

Gardening Tips

Tips February 2013

Remove the leaves from *Galanthus nivalis* (snowdrops), they are poking up their heads and if you have a warm garden may already be blooming. They may be lifted and divided right after flowering and they like to be "crowded" when replanting.

Prune woody plants when weather warms up at the end of February—as they are still dormant. But not the roses---wait till the Forsythia blooms.

Feed rhubarb and berry plants. I like a liquid organic fertilizer.

Throw a handful of Epsom salts on the root area of your rhodos and other evergreen shrubs. This offers them some magnesium to help green up the leaves.

Remove all that winter debris and cut your grasses down now---before new growth really starts.

Order seeds if you haven't already, and start them under glass or under lights ---Full Circle seeds in Sooke is a local source.

Stay off of your soil until it warms a bit more---especially if you have a wet garden.

Prune summer-flowering shrubs that bloom on this year's wood. E.g. hardy fuchsia and butterfly bush.

Plant new bush and cane fruits and prune existing ones. Feed with well-rotted compost.

Protect new growth from those pesky rabbits – hanging metal baskets turned upside down over plants work very well.





Community Flower and Garden Show Saturday, June 15, 2013

Plans are ramping up for this year's Community Flower and Garden Show, held at the Cobble Hill Farmers Institute Hall. For those of you who are new to the club, this is one of the largest annual events in our region and aside from membership fees, the largest source of revenue for our club. This multi-faceted show includes a silent auction and an outdoors sales programme featuring plants and garden related items from our own club and from local vendors. The highlight of the show is the competitive flower show judged by the Vancouver Island Horticultural Judges Group. Hundreds of dollars in prize money is awarded to participants and the silent auction brings in thousands of dollars.

Brag Table – Barb – pieris, bergenia, heathers, hebe, holly, barbaris, heavenly bamboo, grasses, huckleberry, viburnum, calicarpa profusion, everlastings, holly, euonomis, stinky iris, gunnera, maple, dogwood, mushrooms, cedars, pine, fir, moss, climbing hydrangea, tree peony, mullein, magnolia, phlomis, hazelnut, dogwood red stemmed, willow, asparagus, grapes ornamental.

Q and A -Joy Storey standing in for Bill Herring. Brought copy of her magazine which is on sale. Plant shallots this month, easier than onions. Plant on shortest day of year and harvest on the

longest. Separate, poke into ground, mulch. Store very well. Keep better if planted now. Available at community garden store by the Garage in Duncan. Plant not too deep, but do mulch. Cover tips. Not recommended to plant anything at this time of year, protect garlic and winter crops, root crops should be covered, layer with leaf mulch. Leave artichokes, protect. They like it dry. Watch insects especially slugs. Early broc covered with aphids. June planted ones look fine, likely to winter well. Growing organic sprouts: place in mason jar, screen, screw lid on, soak for 24 hrs, drain, rinse twice, drain, great source of food. Can grain be sprouted? Yes. Done on the flat. Rinse daily, at least once. Try different types of seeds.

Mulch fruit trees heavily. Cardboard around trees to get rid of grass, then mulch. Pull back from trunk. Tent caterpillars lay eggs on branches, check trees for casings. Take them

off, can be iridescent in color. Summer pruning will enable you to find casings. Dormant oil can kill beneficial insects. Organic classification has been removed in some countries.

Speaker followed.


