# **Gardening Tips**

Tips for March/April 2015



- Because of our very warm spring I am looking more to April gardening tips!!!!!!!!
- Having said that, if you haven't trimmed back all your warm season grasses better get it done before the new shoots grow and make the job much harder, also sword ferns and their like.
- If you have little blooming in your garden, you may want to add: bulbs for next year – Anemone blanda, Erythronium spp., Frittilaria imperialis, species tulips. Perennials – Pulsatilla vulgaris, Aubrieta deltoides, Pulmonaria.
- When finished blooming, deadhead your daffodils, to prevent energy going into seed production.
- Divide primulas after flowering.
- Edge your flower beds they look so "spiffy" when this is done and our grass has been cut !!
- You can mulch with about 2" of compost now as the soil has warmed up enough again very early for this.
- Think about stakes for those tall and floppy perennials and actually get them in place!!!!
- Roses can be pruned the forsythia is blooming.
- Shear winter blooming heathers after flowering.
- Good time to plant trees and shrubs. Evergreen and conifer hedges can be clipped now.

#### Q & A - Bill Herring

- Correction to last month's minutes

   Bill told us to chit our potatoes not plant them.
- To chit potatoes you place seed potatoes in egg crates with eyes at the top, in an area providing reasonable temperature and light and in one month there will be an inch of purple/green roots growing.
- Bill planted his potatoes today, which is early. If you have light soil you can plant early.
- Bill plants peas in the greenhouse on Boxing Day and when they reach 1/2" height they are acclimatized for planting outside in February along with parsnip seeds which require frost to start them and take up to a month to germinate.
- Plant potatoes in early March.
- Plant early and don't water too much as this will force seedlings to grow roots down to reach water which makes for stronger plants.



# The Alpine Gardeners of Central Vancouver Island present David Sellars



To speak on Picos de Europa: The Alpine Garden of the Cantabrian Mountains & Where to find alpine flowers in the Olympic Mountains

**Picos de Europa**: At the end of May 2014 David and Wendy Sellars joined the Saxifrage Society field trip to the Picos de Europa in Northern Spain. While the primary focus of the trip was to identify endemic Saxifrages, the amazing floral diversity of the area was an added attraction. The presentation will feature alpine and meadow plants of the Picos including many that can be grown on the west coast. Photos will include *Fritillaria pyrenaica, Lilium pyrenaicum*, three Narcissus species, the endemic *Erysimum duriaei* and spectacular orchids (*Orchis ustulata* pictured above left).

Olympic Mountains; The presentation will focus on routes in the Olympics to locate endemic alpines and other special plants.

**David Sellars** is an award winning photographer and writer and regular contributor to several alpine journals. He is also an avid mountain hiker and President of the Alpine Garden Club of B.C.
