#### Branch History Episode VII – The Seventies As recorded in the Branch's publication "Fiftieth Anniversary 1929 – 1979"

"The Madison Branch weathered the stormy sixties and carried on into the seventies, a time of reflection, reaction and adjustment. Environment, Economics, Education and E.R.A. were the focal points. Study groups evolved and devolved as branch members explored Cultural Interests; We the People; Crisis in Education; This Beleaguered Earth; and A Dollar's Worth."

Branch members became active locally most particularly with the Passaic River Coalition and the Madison Conservation Commission. "Sandra Fulda's efforts for This Beleaguered Earth gained the Branch a voice in the environmental impact study for a proposed Madison industrial park, the development of the Dodge Estate and the Morris County Planning Board." Three members – Sandra Fulda, Dawn Smith and Dodie Clark - were appointed by the Mayor to serve on the Madison Environmental Commission. Members also continued the tutoring program and sponsorship of the New Teachers Luncheon. Several members were trained in administering the Gesell Test for School Readiness in 1973. Science-in-a-Shoebox was sponsored at the Madison Public Library. Shoeboxes, each containing a scientific experiment, were prepared for use by the children.

#### **Branch History (continued)**

Study groups played very prominently in the life of the Branch. Recent Grads studied topics such as media, education, creativity and nutrition. Long-term group members admitted to no longer truly being "recent grads". We also had very active Gourmet Group and Reading Group.

The January 1973 bulletin asked, "Ladies: are you toying with the idea of going back to work?" There was a large turnout for programs that focused on women *Returning Education*, *Changing Work Patterns* and Drew's Continuing Education for Women Program. This led to creation of a new study group – Women: Searching for Self. These aspirations led to membership decline (although in 1979 membership totaled 224) and difficulty filling the Board positions. In 1977 the Branch had its first co-presidents – Joslin Leonardson and Pat Harris.

The Book Sale continued although the chairmen had difficulty finding enough volunteers for this important fundraiser. Each bulletin included a notice appealing for help with sorting, pricing and selling as in those days the Book Sale was a yearround project. Pricing was done at the barn on Greenwood Avenue and the Community House. A dedicated group of members headed by Mary Pickin researched some of the special books hoping to find valuable titles. Calendar sales supplemented the costs of sending members to conferences.

The Branch celebrated the Bicentennial with a float depicting the Tempe Wick house in Madison's parade. Members also researched the history of local women of 1776. Creative Arts Night programs featured play readings, crafts, and musical presentations by our members. This decade focused on program topics such as  $21^{st}$  Century-Environmental Protection; a study of Alvin Toffler's <u>Future Shock</u>; Tax Reform in NJ; A Perspective on the Modern Middle East presented by Dr. Vivian Bull; and Threat to National Security – China vs. U.S.
