The Woodlea Melrose Gardener's Corner

The Successful Fall Garden

It is late August in Phoenix Arizona and that can mean but one thing; that the fall growing season is about to launch! By now everyone should be thinking about just what sorts of lovely lettuces, kales, cabbages, beets, peas, escaroles, onions and the like will go into their gardens. This is also a great time to put your fall tomato and pepper transplants in. Given our warming fall and winter, there is no reason not to enjoy excellent tomatoes at Thanksgiving and Christmas. The next volley of plantings are things to be direct-sown; bush and pole beans; bok choy, cabbage, Chinese cabbage, scallions, cucumbers, summer squash, kale, leeks, lettuce, beets. I also cheat at this time of year and direct sow basil, whose success will depend entirely on what the weather does. It is frost tender, so planting it now is a gamble. But given increasingly warm fall and winter weather,

why not?

Given the progressively warming weather here, many gardeners have tremendous success using both transplants and carefully timed direct-sowing. I am a firm believer in planting transplants, which I find better able to stand up to our climate and the challenges presented by pests and minimal rain. In particular, there are a few keys to success for fall gardening here in Woodlea Melrose: preparing your soil carefully and picking the right varieties for transplants and direct-sowing.

Soil preparation: Compost is king! Choose a quality compost and or composted manure and dig 4-6" of it into your beds prior to planting. Given that the fall crops are mainly leafy greens that need nitrogen I add composted manure and organic fertilizer when I prepare the soil to stagger the nitrogen available to the plants over time. The organic fertilizer gets the plants off to a good start and the compost provides nitrogen over the growing season.

Picking the right transplants: Choose healthy transplants of varieties that you like and that do well in our climate. For the tomatoes and peppers, that means short season varieties. For the fall transplants like broccoli, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts and the like? Slow bolting/heat resistant varieties. Above all seek out good-looking transplants. Green foliage free from yellow spots, yellow margins, or black spots or other signs of distress. Check the roots in their pots. Look for healthy, full root systems and avoid transplants whose roots have race-tracked around the pot and are pot-bound.

Consider growing your own transplants: This is by far the most cost-effective approach. By picking your own seed and growing your own seedlings, you can reduce the per-plant cost by a factor. The relevant equipment (heat mats, seedling flats, grow lights and timers) is a minor expense when averaged out over the years you will use the stuff. And you can time your transplants to allow easier succession planting through the fall and winter season. As in, one can plant six cabbage or broccoli seedlings every 4 weeks to stagger the harvest and not produce too much of any one thing at a time. I tend to use this approach since it is a rare person who needs 8 or 12 cabbages at once. Growing your own bedding plants with annual flower seeds is also hugely economical.

Seed selection for direct-sowing: What do you like? What have you grown here that did well in our climate? Do you or your family have favorite varieties of certain vegetables or things that you simply must plant? Get the seeds out and get to planting. Also seek out seeds for favorite vegetables that are pricey and that you don't buy very often as a result. Sometimes the culture of those vegetables is surprisingly easy and will allow you to enjoy your favorites far more often.

Herbs and flowers: The fall growing season is herb season here in Woodlea Melrose. Once the temperatures drop below 100, herbs such as cilantro, chervil, dill, fennel and parsley can be direct-sown. They all provide wonderful flavors for your kitchen and necessary nutrition for our swallowtail butterfly caterpillars and other pollinators here. Succession sow these as well to extend the harvest. Fall flowers can be planted as well once September and cooler temperatures arrive. Sweet peas, morning glory, California poppies, clarkia, alyssum, lobelia, stock, pansy, petunias, snapdragons.

Hope that everyone uses their imagination and plants at least two new things this fall. You may surprise yourself!




Irrigation News

We are so fortunate to live in the oasis in the desert that is Woodlea-Melrose. This is due, in a large part, to the wonderful irrigation system we have in place in our beautiful neighborhood. Unlike many other neighborhoods in the Valley, we have the added benefit of hiring irrigation experts to handle the release and dispersement of the water to each property. Les and Robin do a wonderful job of keeping everything in check, but we each have responsibility too! Here are so tips to help you 'navigate the waters':

- If you are doing construction please be aware of irrigation lines underground. The pipes are old and fragile; any breaks or damage to pipes or valves are the homeowner's responsibility. Please contact a member of the Irrigation Board for information or service provider recommendations (480-529-7330).
- Each property must maintain clear waterways, and berms high enough to ensure you receive your complete allotment of water. Robin and Les run the water to fill each individual yard, and this becomes harder to manage or gauge when water overflows from one yard to another.
- For scheduling purposes, irrigation generally runs between February November. Irrigator fees are due to Renee Cooperman by President's Day in February. The schedule is posted in the SRP box on the corner of Heatherbrea and 11th, and you can also check online via: https://water.srpnet.com/quickview/schedule and searching for our subdivision schedule using number 960076.
- If there is a problem during irrigation, please try your best to flag down our irrigators Les or Robin. If they are unavailable, you may contact a member the Irrigation Board.
