

August 14 "Trough Magic" by Joan Day

MVHS member, Joan Day, owner of Joan's Back-yard Treasures, presented a compendium of information on troughs and plants we might not be able to grow in our yards. However, in troughs we could provide the environment necessary to allow these plants to be successful. She explained that troughs allow us to make micro-ecosystems by meeting plant's individual requirements of soil, light, and moisture. Troughs also separate and highlight plants so that they are more noticeable in the garden. Joan admonished us not to fertilize miniature Hostas in troughs. She explained that they outgrow their space and then die. Joan

talked about the ability to maintain pH levels that favor plants difficult to grow in our native soil.

She recommends the use of miniature plants (ones that grow less than an inch per year) and dwarfs (those that grow less than 3" per year). She emphasized that almost every plant has either a dwarf or miniature form that could be grown in a trough. Some of the plants highlighted were miniature hostas, ferns, succulents, evergreens (conifers), and mosses. There were plants with flowers and plants without, plants for sunny conditions, dry conditions, and plants for moist shady conditions. There are plants for alkaline and acidic conditions.

Joan also shared several great ideas for decorating the trough by using tufa rock, fairies, unusual rocks, pebbles of varying sizes, etc. Putting the trough on a hard surface allows it to drain better. She also shared that a hanging hypertufa can liven up a wall; see the photo above. She also demonstrated how a group of small tufas can be assembled into a presentation.

In Joan's recipe to make these hypertufas, you combine 1 part peat, 1 part perlite or vermiculite, and 1 part Portland cement, mix well before adding 1 part water. Fiber mesh should be added for large structures that have weight that might cause them to break. After allowing it to cure covered by a plastic tarp for a week, holes should be drilled in the bottom, and the texture should be roughed according to your preferences. Then the hypertufa should be allowed to cure for an additional 3 weeks before planting. During this time, water should be placed in the tufa to leach the lime from the material. **Wear a mask and goggles during mixing & construction**. Suggested plants include miniature ferns: Cystoperis bulbifera, Japanese painted ferns, Camptosorus rhizophyllus, Woodsia polystichoides, and Cystoperis bulbifera. Miniature Goatsbeard, Aruncus aethusifolius; Miniature Heucheras, Petite Pearl Fairy or Petite Lime Sherbet; and Polygonatum humile, Dwarf Solomon Seal. Flowering plants include: Miniature Aquilegia, Columbine; Viola pedatifida, Crow foot Violet or Viola dissecta, Japanese Fern Violet; and Dahlberg Daisy an annual that reseeds. Sun loving plants include Dwarf Conifers and the following: Phlox, Veronica, Antennaria, Lysimachia, Orostachy, and Thyme. Last but never least miniature Hostas.

September 11 Carry-in and "The Wonderful World of Japanese Maples" by Dave and Leslie Dannaher

On a lovely September evening, the MVHS met at the Secret Garden, retail store in Waynesville, Ohio to enjoy a potluck supper, shop garden art and hear an informative presentation on Japanese Maples. Dave discussed several different species

that are included in what we consider "Japanese Maples" and their qualities. He led us through a slide show of an incredible assortment of his favorite varieties demonstrating that there exists a maple in every color, shape, and size for our garden situations. He gave us many of the English translations of the Japanese cultivar names and showed a video of Japanese chefs making tempura fried maple leaves, a regional delicacy. Dave and Leslie own Dannaher Landscaping & Nursery in Galena, Ohio which specializes in conifers, Japanese maples and other rare plants.
