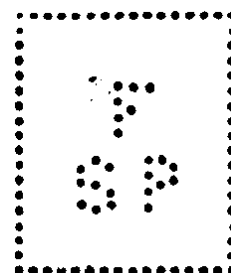
POLISH PERFINS IN UNITED KINGDOM 1980 – 1983

To distinguish and safeguard the official issues of souvenir postcards of the exhibitions organised by "The Polish Philatelists Association" in the United Kingdom the Committee decided to frank its future souvenir and commemorative postal postcards with definitive stamps perforated with the Association's Polish initials "S.F.P." - S/towarzyszenie F/ilatelistow P/olskich w Zjednoczonym Krolestwie" or other Polish initials, thus introducing for the first time Polish perfins in the United Kingdom on the 4th July, 1980.

This article lists Polish perfins in chronological order:-

1st perforation: "F/SP" (7/9,8 4½)

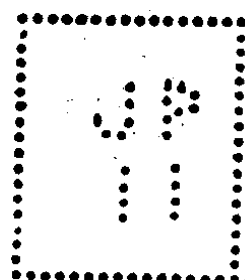


Perforated stamps were used for the first time on special postcards issued for the exhibition organised under the title "40th Anniversary of the Polish Air Force in the Battle of Britain" on the 4th July, 1980. (Philapol 80). The majority of stamps were used on official postcards but some quantities of stamps have been used on Association's correspondence and some have been sold to members of the Polish Philatelists Association for their collections and correspondence.

The second time the perforation was used was for the exhibition-under the title "Scouting in Philately" (Philapol 81) on the 15th May, 1981 and it was used for the third time on the 13th June, 1981 on souvenir postcards for "Polish Community Day in Nottingham".

The last time it was used was at the exhibition of the "40th Anniversary of Resumption of Polish Postal Service" cancelled with the date 15th December, 1981 (which was the actual anniversary date) and also on the 6th February, 1982 (the exhibition date) at the Polish Institute and General Sikorski Museum, London S.W.

2nd perforation: ("JP/II" 6,8/4,4 4½)

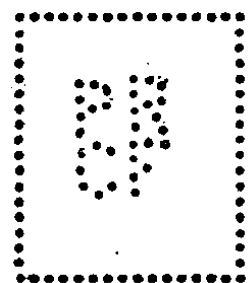


When the visit of Pope John Paul II to Great Britain was announced the Polish Philatelists Association in Great Britain made extensive plans to ensure that the Pontiff's visit to the United Kingdom was justly commemorated.

For the visit all postcards were franked with definitive stamps of 15½p and perforated with "JP/II" the initials of High Holiness, thus introducing a Papal/Polish perfin in the United Kingdom. The first perforation with the initials "JP II" was used on postcards for His arrival at Gatwick Airport. This first day postcard can truly be said to celebrate history in the making when for the first time ever a reigning Pontiff set foot on British soil and must be the ultimate souvenir of that historic day. Postcards were also hand-stamped with commemorative postmarks at each location visited by His Holiness. The same perforation was used for the second time on postcards on the 30th May 1982 at Crystal Palace to commemorate the Pope's visit to the Polish Community in Great Britain. It should be mentioned that the above postcards were hand-stamped by the British G.P.O. with a hand-stamp in the Polish language, designed and commissioned by the Polish Philatelists Association in the United Kingdom. This is the first time that the G.P.O. granted a hand-stamp in the Polish language.

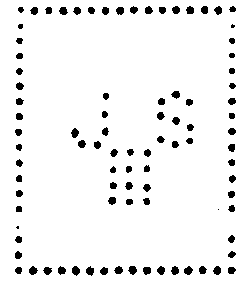
The perforation was also used on postcards with definitive Regional issues of Scotland on 31st May 1982 for the first day visit of a Pope to Edinburgh and on definitive Regional issues of issues of Wales on postcards posted in Cardiff on the 2nd June, 1982 for the first Papal visit to Wales. Its final use was on the commemorative postcards posted during the stamp exhibition "Papal Visits to Philately since 1978" organised by the Polish Philatelists Association on the 23rd and 24th July 1982 at Westminster Cathedral Hall, S.W.1. Some of the stamps, with the perforation "JP/II" type 1 were sold to members of the Association for their collections and correspondence.

3rd perforation: ("PR/CF" 8,10/7, 7 4½)



The Polish Institute and General Sikorski Museum in London used the above perforation "PR/CF" - P/olish R/Regimental C/olours F/undation - //Fundacja Szandarow P.S.Z // on commemorative postcards issued on 13th August 1983 for the special "Annual Reunion Day".

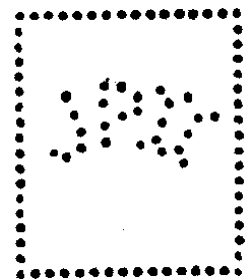
4th perforation:- ("JS/III" 6, 9/4, 4, 4 4½)



For the 300th Anniversary of the Battle of Vienna under the command of the Polish King Joannes III Sobieski in 1683, the Polish Institute and General Sikorski Museum in London together with Polish Philatelists Association in the United Kingdom issued the commemorative postcards for the exhibition organised by the Institute and the Museum. The stamps used on postcards were perforated with the King's initials.

5th perforation: (" JP II (in curve) 6, 8, 7, 6)

To commemorate the 5th Anniversary of Pope John Paul II's Pontificate the Committee of Polish Philatelists Association in the United Kingdom decided to organise the stamp exhibition in London on the 15th and 16th October 1983 and to issue the commemorative postcard and perforate the definitive stamp's with Pope John Paul II's initials "JP II" set in a curve. The hand-stamp was designed and commissioned by the Polish Philatelists Association and the British Post Office again granted a hand-stamp in the Polish language. The majority of the perforated stamps were used for official postcards and some perforated stamps were sold to members of the Association for their collections and correspondence.

HIS MAJESTY'S FACTORY PERFIN - EARLY USAGE

The perfin HM/F is well known. It was used by His Majesty's factory near Gretna Green. The perfin is not common but is found on the George V 1912/22 issues from 4½d to 2½d. This factory was in use from 1915 to 1919 and examples are usually found within this date range and postmarked either "GRETNA" or "CARLISLE". I was, therefore, a little surprised to come across an example on an Edward VII issue, which, presumably, went out of use long before the factory was opened in 1915. The stamp, illustrated above, is a 1d red and is postmarked "FOLK" (possibly FOLKESTONE or FOLKINGHAM) the year being unclear.

Can anyone provide more evidence of early usage, or information about an earlier "His Majesty's Factory". Perhaps Edward VII issues were supplied as late as 1915. All information would be welcome.

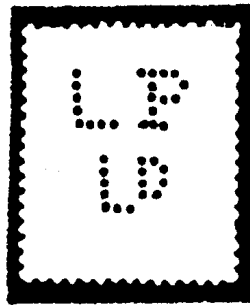
GRAPHITE-LINED PERFINS

In October. 1983 issue of The Perfins Bulletin. Mr. Bob Schwerdt who is The Perfins Club Co-Ordinator for the perfins regarded as Foreign by the United States of America, drew attention to the scarcity of perfins on the Graphite-lined issues of G.B. In his over 25,000 G.B. perfins he has only three on three different values. NC (51.5) on SG 562, T & S (404.3) on SG 566 and SW/GB (812.1) on SG 593.

Moved by this note, I found that I had six on four graphite-lined stamps of differing values:- W.S./M (702) on SG 563. CK (411.1) and FRY (358.1) on SG 589, V & S. (668.5) on SG 593 and C/W/S diagonally (853.1) and BN/& H (515.1) on SG 591.

The Editor would welcome similar returns from other members, with details of postmarks, if these are evident.



The above perfin die is listed in the Tilles catalogue, but without an identity. I recently came across it on an advertising picture postcard and hope that clues on this card may help one of our members to solve the puzzle of the user.

The postcard bears a K.E. VII ½d green stamp, and was posted from London on October 7th 1910 to an address in Lancashire. The picture side depicts the Cemetery of the Capuchin Monks with the commentary "To make room in the burial place of the Friars, the bodies that have been buried longest were placed in this vault, which contains earth brought from Jerusalem. When these bodies fall into decay the bones are collected for decorating the walls of the vault".

The picture shows skulls and bones stacked against the walls and stuck to the ceilings in patterns and designs, together with seemingly decaying bodies in Monks garb precariously propped up against them.

A footnote to the picture gives us our first clue and reads, "ONE OF THE 1000 ILLUSTRATIONS APPEARING IN 'THE WONDERS OF THE WORLD'. Part 1. 7d". The perfin then clearly belongs to the publisher of this magazine or booklet.

The reverse of the card bears a printed message in green ink in imitation of handwriting reading: 'Have you seen Part 1 of "The Wonders of the World"? It is magnificent! ', and signed 'K.C.H'.

Can anyone therefore solve the mystery from these clues? I look forward with interest to any suggestions.

SEAHORSES PERFIN - SPECIAL SALES PACKET.

(The continuing saga of what we collect. Many thanks to all those we sent in copy - keep it coming. Editor)

I joined the Society late in 1977 after years of saving perfins. Not a conscious desire to collect but as many dealers let perfins go for little or no charge I thought it was a good subject for a Yorkshire man to collect!

Seriously, my interests are G.B. and Ceylon, but to expand on that bald statement, taking G.B. first. My collection is of postal stationery, hence advertising rings, perforated cancels and of course, perfined stationery itself. Add to this under or overprinted stamps. King George V and VI cards and covers with identities and you have the extent of my G.B. interest.

Now on to Ceylon. Its my main collecting country for everything, as with this country it had problems with stamps being stolen. The thefts were in the main by servants taking mail to receiving offices and unscrupulous receiving office staff, who would sell the stamps in the Pettah (Market). In an attempt to combat this, permission was given in the early 1860's for individuals to tie stamps to covers with a manuscript date, person initials or some such device. So far as a business or hotel were concerned, it would have been quite tedious to sign each item so rubber hand-stamps were used for this purpose. Perfins were also used, the earliest known being on 1872 - 80 issues. There is an excellent study of the Island's perfins by Albert Ellis, published in the Ceylon Study Circle Bulletin. Albert is also a member of the Society. My collection includes not only perfins but examples of the manuscript marks and rubber hand-stamps as these are of course, security endorsements.

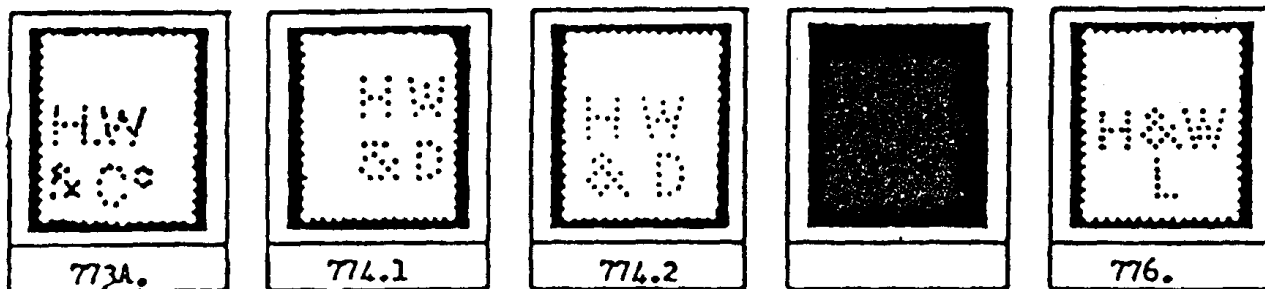
Japanese Perfins

TILLES CATALOGUE SUPPLEMENT

The Tilles catalogue is, in my view, the most important of our publications. It is difficult to see how any serious perfinist can manage without it. Comprising as it does some 600 pages, it is expensive to produce, which, no doubt, is why so few were sold.

For those who do not possess a copy, it may be helpful to see the format:



Each page has 30 spaces, with blanks where dies are known, or suspected, to exist. On the opposite page (the reverse of the previous page) are serial numbers, written designation and user, where known.

The proposed supplement is in two parts:

- (a) dies which can be inserted in the blanks in the present edition.
- (b) dies for which no such space exists.

Obviously for those without the present edition there is really no difference between these.

At the start of the supplement we need to consider the best format. This will depend on how one uses the catalogue. I have used it as an album; obviously I thus lose the illustrations. It seems to me that we have the following options :-

- A. As at present, with 30 spaces per page. If blank pages were prepared these could contain either all the new illustrations (for those who do not have the first edition) or just the ones for which no spaces are available in the first edition (for those who have).
- B. Pages with 6 spaces for illustrations per page, with spaces for a stamp under each illustration.
- C. Pages with 6 spaces for illustrations per page, with two spaces for stamps alongside plus space for user's name and address (or notes

D. Pages with 6 spaces for illustrations per page, with four spaces for stamps alongside

All these could be prepared in "blank" form so that the illustrations could be stuck in. This is not too laborious since only a few will be sent out at any one time.

The printing of written identity plus user on the reverse is, I feel, not really necessary and certainly adds to the cost. As nearly all of us possess the Identities Catalogue, as it is sent with the Bulletin, that is surely sufficient in the case of A., B., and D. Obviously a mark could be added to identified dies so that reference could be made to the Identities Catalogue.

The preparation of these pages would be rather costly as they need to be on good quality paper. At the present time only nine members have shown any interest, so perhaps the whole idea will fall to the ground. I imagined that even those without the first edition would welcome the supplement, but am obviously wrong.

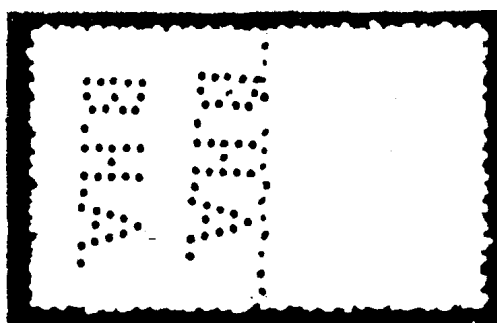
Finally, my real goal is to produce a completely new edition of the catalogue, but I realise it would be very expensive and the idea is likely to remain a pipe-dream.
