

<b>Title:</b> A Few Beautiful Minutes: Experiencing a Solar Eclipse	Author: Kate Allen Fox
Genre/Unit: Informational	<b>Warm Up:</b> Moon's Turn to Be a Star - Laura Purdie Salas

For a "few beautiful minutes, we get to observe the whole world change. While chock full of scientific information, the book has an accessible tone. My only complaint is that a few illustrations have the characters viewing the eclipse without eye protection - even though the back matter gives directions on how to build a sun viewer. The next total solar eclipse will occur in North America on **April 8th**. According to the author's notes, this only happens about once every 400 years in the same place. Don't miss it!



# Reading

Page #	Accountable Talk Vocabulary, comprehension strategies, think alouds, and student talk. Words in <b>red</b> appear in the text, but are not explicitly taught. Define as needed.	JOYcabulary Getting students to own their words: speaking, reading, and writing.
Before Reading	Let's study the covers. It seems like the boy is spreading his arms wide to take in the <b>vast</b> sky. On the back cover, everyone's face is lifted to the sky. Let's collect what we know (and what we <i>think</i> we know) about a solar eclipse. How can the front cover help us? The title? (Gather all ideas for now. You can correct any misconceptions after reading.)	
<b>During Reading</b> P. 1-3	Even the animals are looking up! Hmm so a total solar eclipse is <b>rare</b> , it doesn't happen very often. And it is an <b>illusion</b> ? I guess the sun doesn't really <b>vanish</b> . It just looks that way for a few minutes.	
P. 4 - 11	The author describes this event as if it was a stage <b>performance</b> . Why would she do that? I notice on page 7 that the children are building something. Anyone have an idea of what that might be? (If not, explain.) Refer to illustration on page 8.	
P.12 - 21	Notice how the author slows down time to show the slow change. Also notice how people from different places are captivated by the event. (Again - Be sure to emphasize the importance of NOT looking directly at the sun!)	anticipation grasp captivate precious
P. 22 - 29	Keeping with the metaphor of a <b>performance</b> , the sun <b>reemerges</b> and <b>reclaims</b> "her daytime throne." (Might want to pop out the prefix re-) Notice how the author speeds up time here, even though the sun's return is actually gradual. Why do you suppose she does that?	glimpse
P. 30 - 33	Be sure to read these pages! You may wish to create an actual timeline with your class and/or build sun viewers to get ready for April's show.	

After Reading	Return to certain pages to discuss the content and build knowledge. For example, return to page 9 to discuss the crescent-shaped shadows.
