Winter Program Recap

The workshop was full of activity this winter with over 80 youths participating in boatbuilding projects at the shop. We are pleased that so many of them were returnees from our fall trimester.







The home school and after school kids began building two new boats. First-time students started work on an 8-foot pram, while the experienced boatbuilders began another Tidewater-14. They got a great start and construction on both boats will continue during the spring trimester.



For the ninth consecutive year TWBW teamed with Sail Nauticus Academy. That program's eighth grade sailors were busy converting a completed Tidewater-14 rowboat into a sailboat. The students constructed the mast, spars, daggerboard, daggerboard case and rudder. Some of them had a first-time experience of using a sewing machine to make the sail for the boat.

Spring Program

TWBW's spring trimester got underway on April 8th. There are 60 youths enrolled in the program. Once again, many of them were participants in our fall and/or winter programs. They are working diligently to complete the 8-foot pram, and to finish planking and

installing frames in the Tidewater-14. The trimester will end with the students rowing and sailing the boats built over the past school year.

Pre-Apprentice Program

TWBW's third Pre-Apprentice program began January 8th with nine students enrolled in the program. After two weeks of shop safety





and tool familiarization training, the apprentices got busy on their first project: constructing their own tool box. Since then, they have built saw horses and a new wood steaming box for the shop. After that, work began on a 12-foot Bevin's Skiff rowboat. Besides carpentry skills, the apprentices are developing skills that employers in all trades seek in their workforce. The course is scheduled to conclude in early June.

New Project at ForKids

TWBW is continuing its partnership with ForKids, Inc., begun last

fall. Seven high school students in that nonprofit's youth program are building a 12-foot Bevin's Skiff rowboat at the Landmark Center in South Norfolk. The project got underway on February 20th. The teens have been making good progress and are on track to complete the boat and row it before the end of the school year.



Adult Boatbuilding Underway

TWBW's 2023 adult boatbuilding program kicked off in January with 10 students enrolled in the course. They are making great progress building a 12-foot Bevin's Skiff rowboat. The course is scheduled to conclude by the end of June.
