

Around that structure, they've planted unusual trees, specialty conifers, perennials, pollinator plants, and hostas that provide variety of color, texture, and shape. A garden tower provides an interesting way to view the garden and the 30-year-old koi.

BJ Ney invited us to stroll through her garden and test our putting skills. She has artfully incorporated 18 miniature golf holes in her country style garden. Each hole is landscaped with lovely plants and quaint objects. The garden was featured in the Early Spring 2019 issue of *Country Gardens Magazine* and began as a way to entertain her children. The mature trees provide high shade for hostas and the yard includes a pollinator garden and garden "shed."

August 13 Meeting

"How to Have a Beautiful Garden Without Having an Ugly Shovel" presented by Pat Stidham

After our business meeting at the Miami branch of the Dayton Metro Library, member, Pat Stidham guided us through techniques that she uses to design beautiful garden spaces. Her ideas could be used to design an entire yard or simply create a small space that successfully conveys a feeling or style that makes people want to linger. She encouraged us to keep a notebook of ideas clipped from magazines or the internet to

help us define the style, color or mood we want to create. Next comes the choice of location and might include an area under a tree or next to a structure where the "room" is partly defined. When choosing materials, Pat encouraged us to look at containers and articles we already own including "indoor" objects that can be repurposed like a tea cart or baskets. The style and color of these objects contributes to the design. Our gardens can be a showcase for our passions and interests, so choose objects that mean something to us. In addition to color and style, gardens can focus on fragrance, touch or taste. A secret garden can be created by choosing a site that cannot immediately be seen. Pat brought several beautiful plants to emphasize how much impact moveable and changeable containers can have.

SHIRING TATLORS VILLE DAY

September 10 Meeting "Soil Health" presented by Gary Snyder

After our business meeting at the Historical Society of Vandalia-Butler, Gary Snyder of Green Velvet Sod Farms discussed the importance of soil health. We all complain about our clay soil, but Gary walked us through a pyramid graphic depicting the various types of soil (Sandy, Loam, and Clay) and how the different soil structures affect gardening. A soil test should be made to understand our individual garden's soil and the analysis will determine pH, Cation Exchange Capacity, mineral presence, and soil structure. Gary recommended some products for changing pH (Aqua-pHix), breaking down clay soil (Humic DG) and improving the productivity of soil for turf, shrubs, and trees (C20 Soil Builder). More information can be found at greenvelvet.com/products. The presentation was very informative and Gary answered many member questions. If interested in doing a soil test, the OSU Extension provides information and a list of laboratories at ohioline.osu.edu/factsheet/hyq-1132.

October 8 Carry-in Dinner and Meeting "Brighten Up Your Fall Garden" presented by Abigail Hunter of Andy's Garden


