



There were two separate dinner seatings, with probably 10 to 12 round tables with groups of ten hungry youths at each. Seemingly quite daunting, but no problem for our team of magic-makers.



Matt Spielman, Tom Neddo, Patrice Fisher, and two of our *Discover Magic* students, Steven and Drew, joined The Amazing Lindy for a night of close-up table tricks. Each of us brought different types of illusions. The evening was pulled together by *The Amazing Lindy*, despite his being in a hand and wrist cast from just having hand surgery! Being a professional, he relied on his mystical, mind-reading abilities to astonish his tables and left the card coordination to others. Through his years of magic for restaurants, Lindy knows how to put everyone at ease with those talkative teens being no

exception. He put his cards literally in the hands of any volunteer willing to perform for the table, making them the hero of the act! He said "It was great seeing all the smiles and hearing all the laughter, knowing we help brighten the holidays for all of these kids." It was clear he was in his element.

Two of our youngest junior magicians showed off their card skills, one-handed rope-knotting, and a coloring book transformation from blank pages to colored ones. These were just a few tricks among other cool illusions in their repertoire. Larry's Logic

Picking a volunteer

The skill of picking a volunteer is fortunately a very easy art to acquire. And I don't mean just ANY volunteer, I mean the RIGHT volunteer. You just need to pay attention.

Notice that I don't say "ASK for a volunteer" ... PICK THEM!

The people, especially kids, that clamber over each other to be picked are the exact opposite of the volunteer I want. So, I don't EVER pick anyone that acts like they want to come up.

Instead, as I'm performing, I watch the audience. I see who is paying attention, who is reacting to my jokes, who appears pleasant. Then, when I need a volunteer, I say, "I need someone from the audience. Would you please come up."

Now, as I say this, I've walked near them, I point at them, and I hold my hand out as if I'm going to help them up. Which I rarely do, especially if I'm on stage and they aren't.

If they seem hesitant.... even just a little... I ask the audience "Could we have a nice round of applause for our volunteer." Most people cave under the applause and come up.

If the person vehemently hesitates.... shakes their heads no, turns their face away from you, etc. I simply say, "OK" and I turn to my second-best choice and ask them to join me. I RARELY have anyone refuse, and I've NEVER had both choices refuse.

Now some of you may want to do more wheedling and begging to get the person on stage, but I don't believe in it. Being on stage is a **privilege**, and if you turn it down, the offer doesn't get re-extended. And I have had some people come up afterwards and express regrets about not agreeing to "volunteer", and I simply say, "Well, it was your choice."

Another couple of tips for volunteering, especially if you actually have a stage.

If you're going to have someone join you, make it someone in the first 2 or 3 rows. Unless there's something special about the guy in row 15, you don't want to just stand there while he fights his way to the stage.



HOWEVER, this rule is flexible in one way. If you're doing a multi-volunteer trick, say with 5 people, then you can pick 2 from the back, 1 from the middle, and 2 from the front.

But you pick them in that order. That way, by the time the back guys are reaching the stage, you've just finished picking the front guys and everyone arrives at the same time. And the constant walking back and forth, and talking to the volunteers keeps this from being a dead spot.

So, that's some tips for volunteers. And at first, you'll probably pick a few losers, but take heart. Each loser is a lesson in picking a winner.

THE MIRASKILL PRINCIPLE

If you are not familiar with the Miraskill principle, here's your chance to familiarize yourself with it. Like paints and a blank canvas many different presentations can be used with the principle.

You have the cards (**minus the jokers**) shuffled, and fan them to your audience, showing that they're not in any set order. Say, "I'm going to write a prediction," and put the deck into the card case. You want two red cards at the top of the deck and two black cards at the bottom, or vice versa. You should never have to rearrange more than two cards to get this result.


"I'm going to write a prediction," you announce, and pick up a slip of paper and pencil. You put the piece of paper on the back of the card case, see that it's too flimsy to write on, and shove the deck into the case to give it solidity. You write on the slip, "You will have two cards less than I do."

Fold the slip without showing it, and put it on the table. You're holding the card case, flap toward yourself.

"Here's what's going to happen," you announce. "You'll deal off two cards at a time from the deck, face up. If both cards are red, they go into the red pile. If both cards are black, they go into the black pile. If you deal off a red and a black card, they go into the discard pile. Now, tell me which color you want for yourself, red or black."

You're holding the card case in your hands, flap toward your body.

If the spectator chooses red, pull out the deck minus the two red cards at the top. If he chooses black, leave the two black cards on the bottom behind. Toss the cards to him and say, "Shuffle the deck again before you start dealing. Shuffle as much as you like. Cut, too. Whenever you think the cards are thoroughly mixed, start dealing. A pair of reds go into the red pile, a pair of blacks go into the black pile, and one of each puts the pair of cards into the discard pile."



He deals off the cards, counts the number in the red and black piles, and then opens your prediction slip, which proves to be correct.

Put the cards back into the case and write another prediction. This time you write, "We will both have the same number of cards in our piles."

Hand him the card case, have him remove the deck, shuffle to his heart's content, and deal out the pairs. Again, your prediction will prove correct. You've given him a free choice of color both times and have never touched the cards once he starts dealing. He shuffles and cuts, for both deal-throughs.

The Use Of AI/Chat GPT in a Magician Industry

I have found a way to help my repetitive tasks with running a magic business disappear or be reduced to

seconds vs. minutes. That is by harnessing the power of Chat GPT. At first, I was very unsure of how this could help me because I've run into chatbots before that offer conversation that can be interesting but never a conversation that takes me to the next level or can understand what I'm getting at quickly instead of having to type every single detail. I will list some real-world examples that helped me book leads quicker, rewrite bios, and give constructive feedback. I was getting to the point where I had so many leads that I would push off till later to respond and then either A) I never get to it or B) Someone else got to them first. Now, a disclaimer is to proofread something before you send it. I would describe Chat GPT as a Google search for someone new to this. If that doesn't resonate, think Ask Jeeves. If that doesn't resonate, think about cave drawings and how... well... never mind.

Recently, I had a conversation with **Dave Arch** about Chat GPT, where he learned about a structure using it where you should include ROLE, TASK, and PERSPECTIVE when you send a template. The **role** is what role you want GPT to play, the **task** is what you want it to accomplish, and the **perspective** is in which style such as 1st person, 3rd person, etc. You will find your prompt responses to be much more effective if you consider these three points, but I find myself not always doing it, which can cause some strain once you get responses from GPT.

Here are three scenarios I've used and would recommend using as a professional magician.

Client's Notes:
Hillcrest Country Club is hosting its annual Halloween
Extravaganza! It is a kid-friendly event. One of our themes is Side Show Attractions and having a magician would add so much to that theme! Please let me know if you have the availability for this event. 10.29.23 it is from 5:30 pm – 8:30 pm.

Scenario 1 – Lead Response:

<u>Situation</u>: I get a lead from a lead website; their formatting is all over the place and looks something like the images to the side.

Event: Sunday, 10/29/2023 Venue Hillcrest Country Club City & State Lincoln, NE Q (46 miles from Omaha) Vendor Start Time 5:30 PM Length of Service: 3 hours Number of Guests: 200-299 Services Needed: Magician Vendor **Budget:** \$201 -

\$300

Reasoning for Chat GPT: To help move past the basics: read, comprehend, type draft, review, retype, final review, and send. I can bypass most of those steps and go right to review by copying and pasting the info (as is) into GPT with a bit of a prompt.

My Prompt: I am a magician, and I would like you to respond to this lead and let them know I am available and that I would recommend 2 hours of strolling magic for \$X, which would include travel. Also, give them an option for 3 hours for an additional \$X. Here is their info: [paste info note and anything else missing from event details]

GPT Response: Thank you for considering my services for Hillcrest Country Club's annual Halloween Extravaganza! I would be delighted to be a part of your event and provide magical entertainment to enhance the Side Show Attractions theme. I am pleased to inform you that I am available on the requested date, October 29, 2023. I offer a rate of \$X for the 2 hours and \$X for each additional hour of performance. These prices also include travel expenses. Please let me know which option you would like! I will bring my expertise as a magician to create an enchanting and memorable experience for the attendees, particularly the young audience. I will tailor my performance to align with the kid-friendly nature of the event and the Side Show Attractions theme.

If you would like to proceed with booking my services, please let me know, and I will provide you with further information regarding the next steps and any specific requirements you may have.

Thank you once again for considering me as a magician for your Halloween Extravaganza. I look forward to the opportunity to contribute to the success of your event.

Scenario 2 – Rewrite/Reword Website:

<u>Situation</u>: Somethings I've typed on my website before chat GPT existed, just seem dull and boring I want to spice it up!

Reasoning for Chat GPT: By copying and pasting something you've already typed, it will pick up on what you are going for, use better words, and fill in details you may have never thought about!

My Prompt: How could I re-word this to be more concise in hiring me for a corporate event? I'm a magician. This is what's currently on my site, but I don't love it: For your next corporate event, allow magic to wow even adults! Not only will you entertain your audience with stunning tricks, you'll find that Adam does an amazing job accommodating each occasion. Based on the mood you tell us you want your entertainment to achieve, we'll plan a show that fits perfectly! Write it very concisely.

<u>GPT Response</u>: "Celebrate your next corporate event with a touch of magic that will leave your guests spellbound. Adam's captivating performances are tailored to your desired mood, ensuring an unforgettable experience. Book now to witness his stunning tricks that will entertain even the most discerning adults."

Scenario 3 – Providing Constructive Feedback:

Situation: I was asked to give feedback about someone's show, and I have a lot of thoughts, but I don't want them to come off rude, and I also want all my ideas to be laid out in a concise order

Reasoning for Chat GPT: It can add what you never thought of by reading between the lines. I use voice to chat to help get all my thoughts out, and then it rewrites it using proper grammar etc. (You can even do this for your own show and personal feedback).

My Prompt: Please write some constructive feedback for a magician who asked me to give him some. I am also a magician. I saw his 25-minute show and really liked the energy he gave to the audience. His stunts were really well timed and comedic. Timing was really good to build up those moments. The magic tricks were really good but lacked purpose for some items used. They seem kind of

random, but I thought they were good effects. [I then went into more detail about specific effects]

GPT Response: " Dear fellow magician, I had the pleasure of watching your 25-minute show recently, and I must say, your energy and ability to engage the audience were truly impressive. Your stunts were well-timed and infused with a delightful sense of humor. The way you built up those magical moments was particularly effective and kept the audience captivated throughout the performance.

Your magic tricks were skillfully executed, and I appreciated the quality of the effects. However, I felt that some of the items used lacked a clear purpose or connection to the overall performance. While they were good effects individually, their inclusion seemed somewhat random. To enhance the coherence of your show, I suggest considering a stronger thematic thread or storyline that ties the tricks together.

[details about specific effects were here, omitted, so nothing seems personal as this is just an example]

Overall, I genuinely enjoyed your performance and found it highly entertaining. Your energy and comedic timing were standout qualities that made the show truly enjoyable. By refining the purpose and coherence of the magic tricks and considering a stronger thematic connection, I believe you could take your already impressive show to the next level.

Keep up the great work, and I look forward to seeing more of your magic in the future!

Conclusion:

By using GPT, I have found incredible time savings and some tasks that seem like you'd never utilize GPT; but once you do, you can't go back (it was even tough not to use it to write this article!) There are continuous moral dilemmas with Chat GPT; ultimately, using it is up to the beholder. Please let me know if you have any more questions on how I use it, and brainstorm how you can uniquely use it!
