Mill Bay Garden Club Tips October - November 2013

Since the weather is nice you can still dig up summer blooming perennials to divide, and either replant or pot them up.

Time is "ripe" to plan next years' veggie garden space----and to cover the soil in your beds where nothing is growing.

Can plant container-grown trees and shrubs.

Roses deadheaded and old leaves destroyed to help prevent spread of disease.

Leave still good-looking or seed bearing perennials for winter interest and to feed the birds.

Bring in any tender plants in pots if not done already. Store in a cool place and check occasionally over the winter to keep slightly moist.

Clean your garden tools and put them away if you are not "winter" gardening.

Now all your clean-up chores are done, sit back with a up of hot chocolate and catch up on that stack of garden magazines.

Perennial Give-away!

Okay, well almost give-away. Here's the deal: Ajay and Tom are starting a major new backyard project and to make room for what's coming, we need to eliminate our large perennial bed that borders the backyard. Not just divide them all, but there will no longer be room for 95% of them, and they all need to find new homes. Available will be phlomis, sedum 'Autumn joy', several different types of delphinium, veronica, numerous Oriental lilies, lysimachia, Solomon's seal, too many perennials to list! Ornamental grasses too!

On Saturday November 2nd, come on over at 1:00PM with shovels, garden forks, pruners, knives, garden carts, bags, buckets, whatever you might need to dig in and share in this bounty. We ask that for each perennial division or large lily bulb, you donate a dollar to our Club's plant sale programme. Almost free, but this money will go back out to the community next summer when our donations to deserving organizations are approved at the AGM.

If you would be willing to take some of these divisions home to pot up for our annual plant sale, no donation is necessary.

We also have a quantity of drain rock and split cedar rails and posts available for take-away too, bring a truck or a trailer and a wheel barrow if you would like some for walkways and other garden projects.

Pointy End Up!

Tips for Growing Great GARLIC! By Joy Story

Garlic can be planted from September to the end of November. Later plantings may result in smaller bulbs.



It's best to start with good organic seed/bulbs, that have not been sprayed to discourage sprouting. The largest cloves will make the largest bulbs.

To achieve a bumper crop of Garlic, add well rotted manure or compost to the bed and use lots of it, you'll be glad you did.

Separate the cloves but leave the skins on and plant with the pointed end up 4 - 6'' apart and 2 inches deep. Mulch the bed with chopped fall leaves.

In the spring, mulch with 50% compost and 50% manure for the biggest bulbs. Hard neck varieties will produce a seed head called "scapes." These are removed to encourage bulb growth and can be eaten raw or cooked in stir fries. Many gardeners make pesto using scapes.

Stop watering about 3 weeks before harvest which is usually in late July. Harvest Garlic when the tops have died down 2/3 rds , pull and hang to air dry for about 4 - 6 weeks to cure properly.

It's important to practice crop rotation to prevent a disease called white rot.


