President's Report

On the coattails of the 'Mixing it up in the Urban Garden' event that our own Master Gardeners helped plan and execute, I attended a meeting of Island Garden Club Presidents at Mary Winspear Centre in Sidney on Saturday January 26th. In attendance were the Presidents from eight Vancouver Island clubs: Nanaimo Horticultural Society, Peninsula, Gordon Head, Western, Royal Oak, Salt Spring Island, Cowichan Valley and Mill Bay.

A broad range of topics were covered and we plan to meet again in the near future. It was agreed that the garden tour programme we developed with the Cowichan Valley Club could be expanded to include all eight clubs. This would open up what might be dozens of area gardens for us all to view, from Nanaimo to Victoria and Sidney.

Our Executive and Committee discussed this at our February meeting and it was thought to be a good idea. When there is more information available about the programme as it develops, we'll post notices in the newsletter and discuss it at regular meetings if there are questions.

I was blown away when, at the first planning meeting for the Community Flower and Garden Show to be held on June 14th and 15th, a total of fourteen people showed up. In addition, three more members who weren't able to attend have committed to adding their efforts. Heather Gibbins and her crew produced an amazing show last year with record totals. This year looks to be starting off on the same foot and we'll start circulating sign-up sheets at this month's meeting to fill all the volunteer positions for the two day event. Last year more than 40 members put in time on either or both of the show dates and the work was accomplished in an amazingly quick and organized manner.

For you newer members, this is our big event of the year and a great way for you to get more involved in the club and community. There are still openings within the committee if you are interested in becoming involved and didn't make it to the first meeting. The next meeting will be on Monday March 4th at the home of Bev Rempel. Bev and Pauline Dueck will be building and maintaining a Facebook page for the show and will give a short workshop on using social media during the meeting. Those in attendance should bring either a laptop or Ipad if available.

We still need someone to help coordinate our bus tour to Sooke with the Cowichan Valley club contact. Please step up and help us out, otherwise the tour might not happen. It's not a big job, a few hours of your time is all that's needed.

This is a great opportunity to show our presence in the community, hand out promotional materials for our Community Flower and Garden Show and to sign up new members. Notes From The Library

We have three new books on growing fruit: Growing fruit with a Smile by Nikolay Kurdyumov, The Fruit Grower's **Bible** by Lewis Hill and Leonard Perry and **The Fruit Expert** by Dr. D.G. Hessayson. We have a fabulous book called **Pruning and** Training by the American Horticultural Society, a book called The Book Of Kale which also includes delicious recipes. We have two books by Rosalind Creasy: Edible Landscaping and Recipes from the Garden (we have to know how to cook all this produce), and two new books on composting. We also received The Winter Harvest Handbook by Eliot Coleman and Gilkeson's Natural Insect, Weed and Disease Control.

Gardening Tips

March 2013

- Remove leaves that were protecting beds over the winter---add them to your compost. Use them to mix with grass clippings once you start to mow.
- Prune woody plants now—while they are still dormant.
 Blooming before June 1st prune now---blooming after June 1st, prune after they bloom. Roses---wait till the Forsythia blooms.
- Can still assess your garden for winter interest and decide where you need to add an evergreen or something of interest for next year.
- Mark the positions of your spring bulbs after flowering for future reference.
- Divide and relocate perennials as they emerge from the soil.
- Start lettuce and early greens in cold frames.
- Tuck cool-weather spring flowers like primroses, winter pansies,
 Cyclamen coum into containers to brighten up dull days.
- Feed rhubarb and berry plants. I like a liquid organic fertilizer.
- Throw a handful of Epsom salts on the root area of your rhodos and roses and other evergreen shrubs. This offers them some magnesium to help green up the leaves.

Brag Table –" What's Up"- witch hazel, mahonia charity or winter sun, epimedium, (should be cut down about a month from now like helibores) fern, pieris, honeysuckle shrub, sweet box.

Helibore hibridus, heather, winter nandina, snowdrops, a rose, hebe, pineapple mint, euonimis, dusty miller, rhodo, viburnum, kerrria, native red currant, climbing hydrangea.

Q and A: Bill is away this evening, Joy Story will answer questions. Pip pulled up some leeks and they have enormous roots. Should they have? Pull slightly then cut roots off and let them decompose. There are two different types, summer and winter. Summer leafed did not die back this winter. Carmen. Something ate Kale. Not deer. Nothing left, perhaps rabbits? Wood pidgeons might as well. Collard and kale devastated in greenhouse but nothing touches swiss chard. Monitor and keep an eye on it. Are earwigs still busy? Woodbugs are. Parsnips, peas and potatoes can be planted in Feb. Sprout potato eyes out of direct sunlight before planting. Camelia planted with rhodos does not bloom. Can it be pruned? Very shaded. Buds do not form. Can be pruned hard. Prune after flowering. May not be getting enough water. Sooty mold from an insect on back of leaves, once on, excretes 'honeydew', gets on leaves and then mold grows. Nothing much can be done. Aphids on window sill, tried deep woods off which killed the plant. Safer soap did not work. On Indoor hibiscus. Spray them off in shower. Black current plant that needs to be moved, can it be transplanted.? Dig out to drip line to get root ball. Needs to move within next month. Root prune and give a good hair cut. Make sure to keep well watered. Ideally should have been moved in the fall. Easy to take cuttings from. Worthwhile to do in case it does not survive.


