We opened by discussing the effectiveness of our current protocols. They seem to be working well. The committee formed a guideline recommending that all returnees from vacation wear a mask for two weeks during meeting for worship to alleviate the possibility of passing any variant on to our community.

We discussed the excitement generated by our community prayer group which is meeting twice a month at Centre. Dick said that he will write a letter to the pastor of the AME church this week outlining our group and inviting members to participate.

We discussed having volunteers visit members who have trouble accessing Otter closedcaptioning services during meetings for worship.

Building and Grounds: Pam Hambach reported that we are considering improving the welcome sign at Hopewell, including the wording, the size and shape, and the location. Please submit ideas to any committee member. David Logan examined the chimneys with a camera drone and discovered that there are no caps. We plan to have chimney caps installed to prevent further plaster damage from the possibility of water seeping through the chimneys. Steve Berkenkemper donated a portable air conditioner to Centre. It has been tested and seems to be working well. Many thanks to him for the donation.

Advancement and Outreach: Margie Riley reported (through Dan Riley) that the committee is continuing to work on the new website for the Meeting. She and Julia Storberg-Walker met recently to coordinate the details for the drop-down menus. Michele Sunderland is continuing to give good technical support. The committee is also working with Pastoral Care to support

the development of the Community Prayer Group. Margie created and duplicated flyers to promote the prayer group which were distributed to everyone at the business meeting. The flyers include the group mission statement; many are available at Hopewell. A copy will also be emailed to everyone. Dick Bell further explained what to expect when attending one of the prayer meetings. Donna Knight suggested placing our outdoor sign into the yard at Centre with information about the twice a month gatherings. It was also suggested that we include information in our once-a-month Winchester Star ad.

Ann Bacon has been in touch with the pastor of the local AME church and Clerk Bell has sent an invitation to the church to attend the meetings and to exchange prayer requests with us.

Let Margie know of any ideas you may have for our upcoming Homecoming gathering.

Pastoral Care: [Please see above. MC]

Shelter Project: We met on July 8, Martha, Charlie, Jim, Dan and contractor Mike Horst in attendance. We reviewed the estimate by Mike Horst of Integral Construction for picnic shelter/storage building on concrete pad, under one roof, for approximately \$66,655.00. The committee agreed to go with a standard metal roof rather than standing seam. This will save a considerable amount of money.

We also approved using Charlie's 4x8 doors to be placed on the east side of the storage area, to place a door from storage into the shelter, and to install one window on the south side of storage.

The bid will be adjusted to include electrical, excavation, grading, and permit fees. The committee is comfortable going with Horst but we are looking at two other possible contractors: One based in Christiansburg, Virginia, for \$125-135,000 for a timber frame structure not including a concrete pad. And another from This n' That Amish Outlet for a rough estimate of \$50,000 without specific plans at this time.

Charlie suggested we include in the grading a patio area on west side of shelter which may be finished with gravel where a fire circle would be located. It would be approximately 20' x 20' or 20' x 36'.

Committee has requested a second hour in August to present more complete plans to the Meeting. This time would also cover costs and fundraising in more detail. We are in touch with people who expressed interest in helping with fundraising.

Scott Lynch has agreed to take down the old shed in exchange for materials. Wood from shed will be saved for projects such as bookends. Scott Lynch has also agreed to finish 3 longer benches for use in the shelter.

Maureen O'Mara agreed to store these benches and will provide for pick up by end of July. Paul Britner suggested we get a bid for the project from a minority-owned business. We also agreed to check with the AME church.

Graveyard: Jim Riley reported that 4 trees were removed from the Hollingsworth graveyard. There are several trees that need to be removed from the Hopewell graveyard. Julia Storberg-Walker suggested we consider replanting after trees are removed.

Hospitality: Judy Enterline reminded us that we need guests to include their address when signing the guest book for follow-up correspondence.

Landscaping: We called "We Do Trees" for some "tree" work. Fortunately, they had a branch office nearby, but they were too busy, so we went out on a limb to try and discover the root of the problem ourselves. When we saw that we had left our tools locked in our trunk, one frustrated member barked out, "I'm leaving," so we gave up and leaved.

Announcements: Homecoming is at Hopewell on August 22. OATS meets on July 17.

1921 Winchester Star newspaper article

The Winchester Star regularly runs stories from years gone by in its "Out of the Past" column. Jim Riley found this article about a "community playground" Centre Meeting ran annually.

From June 24, 1921
