

Several members have already called me to arrange to deliver the plants and/or obtain advice about plants to pot up. We really need you to pot up plants for the sale and deliver them to my place prior to the day before the sale. We would kindly ask that you refrain from donating invasive plants and the Committee does have the prerogative to remove, from the sale, those plants that it considers to be invasive. It is important that we continue to be good stewards of our environment.

Gardening Tips for June

- ◆ Time to sow warm season beans, squash, melons, peppers, cucumbers and basil.
- ◆ Feed and water containers on a regular schedule (including perennials kept in pots).
- Stake tall plants NOW that may fall over as they get taller.
- Check roses for signs of black spot (definitely on mine already).
 Pick off and destroy diseased leaves.
- Remove moisture, sunlight, nutrient robbing weeds from your garden.
- Mow lawns leaving 2 1/2 inches high to shade the roots and allow enough foliage for photosynthesis. Water less often but deeply to encourage strong roots.
- Fertilize bulbs that have finished flowering to encourage good bloom for next season, and leave foliage till it dies back naturally.
- Prune spring flowering shrubs that are now finished blooming.
- And have a glass of wine and enjoy your garden. Mine is looking lush and happy from the cooler spring and adequate moisture.

Hello Perennial Gardeners!!!

What a warm sunny spell we had at the end of April and beginning of May!

It was starting to get dry out there, and the watering was a regular routine already. As I write this, we are having a nice rain, drenching everything out there, but all is loving it. Nothing like a good soak overnight, especially if transplanting has been done earlier. We have been potting up a huge amount of stock this spring season, and still have much more to go. The rhodo's and azaleas seem to be a bit earlier in their bloom this year, and perennials also are budding.

Our little goat herd has now grown to a population of five !!, Poppy had twins last year, Flash and Dash !!! Star had a single baby this year, Lily (or Lilybug !!) she is 3 weeks old as of this date. She can keep up to all the big goats with her ears as wings !!!

We are looking forward to our spring sale at the end of May, and hope to see you all out here at the farm. This year the sale will be four days, starting on the Thursday. We are hoping for warm, sunny weather.

We will have hostas, lilies, rhodos, azaleas, blueberries, raspberries, currants, rhubarb, deciduous trees, flowering shrubs, and perennials, many varieties of hen and chicks, all available for sale here at the nursery.
