

Program

Tragic Overture, Op. 81

- Johannes Brahms

Upon being awarded an honorary Doctorate from the University of Breslau, Brahms gifted them with two Overtures. The first was the *Academic Festival*, the second, *Tragic Overture*. He was writing two bookend pieces, and as Brahms said, "One laughs, while the other cries."

I Dreamed a Dream – Sung by Alissa Barry

- Schönberg

From the 1980 musical, Les Misérables. The song is a lament, sung by the anguished character, Fantine, who has just been fired from her job at the factory and thrown onto the streets. She thinks back to happier days, in wonder at all that has gone wrong in her life. The lyrics are by Alain Boublil and this piece was arranged by Bob Krogstad.

Stand By Me

- King, Leiber, and Stoller

Considered a Rock & Roll Standard, this piece was first recorded by Ben E. King in 1961 and has been recorded over 500 times by other artists, even Mohammad Ali. Ben King wrote the first verse and Leiber and Stoller wrote the rest of the piece. Orchestra member Paul Jackson modified this piece for a full orchestra.

Remembrances – Soloist, Elizabeth Kinney

- John Williams

From the movie. *Schindler's List*. After viewing the film for the first time, Williams was profoundly moved and at first declined. informing Spielberg that he deserved a better composer. Spielberg's reply is now legendary: "I know. but they are all dead." Williams relates that he was mindful not to go down the path of melodrama, instead choosing to compose music that was "loving and gentle".

You Raise Me Up – Sung by Mike Stapley

- Graham and Lovland

"You Raise Me Up" was originally composed by the Norwegian-Irish duo Secret Garden. This piece was also arranged by Bob Krogstad. The song was performed for the verv first time at the funeral of Løvland's mother as it convevs a strong theme in God and the message of power and strength through faith.

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Program

Symphony No. 7, A Major, Op. 92, Allegretto

- L.V. Beethoven

Premiering in Vienna on December 8, 1813, the 7th is considered an example of the lighter side of Beethoven's compositional personality and evidence that, even after the onset of deafness, he still found cause for musical optimism. The Allegretto is often considered both melancholic and mysterious.

Memory – Sung by Alissa Barry

- Andrew Lloyd Weber, Arr. Bob Lowden

Written for the 1981 Broadway musical, *Cats*, where it is sung primarily by the character Grizabella as a melancholic remembrance of her glamorous past and as a plea for acceptance, Trevor Nunn used several poems by T.S. Eliot for the lyrics.

Intermezzo Sinfonico

- Pietro Mascagni, arr. by C. Simpson

An intermezzo is a musical composition which fits between other musical or dramatic entities, such as acts of a play or opera, or movements of a larger piece. Pietro Mascagni (1863–1945) was an Italian composer primarily known for his operas. His 1890 masterpiece, Cavalleria Rusticana contained this intermezzo.

Amazing Grace – Soloist, Cynthia Cournoyer

- Traditional, Arr. By Matt Riley

Christian hymn published in 1779, with words written in 1772 by the English poet and Anglican clergyman John Newton, who wrote the lyrics from personal experience. American composer W. Walker wrote the melody based on the song, *New Britain*. It is sung at least 10 million times per year.

Sicilienne Op. 78

- Gabriel Fauré

In 1892, the Grand Theatre in Paris asked composer Saint-Saëns to write a piece of music but he was too busv to accept the commission. He recommended his former pupil. Fauré. The music, which included the first version of the Sicilienne, was nearly complete when the theatre went bankrupt in 1893. The music was not performed in its final version until 1898 for a play in England.

Hallelujah

-Leonard Cohen

First appearing on Cohen's 1984 album *Various Positions,* the song became more popular when it was used in the movie *Shrek,* and again after Cohen's death in 2016. He wrote nearly 80 verses so many different versions of the song have been recorded. This version was arranged for orchestra by Thorsten Schaeffer.
