by the beautiful gardens shared in local garden tours. I'm awed by the dedication of the officers and the friend-liness of the members. If my service as your editor can give back a portion of the blessings that all of you have provided to me through this wonderful organization, I will be happy.

This year I hope that you will send me your event photos and share with me your interests and ideas. I will endeavor to keep you informed about the group and educated about our favorite plants. It is a privilege to take the helm of this award winning publication. Happy Gardening!

The 23rd annual Hosta College was held on March 18 and 19 at Upper Valley Career Center in Piqua, OH. Hosta College is a gardening symposium hosted by the Great Lakes Region Hosta Society with a primary focus on Hosta but also covering many gardening topics and plants.

Soon after UVCC students left for the day at 2:45 pm on Friday, March 18, 70 volunteers from 12 local Hosta Societies in Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Western New York rushed in to transform the school into Hosta College.

Did you know?

According to the Weed Science Society of America, Crabgrasses were grown for food thousands of years before they were considered weeds. The United States Patent Office introduced large crabgrass into this country as a forage crop in 1849, a time when livestock numbers were increasing rapidly and good forage was scarce. Immigrants from Poland and central Europe in the late 19th century and early 20th century held the crop in high esteem, calling it "manna grits." Because of its ability to adjust to tropical and temperate conditions, it is reported as a weed in 33 crops in 56 countries. Crabgrass is a problem in orchards, vineyards, lawns, and flower beds in every state.




