AGUA FRESCA – ERIN HAGEMAN (MACKENZIE)

Newsflash: It gets REALLY hot in the summer here in Phoenix. We've got a solid 4 - 5 months of high temps staring us in the face, and even though a lot of us have survived many summers, it never seems to get any easier. Luckily, we've got a few pools close to us that can help us fight back against the fiery summer sun.



ENCANTO PUBLIC POOL 2125 N. 15th Ave. 602-261-8732

What's better than a cool pool on a hot day? One that you don't have to maintain!

All 29 of Phoenix's City pools opened Memorial Day Weekend and will stay open through July 31. Encanto pool is one of a few City pools that will be open on weekends in August through Labor Day and it's right down the street from us. Pools are open daily from 1 to 7pm except Fridays.

Daily admission at city pools is \$3 for adults, and \$1 for children and seniors. A season pass for a family of four costs \$75 (\$7 for each additional family member), while an adult season pass is \$30 and a child/senior pass is \$20.

Admission at 20 pool locations, including Encanto, is free for children age 17 and younger through the Kool Kids program, which provides a safe and healthy alternative to youth in at-risk neighborhoods. That program is made possible thanks to Major League Baseball's Milwaukee Brewers, who call the city's Maryvale Baseball Park home during spring training. The franchise donated \$47,103, the proceeds from its April 4 game.

The City of Phoenix also offer affordable swimming lessons, lifeguard safety, and other classes. Registration is available online.



CLARENDON POOL

401 West Clarendon Avenue 602-252-7363

If you're interested in throwing on your oversized sunglasses and lounging like it's your job, the Clarendon pool is right down the street. This boutique hotel boasts an impressive pool area with a 20-foot-tall glass water wall, underwater speakers, water jet massagers, a Jacuzzi that accommodates more than 50 people, and bubbling fountains. At night, the pool lights up as nearly a thousand stars become illuminated on the pool bottom. Should I mention that there's also a bar inside that serves cold drinks and Otter Pops?

You can enjoy daily pool membership without being a hotel guest for \$10 / day Mon – Thur and \$25 / day Fri – Sun. and you can also rent cabanas for up to 8 people. When the sun is relentless, take a mini staycation down the street.

SPLISHIN' & SPLASHIN' – PATTI KARNES (9th Ave)

Summer is here!!! Around our house, school is out and with daily 100 degree temps right around the corner we have already begun plotting ways to stay cool. As best described by Olaf (Frozen) "The hot and the cold are both so intense, put 'em together it just makes sense!"

For us, splash pads have been the way to go! I have always loved the idea of visiting splash pads compared to pools. When you have a kid who does not yet swim on her own, visiting a pool can be exhausting. By going to splash pads you can relax knowing there is no standing water, yet kids can still cool off. And, maybe most importantly, the kids can burn some energy off



on long summer days. Over the years we have taken advantage of just about every splash pad in the metro area.

Phoenix provides a plethora of pads in fun locations and most importantly for this frugal mom, almost all are FREE! We've compiled a list of our favorite options within 20 minutes of our 'hood and we hope you can find some relief from the heat, too!

Scottsdale Quarter tops our list every year. We love that it's shaded, offers plenty of seating and is located right next to a candy shop and True Foods restaurant. Great way to cool off and maybe even get in some shopping.

Location: 15037 N Scottsdale Rd, Scottsdale 85254 Hours: Opens daily in summer at 10 am

For those who prefer a park atmosphere, the splash pad at Altadena Park has proven to be an awesome spot. This park offers a splash pad, playground, ramada, picnic areas with grills and plenty of shade. The only downside is there are no restrooms. We have found going here on Saturdays is best, cool down at park and then less than a 1 minute drive away is the Roadrunner Park Farmers Market (3502 E. Cactus Rd, Phoenix, AZ 85032 - June thru September hours 7 am 'till 11 am)

Location: 3711 E Altadena Ave, Phoenix 85028 Hours: 10 am until 7 pm Monday thru Saturday (closed Sundays)

Even though this one is not free, Enchanted Island Amusement Park is super convenient (less than a five minute drive from our house). You can purchase a "Splash Band" required for any kid over 1 year old for \$5.00 or if you want to take advantage of the amusement rides \$10.00 to \$17.00 for an "All Day Park Pass". Enchanted Island offers multiple rides, carnival fare and is located within Encanto Park.

Location: 1202 W. Encanto Blvd, Phoenix 85007

Hours: Closed Monday and Tuesdays. Open Wednesday and Thursday from 9 am until 1 pm / Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 9 am until 1 pm and 5 pm until 9:30.

For another option close by, there is CityScape located in the heart of downtown. Although this play area is limited there are a few advantages - totally free with plenty of shopping dining options nearby, shaded seating area, free two hour parking and accessible by light rail. We have found this is a good way to take a chunk out of a long summer day and my girl loves taking the "train" (light rail) there and back.

Location: 1 E. Washington St. Phoenix 85004 Hours: Open daily from 9 am until 8 pm

This one again is not actually free, but if you have a yearly membership to the Phoenix Zoo, its two splash areas are great ways to spend a summer afternoon! The Leapin' Lagoon is perfect for babies and toddlers. Play area includes splash pad, shaded

seating, changing stations and pirate ship playground fun. For the kids over 5, Yakuza Caverns is the best! Splash area on the outside with fun cave to explore that includes "stalagmites and stalactites" and water slide. This area also has changing stations, shaded seating and a bonus: cavern cafe.

For a really fun summer night, don't miss out on the two "Prowl and Play" events happening this summer June 11th and August 6th from 5:30 until 9:30 pm. Each year "Prowl and Play" offers water games, storytelling, character meet and greets and much, much more. On these nights there is added bonus for adults the Tiki Bar, grab a cool glass of beer or wine and relax!

Location: 455 North Galvin Parkway, Phoenix 85008 Hours: June 1st thru August 31st open daily from 7 am until 2 pm

For a brand new option, we cannot wait to try out the splash pad at The Orchard! We're excited that this location is so close (Glendale and 12th St). The Orchard is an urban concept venue that will include Luci's Healthy Marketplace (their new second location), Pamelo restaurant and Splurge, an ice cream parlor and candy shop. I dropped by last month and was floored at how gorgeous this location is. The land used to be an old citrus farm in the early 1900s that the new owners converted into an adaptive reuse property. This location not only offers a free splash pad but also a large, lush lawn for picnics. The splash pad opened recently and Splurge is slated to open in the coming weeks.

Splurge is slated to open the first week of June and the pad will be open during their business hours. For a more complete list of local splash areas, check out this article from AZ Central. Found tons of other locations that we are looking forward to visiting!

Location: 7100 N 12th St, Phoenix 85020 Hours: TBD. The splash pad is now open daily, times vary.

Phoenix is hot (most of the time). Ice cream is cold and delicious (always). With these simple truths in mind, it follows that ice cream should be popular and available in abundance in Phoenix. We have lots of local choices close to us including Mary Coyle's, Melt and Nami but one of my personal favorites is Churn.

Churn has incredibly rich ice cream in flavors like Madagascar Vanilla and Vietnamese Coffee that can be served along with homemade cookies, pretzel cones and waffle cones. The store also offers nostalgic candy (Astropops or Abba Zabba, anyone??).

In my humble opinion, one of the best creations is the Fat Elvis, an over-the-top combination of peanut butter ice cream, salted caramel, banana, whip cream and chocolate rocks. It's good – so, so good.

Churn has generously given up a coupon for a free scoop! Print this out and try them out the next time you're melting on a 115 degree day.



CANALSCAPE UPDATE – KERRY WILCOXON


The City of Phoenix is rapidly progressing towards completion of the first segment of the Grand Canalscape Multi-use Trail in east-central Phoenix. In 2014, the city received funding from Salt River Project (SRP) to build Phase I of the project between 15th Avenue and 16th Street and between Garfield to Van Buren Streets. Then in 2015, the city received federal funding for Phase II, the completion of the trail between I-17 and Tempe. Together Phases I and II are now being designed as the Grand Canalscape East Segment, part of the larger Grand Canalscape Master Plan.



Once the entire Canalscape is complete, the city will have a contiguous trail along the Grand Canal between Glendale and Tempe. The vision for the Grand Canalscape originated with Arizona Forward who remains actively involved in the planning of the project. The project is also an off-shoot of the recently completed ReinventPHX community outreach effort.

The overall goal of the Grand Canalscape Project is two-fold. Develop a safe route for bicycle

and pedestrian traffic along the Grand Canal bank that includes crossings facilities at the major streets.

Re-integrate the canals into the surrounding communities to provide better visibility, access and ultimately appreciation of the canal system in Phoenix.

The East Segment is under design now with the original Phase I portion of the project tentatively scheduled for start of construction in early 2017 and the remaining portion of East Segment scheduled to start construction one year later in early 2018.

All portions of the Grand Canalscape will eventually be built with the same set of common features, including:

10-12 foot concrete pathway

Signalized crossings of major streets

Pedestrian lighting

Neighborhood connections

It is the hope of the City of Phoenix, SRP, and Arizona Forward that once complete, the Grand Canalscape will encourage greater use of the canal banks and a greater appreciation of the important role the canals, and the water they provide, play in the past, present and future of our great city.
