#### Bees in Our World

I was enjoying a walk around my yard the other day and happened to notice all the bees buzzing around my citrus tree,

collecting nectar and pollen. The air was heavy with blossom fragrance, and I started to get a headache and my nose started running (my allergies), so I went back inside. Ughh!

Three-fourths of all plants that produce flowers, seeds, and fruit need bees. Scientists say that one out of every 3 bites of food is made possible because of bees. I'm thankful for bees, *really*, I am.

After all the research I've done on them, I'm actually fond of bees. They are the ONLY

insect that produces food humans can eat! Honey!! Yum!

Honeybees and native bees are important pollinators.

They are an essential part of our ecosystem.

I am concerned that our precious native bees are in danger. Loss of habitat, pesticides, global





warming, and competition for pollen & nectar from honeybees are the main reasons.

It does bother me that as early as 7 am, I begin to hear the landscaper's blowers removing leaves from the neighbor's perfect yard. A little bit of mess is okay and better for our native bees who nest in the ground. (Approximately 80% of them are ground nesters.) It saddens me that the American bumblebee has disappeared in 8 states!



Planting native trees, plants and flowers in our yards can help our fragile ecosystem and our native bees, such as the bee in this photo on a *Globe Mallow*. Soon the Palo Verde trees, brittle

bush and creosote will be blooming, and our desert will be full of... pollen...ugh, my allergies!
