Guest Conductors

John Sabine, a career church musician, has served churches in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Georgia, and Maryland. Mr. Sabine has been continuously employed in some form of church music leadership since the age of eleven years. He currently serves as Minister of Music at St. John's Episcopal Church, Hagerstown, MD, where he oversees a very busy music ministry program with four choirs and a concert series.

Prior to coming to St. John's, and he sings Tenor as a member of HCA. Mr. Sabine served as organist and choirmaster at Christ Our Hope Lutheran Church in Riverdale, GA, February 2010 to February 2023. Mr. Sabine earned the Bachelor of Music Degree in Church Music from Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ, and the Master of Sacred Music Degree from Emory University. He is also a licensed Kindermusik Educator, a piano and voice instructor at Music & Arts Center on Garland Groh Blvd. and a very enthusiastic Uber driver.




Caleb Wescott, a native of Boonsboro, Maryland, currently teaches music in Washington County Public Schools. Graduating with his bachelor's degree in 2022, he formally studied music education and classical saxophone at the University of Tennessee with a focus on instrumental music. Caleb directs his musical passions toward voice, singing with various ensembles, and performing

as a church musician. Caleb sings Tenor as a member of HCA and is on the HCA Board of Directors. Self-taught, he plays the piano by ear, and enjoys performing periodically for smaller venues. In his free time, Caleb enjoys working outdoors and tinkering with automobiles.

Schaefer holds four degrees in music, including the DMA in Liturgical Music from The Catholic University of America. His postdoctoral studies included work with chant scholars around the world, studies at *Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique* in Paris, and singing for six months with *Le Choeur Grégorien de Paris*. He is an expert in the musical notation of Carolingian chant, the

oldest musical notation in the Western world.

During his four decades as a choral director, Dr. Schaefer's choirs have been recognized with invitations to sing in the U.S. at state, regional, and national conventions of the American Choral Directors Association and The Music Educators Association, and in Europe at an international chant conference honoring the twenty-fifth anniversary of *Le Choeur Grégorien de Paris*.

Janet Palmer After graduating from Millikin University in Decatur, Illinois, with a degree in Choral Music Education, Janet taught K-12 choir and vocal and general music in public schools in Illinois, Wyoming, and Wisconsin for 38 years, retiring in 2019. While in Wyoming, she was named Teacher of the Year in Big Horn County School District 1, and co-founded the Big Horn County Elementary Music Festival. Janet worked

for nearly 40 years as a choir director and church musician in multiple denominations, and as director, music director, accompanist, choreographer, or costumer in well over 100 school and community theatre productions. Janet sings Soprano II and is a board member with HCA, she is also involved with Potomac Playmakers and Authentic Community Theatre in Hagerstown. Janet and her husband, Larry, relocated to Maryland in April of 2023, and are enjoying getting to know and become involved in the area, and spending more time with granddaughter Coraline.



Our Leaders

Mary Remsburg, Accompanist and Rehearsal Assistant, was raised in the small town of Franklin, West Virginia, and graduated from Shepherd University in 2016 with a Music Education degree.

As a child, she was part of the Shenandoah Valley Children's Choir for 9 years, which gave her the opportunity to be selected to perform at

numerous venues, including Carnegie Hall and The White House.

While at Shepherd University, Mary played in the Jazz Combo and Jazz Ensemble, earning the honor of performing with award winning composer Maria Schneider. Mary also performed at several Honors Recitals at the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts, as a classical soloist and in the Jazz Combo. She accompanied for Women's Camerata for, Performance Forums and senior recitals.

Currently, Mary teaches private studio lessons at Shepherd University, teaches at Saint James School, and is the accompanist for Hagerstown Choral Arts. Mary also frequently plays for musical productions, recitals, recordings, private events, and concerts.

Mary recently released her first folk album *Sounds Like Home*, under the stage name Mister Mae, and her music has been featured on multiple radio programs both in the United States and the United Kingdom. She is married to Chase Remsburg, a fellow graduate of Shepherd University.



Gregory Paul Shook, Artistic Director, is a native of Hagerstown, Maryland, where he received his early musical training. In 1993, he and Ned Wetherald co-founded Hagerstown Choral Arts, now in its 31st season. Greg is Minister of Music Emeritus from Trinity Lutheran Church in Hagerstown and serves as adjunct faculty at Shepherd University, Barbara Ingram School for the Arts, and Hagerstown Community College.

As a free-lance oboist, Greg performed with the Harrisburg Symphony, York Symphony, Washington National Symphony, and six seasons with the Washington Bach Consort. He is often called upon as clinician and adjudicator for choral and instrumental programs in the Tri-State area.

Greg is an alumnus of Shepherd University and holds graduate degrees and certifications from the University of Maryland at College Park, United Theological Seminary, and a Master of Church Music from Shenandoah Conservatory.

To the same person twice



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
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
