¹ Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, to Philemon our dear friend and fellow worker ² and to the church that meets in your home Philemon 1:1-2 NIV
Philemon was written by (from a Roman prison) to a man named who led a church in his home.
4 I always thank my God as I remember you in my prayers, ⁵ because I hear about your love for all his holy people and your faith in the Lord Jesus ⁷ Your love has given me great joy and encouragement because you, brother, have refreshed the hearts of the Lord's people. Philemon 1:4-5, 7 NIV
Do these 3 verses speak flattery or encouragement? Discuss your answer with your group.
Therefore, although in Christ I could be bold and order you to do what you ought to do, ⁹ yet I prefer to appeal to you on the basis of love. It is as none other than Paul—an old man and now also a prisone of Christ Jesus— ¹⁰ that I appeal to you for my son Onesimus, who became my son while I was in chains Philemon 1:8-10 NIV
It was written about, a runaway slave who had stolen from Philemon.
Paul in and Paul led Onesimus to Christ.
 Paul's purpose was to encourage to forgive Onesimus and accept him as a brother in Christ.
Formerly [Onesimus] was useless to you, but now he has become useful both to you and to me Philemon 1:11 NIV

5. Pray for God to speak to you, and apply what He shows you.
