
But, first, we viewed a video about the Tannen's Magic Camp. This is a big landmark among magicians for its long-established camp dedicated to the art and skills of the magician. Although this year the camp was a virtual event, it was a real highlight for two of our Junior They found themselves in a break-out session with the famous magician, Teller, for whom they performed tricks learned while attending our weekly magic training for kids. Their attendance was made possible by two scholarships given to our club by one of our new members, Doug Taylor. His sponsorship is quite the gesture of his dedication to the legacy of magic in Omaha. It is an example of his philosophy of magic as a universal language that can not only break down barriers but open up life to abundance. We are very grateful for the abundance of life he gave to our young, enthusiastic junior magicians.

Next, our members shared tricks that they know an audience enjoys, but for which they are not so enthusiastically performed. One of such tricks is the Egg Bag. A lively discussion ensued about the pros and cons of that classic illusion. Either you love it or hate it seemed to be the consensus.



Linking Rings was another trick that seemed to have a lot of merits for some and not so much for others.

But, the highlight of the meeting were performances by Jered Schaugaard, Larry Brodahl, Steve Lindeman and Dave Madsen. Each showed their go-to and favorite tricks. Jered and Larry performed card tricks with slight-of-hand expertise that always entertains us, and sparks conversation. Dave Madsen showed us a very upbeat performance set to music that is a hit in his stage shows. It is a fast-moving shuffle of many record albums that change colors in concert with his patter and background music.



It is always fun when **Steve Lindeman** performs one of his stage tricks. He shared a mentalism trick known as <u>Color Match</u>, using a puppet of Herbie Husker, the University of Nebraska football mascot. It is a hit with an audience not only because of our love of college football, but because it incorporates the "free thought" of a volunteer who chooses colors to paint the black and white picture of Herbie, only to have Steve pull a matching Herbie Husker puppet out of the magic box that sat untouched next to him on stage.

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COSTUMING-Communicating Character-

Try this experiment the next time you watch a latenight talk show!

Turn off the sound for at least half the show!

With no sound, you'll be able to focus your attention on the host's selection of clothing. Check below all that you can learn about him from his clothes.

Once you start making that list, it's amazing how much we do learn about a person's personality from the way they dress.

Now repeat this same experiment for several different evenings to observe how much he varies his attire. You'll probably discover a definite pattern to his clothing choices!

Like an actor wears a costume to enhance the character they play; the talk show host wears his clothing to strengthen the persona he has decided to project. His costuming serves as an extension of his character development. What do you think the following combinations communicate about the personality of the one wearing them?

Suit or no suit?

Double breasted suit or single-breasted suit?

Long skirt, mid-length or short skirt?

Skirt or pants?

Skirt and blouse, dress, or suit?

Bright color, dark color or earth tone? Sports coat or suit?

Tie or open shirt? Short sleeve shirt or long-sleeved shirt? White shirt or colored shirt? Plain shirt or patterned shirt?

Of course this assumes you've already defined the character you wish to portray.

If you have already defined your performing persona, then select your attire to silently support and complement your character.

If people could turn the sound off on you as a magician, what would just your clothes reveal about yourself? Is it the image you want?

Overhead! -By Dave Arch-

No doubt you've seen "two-person telepathy" party stunts where one person leaves the room while the other remains. After coming back into the room, the person is able to discern an object selected by those in the room to the puzzlement of those watching.

This obscure version has one of the partners leave the room and stay in the other room while the remaining partner holds his/her hand above the heads of several people in the room. Each time s/he holds his/her hand above a head she repeats the single word "Overhead." Then finally the partner remaining in the room holds his/her hand over the head of another person and asks the question "Over whose head?" From the other room the partner successfully discerns and calls out the name of the person over whose head the partner's hand is being held.



This can be repeated over and over as each time it's repeated those watching rule out yet another of their theories as to how it works. Following are some theories which quickly get eliminated:

- No verbal coding between the partners. The same exact phrases are used every time.
- The chosen one from the group is not always the second, third, or fourth person in the process. The ordering of the people is ultimately under the completely free choice of the partner remaining in the room.
- No pre-arranged ordering of the people (i.e., First Bob, then Mary, then etc.)

And best of all for the performers there is no memorization required.

The Secret

The secret is that both partners know that the person who ultimately will be the recipient of the phrase "Over whose head?" will be the last person from the group to speak prior to the partner leaving the room.

Although this has never happened to me, if two people "tie" in speaking at the same time as the partner leaves the room, the partner simply returns and asks the group if everyone is ready.

In my experience, as opposed to most other times in magic, repetition here only makes the routine stronger.
