1605: Nova Scotia founded by French (Acadia)	1812 : Manitoba settled by displaced Highlanders (became a province in 1870)		
1608: Quebec Village established by French	1867 : Dominion of Canada created, which united Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec & Ontario		
1713: English take over Nova Scotia, New Foundland & Hudson Bay area (7-year war)	1871 : British Columbia joined the Dominion of Canada		
1749: Halifax founded	1873: Prince Edward Island joined the Dominion of Canada		
1755-1758: 6000 French Acadians forced f/Nova Scotia	1898: Yukon Territory Created		
1769: Prince Edward Island detached f/Nova Scotia	1905: Saskatchewan, Alberta became a province		
1784: New Brunswick separated from Nova Scotia	1947: Canadian citizenship established separate from British

Similarities	Differences
Northern Neighbors who immigrated to US during 1800-1900s	Each province acts individually on everything
Settled East to West	Records not indexed by surname
Similar records: Vital, probate, census, land, and church records	Locating records is a challenge

 - Idaho, Maine, Minnesota, Montana, New York, North Dakota, Vermont & Washington
- FamilySearch: U.S. Canada Border Crossing, 1895-1954, includes VT, MI, Pacific & Atlantic ports
- FindMyPast.com & MyHeritage.com: U.S. Canada Border Crossing, 1895-1954, only VT

- Taken on: 02 Apr 1871, 04 Apr 1881, 04 Apr 1891, 31 Mar 1901, 01 Jun 1911, 01 June 1921

- Mortality Censuses: All taken on the same days, only 1871 available on FamilySearch.org
- Special Western Area Censuses: 1906, 1916, 1926, and 1936
- National Registration: Compulsory 1940-1946, see Library Archive Canada for availability
- Most on Ancestry.com, FamilySearch.org, MyHeritage.com, and/or Library Archive Canada

- Census taken by province, then census district, sub-district voting or election districts ', not counties.
- Geographic counties are towns, townships, and villages
- Census districts & sub-districts, townships, and counties may have same name.
- Census districts may have the same name but not include the same townships as the county
- Census district boundaries change each census year

Church Rules and Regulations

- Before 1793 only Anglican & Catholic clergy could perform marriages
- 1793-1798 district clerks could perform marriages if more than 18 miles from an Anglican clergy
- 1798-1831 Anglican, Roman Catholic, Church of Scotland, Lutheran, and Calvinist clergy could now perform marriages
- 1831-1858 Methodist, Baptists, and Presbyterian clergy could perform marriages
- 1858-1869 All clergy could perform marriages

Canadian Protestant Religions

- Anglican Church of Canada includes Church of England and Church of Ireland
- United Church of Canada includes Methodists, Presbyterian, Congregational, and Evangelical United Brethren

Land Records

- The Crown issued early land records, and their process covers the early years of Canada. There is a set of records entitled *Land Grants of Seigneuries, 1674-1760* available on FHL Film No. 1036410 and Fiche No. 6046787. *Ancestry.com* has an online collection entitled; *Land Grants from the English Crown Index*; the index can lead to the original early land records. Another helpful resource is the *FamilySearch Research Wiki* Article entitled, *Quebec Land and Property.*

- Notarial Records: Deeds, Land Transfers, Marriage Contracts, Wills
 - Filed by Notary: Notaries of French-Canada: 1626-1900 (Online at FHL/FHC, Ancestry.com)
- Quebec, Canada, Land Grants, 1763-18904
- Crown Land Records
 - Land Petitions: filed by person wanting land
 - Land Fiats: an arbitrary order (could be money)
 - Land Warrants: Issued to survey land
 - Land Grants: Issued on the surveyed land
 - Land Patents: Issued on the surveyed land
 - Land Deeds: Statement of Ownership of the land
 - Homestead Records: Individuals applications for free land grants
- Available online at FHL, Library & Archives Canada, County Archives, FindMyPast, OliveTreeGenealogy.com
- Loyalist Land Claims: American Colonists loyal to Britain & Land Grants to Veterans throughout Canada
 - Individual files a petition, if approved, a warrant to survey the land was ordered & a land grant or patent was issued. Records were receipts, fiats or warrants, locations tickets, and surveyor's reports. Lastly, the passing of land from one generation to the next was also listed in wills and deeds.
- **Dominion Lands Act** passed by the Canadian Parliament encouraged settlement in the western parts of Canada and assuring the Canadian Pacific Railway was constructed at this same time.
- Alberta, Manitoba, and Saskatchewan all have these application files online at *Library and Archives Canada* under *Western Land Grants.* ⁵ *Ancestry.com* also has the grant registers ⁶
