As this continues to become more and more the majority, with no hint of slowing down, this type of thinking is making it's way down to our youth and teenagers. Young people everywhere are quickly becoming desensitized to meaning and purpose in the world. Let's call it what it is, Nihilism. But what is causing this wave of nihilistic thinking and living? Well I think it has a lot to do with Joey's view of death. If we do not care about what happens to us after we die, or if we agree with Joey, it makes sense to live your life how you want, or as Proverb 21 says, "what is right in your own eyes". This is a scary path that our culture is walking down, yet I believe there is still hope; and believe it or not, I think it starts with our teenagers.

You see, kids view the world in a very hopeful and bright way. There are infinite experiences and happiness they are excited to find out there. But as their life experience develops into their teenage years, they are not giving up all hope on the world, if anything they see the mark they need to make on it. Despite the negative influences they have all over the place from school to social media, they still see meaning and hope in the world. It is not until they are young adults, well into their twenties, that so many are giving up on a greater purpose for the world. One that is found in God's great plan for human flourishing.

So what do we do about this and how can you begin to talk to your preteen about this? It starts with understanding why this problem exists, and it's because we have a meaning crisis in the world. Too many people have dropped the idea that there is a greater meaning to the world. What stance does your home take on the meaning of life? Do your kids know that the adults in their life believe that there is an afterlife? Do they know that the adults in their life believe in God and Heaven? Do they know the Biblical purpose of life and God's love for them? I think these are very easy things to begin to implement into your weekly rhythms that will pay an exponential return on investment. There is meaning and a purpose to life, and it is to love and be loved by God. My prayer for you this month is that not only do you find meaning and purpose in God's Word and the Gospel of Jesus, but that your preteen finds it as well.
