Most people love this time of year, the cool crispness of the air, the chance to break out the cozy sweaters. I'm not one of them. I hold out in shorts and sandals until first snowfall in a desperate attempt to deny that indeed fall has come once again. What saves the whole season for me are the fall colours.

When planning our landscapes, we should be looking to include trees and shrubs that give a full 4-season effect. Upon writing this, we've had 2 nights of frost at our house and my acer palmatum "Osakazuki" have begun to change to their characteristic and amazing hot magenta pink. The colour astounds me every year, and once the leaves fall the fare form is beautiful on it's own.

Also stunning for their winter nakedness and fall show are acer griseum (paperbark maple) and acer palmatum "Sango-Kaku" (coral bark maple) but really all Japanese maples are handsome year round.

Other selections we've found that are terrific for fall and winter are larix kaemphferi (Japanese larch) with its golden iridescence for several weeks before the needles fall. Over winter, it's tortoise shell bark and weeping pendulous and contorted branches are beautiful and stark.

Callicarpa bodinieri is one of my favourites with maroon fall leaves and thick clusters of pearly purple berries, which persist through most of winter if the birds don't get them.

Nine bark (physocarpus opulifolius) "Diablo" is amazing in that its dark maroon-brown leave actually get lighter in colour and can go yellow, orange and red in autumn. The mature branches show the peeling bark all winter and if pruned correctly provide a fiercely vertical shape.

Another great small tree is cornus "Eddies White Wonder". Its autumn colour can be a shocking lipstick pink and the bare winter form show hundreds of flower buds that develop in fall, little mini dogwood blossoms. Come spring we also love watching those buds slowly develop until the tree leafs out and is suddenly covered in giant show white blooms. To further this effect I prune out most growing tips that do not hold a flower bud.

Due to natural variations, not all plants of the same variety turn the same hue in fall. If you are looking to add plants to your landscape for autumn colour, now is the optimal time to shop for them. You will be able to see their true and spectacular tones.

#### **Question and Answer Period with Bill Herring**

There are now brassica seeds available which are club-root resistant ("Clapton" variety cauliflower) "Kalanski" cabbage seed available through Bill – not cheap but worth it.

What shall we do about our tomatoes? There is a danger of late blight in this muggy damp weather. Use a 10-1 bleach solution to wipe them off.

Store in a dark place with a ripe banana or a red apple.

Brussels sprouts can still grow larger at this time of the year.

If you over-feed squash you won't get fruit but leaves and stems. Don't be too kind or too generous with water.

Female flowers are on the fruit; the male flower has one stem and a larger flower.

#### PROPOSED NEW BY-LAW AND CONSTITUTION CHANGES

Your Executive/Committee Group has drafted and approved the following new By-law and new membership rate per our Constitution to be voted on by the membership at an Extraordinary Meeting called for 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, October 26, 2010. It is required we publish these new proposed by-laws in our newsletter two months in advance so you've seen this notice in May, June, September and October 2010's newsletters.

Proposed New By-Law number 7. Current By-law 7 becomes number 8.

Consideration for all charitable donation proposals each year will be decided by a majority vote of the Executive/Committee Head Group at the May Executive/Committee meeting. Proposals for donations will be sent, in writing, to the Secretary prior to the May Executive/Committee meeting which is held on the second Tuesday of every month. Those donations approved by the Executive/Committee Head Group will be voted on for final approval by the membership at the Annual General Meeting. Criteria for consideration for any charitable donation will include the Club's ability to pay and the nature of the organization requesting donations with preference given to gardening-related requests.

Proposed new membership rate as per Article 5 of the Constitution regarding contents of Annual General Meetings:

Annual membership rate to rise to \$10 per person per year, effective January 1, 2011.

#### Proposed amendment to number 5 of the By-Laws

Current: A 'Quorum' shall consist of 50% of paid-up members

Proposed: A 'Quorum' shall consist of 50% of paid up members or a minimum of 50 members.

#### **VOLUNTEERING**

As often mentioned, the Mill Bay Garden Club has grown dramatically over the last three years. It seems likely there will be more than 200 of us by the end of our season in June 2011.

As with all non-profit organizations, our Club relies heavily on its volunteers to execute our many programs and indeed run the Club. No one is paid in money for any of their contributions to our Club.

Fully appreciating that many members are fully engaged in raising children, full-time work, numerous other volunteer organizations, and just living and enjoying life – we seem to be chronically short of willing people to volunteer at the Club.

We are not speaking strictly of the more time-consuming positions like on heading a Committee or serving on the Executive or running our Annual Flower and Garden Show. There are elements of our concern here, but that's a discussion for another day.

We are referring to fulfilling your volunteer duties one in every 14 meetings. A few years ago – because the same people were setting up tables and chairs, manning the kitchen and taking down the tables and chairs every meeting – we decided to break all members into teams of 7-9 and assign a team per meeting to look after set up, take down, and clean up. The teams were simply created by counting down our membership list. There are so many of us that at 9 persons per list, each member would have to undertake this duty only once every 14 meetings or so.

Yet, when calling to remind group members of their duties at the upcoming meeting our coordinators are met with all sorts of excuses why this tiny volunteer commitment can not be met. Most don't want the job of putting up tables or setting up chairs. Of course, anyone physically unable to undertake this duty is immediately excused and re-assigned to providing goodies or another non-physical task. But able bodied individuals refuse and offer to cook instead. Or others claim that they don't cook. Other members are contacted, juggling takes place and eventually, at the meeting, your committee and executive set up and take down the tables and chairs with assistance from the few volunteers who took on their assignments with enthusiasm. Why?

We ask the question honestly and without criticism. Why are we having trouble getting members to assist in set up and take down, clean-up and goodie making for one turn every 14 meetings? Why do other organizations like the Cowichan Valley Rhododendron Society undertake the same

tasks we have to each meeting with enthusiasm and cooperation? We are wide open to suggestions on another way to tackle this. Does anyone have any good ideas on how to ensure our meetings are pleasant, enjoyable, educational, safe, and fun for everyone?

#### HOLIDAY CELEBRATION/CHRISTMAS PARTY POTLUCK

This year our celebration will be held on Tuesday, December 7th<sup>th</sup> at the Mill Bay Community Hall. Every year the doors will open at 5:30 pm, and we will get started at 6:00 p.m.

The team that's designated for our November/December meeting will be on hand to set up the tables, chairs etc. in a dining room style, but help from the entire club in setting up and taking down would be much appreciated during this festive season. Many hands make light work. The Mill Bay Community league decorates the hall and the atmosphere is fun and festive.

We bust out our Club-owned tableclothes for the event (just imagine!) and everyone brings plates, cups, glasses, napkins and cutlery as appropriate. Bring whatever suits you. There are also two tri-coloured heathers available at the cost of \$4.50 including tax. These are three bud bloomers in the same pot.

#### WHAT ARE THESE HEATHER PLANTS CALLED BUD BLOOMERS?

Bud bloomers are heathers whose buds develop colour but do not fully open. Therefore, bud bloomers stay fresh and bright for months, prolonging the heather colour season through late fall and into early winter. Bud bloomers were actually discovered because they still had colour in late fall when all the normal summer heather blooming flowers around them had turned brown.

Appalled by the waster of plants generated by the widespread German practice of using frost-susceptible South African heathers in November to decorate graves for All Saints' Day, Kurt Kramer (of *Erica x darleyensis* 'Kramer's Red' fame) applied his considerable skills to the bud bloomers. His goal was to offer an alternative hardy plant that could survive outdoors in northern Europe. Bud bloomers appear to be particularly suited to withstand harsh weather.

Today, as many other plant breeders have also worked with bud bloomers to produce notable hybrids, we have a wide selection available to us. The biggest advantage of bud bloomers remains their very long season of blooms. Most develop good colour by late August and retain it for months. Their ability to withstand early frosts, wind and rain without fading, makes them extremely valuable for late garden colour in cold climates. They very nicely fill that time in the garden between the summer blooms and the colour

of the winter blooming heathers. Some are neat and compact, some upright, some sprawling, just like ordinary heathers. Bud bloomers are now available in a wide range of flower and foliage colors.


