#### Branch History Episode VIII – The Eighties

As noted in our history, "Many of the themes studied in the 70s were still of concern to us during the 80s. More women were working outside the home and continuing their education, which was reflected in the AAUW suggested study topics (two every two years)." **Highlights for the decade:** 

> Examples of the AAUW study topics were *Take* Hold of Technology, Families Facing Change, and Women's Work/Women's Worth.

The early 1980s saw strong national support for the Equal Rights Amendment, so several branch programs focused on the topic.

In 1987 men became eligible to join AAUW – George Alvey joined the branch in 1992.

A biennial creative arts festival showcased the talents of our members.

Three new study groups were formed – Art Appreciation, German Conversation, and Mixed Media. However, Recent Grads, Play Reading and French Conversation disbanded. The reconstituted Gourmet Group was very popular including husbands and friends.

Our annual Pot Luck Dinner began in 1981 to kickoff the year; the Annual May Dinner continued with the highest attendance in 1983 when it was held in the Great Hall of Drew (105 members and guests attended).

Volunteerism was a theme of the decade with many of our members actively involved with other local organizations including the Friends of the Library, YMCA, Cheshire Home and the

Environmental Commission. Members assumed local elected and appointed offices at all levels. In 1986 Nancy Schaenen served as the first female chair of Drew University's Board of Trustees.

The December meeting usually featured music and we traveled to different venues – Acorn Hall, Macculloch Hall, and the "Castle" (home to General Drafting in Convent).

Fundraisers included the annual book sale held at Drew University, silent auctions, theater trips, wine and cheese parties and sale of calendars. Members sorted and priced over 30,000 books each year with much of the work done in the basement of 42 Cook Avenue.

In 1983 the branch membership directory was expanded when members chose to add adescriptive line or two about their current employment, previous experiences, etc.

The Legal Advocacy Fund was established in the early 1980s aiding women in high education to deal with sex discrimination. In 1988 AAUW's Educational Foundation celebrated 100 years of AAUW Fellowship Grants.

The Branch continued to award scholarships to the woman graduate with the highest average at each local high school. The Mature Women Grant program was established in 1984 to assist local women over age 25 in continuing their education.

Membership declined since women had less free time. The branch staffed tables at Chatham's Fishawack Day and Madison's Bottle Hill Day.

The Branch supported AAUW's newly-formed Judith Resnik American Fellowship Endowment named after the astronaut killed in the 1986 Challenger space shuttle explosion.

#### **Branch Commitments:**

# The Tech Trek planning Team needs each branch that sends girls in their communities to commit to the following:

- Select an interview Chair for your branch/county/area (can be combined branches and/or chairs). County Chair(s) will:
  - a. Recruit volunteers to conduct interviews including supporting the nominees through the process of providing follow up with schools, teachers, and parents to ensure paperwork is submitted by deadlines.
  - b. Maintain parent contact information for future meetings and camper appearances. Notification of requests and interactions with campers will be made to the Tech Trek leadership Team before campers/parents are contacted in accordance with POM.
- Provide at least one volunteer during camp week to help with daily needs. This includes day counselors and dorm moms. We provide overnight accommodations and meals for all volunteers. Also, we always need help "packing out" camp on the last day, which will be Saturday, August 1, 2020.
- 3. Provide monetary support through one of the following:
  - a. Branch Fundraiser
  - b. Writing a grant; for example, an AAUW Community Grant, NJ Charitable Trust, businesses/organizations. We provide templates and boilerplate text.
  - c. Donations to the AAUW NJ Charitable Trust
- 4. Provide any additional support a camper from your area may need. Examples: helping to coordinate transportation, lending a sleeping bag, camp supplies or other expenses.

There have been many successes in 2019 so far! Eleven states have passed fair pay laws in 2019 thanks to the advocacy of AAUW members throughout the U.S. AAUW member advocacy was pivotal in the passage of the U.S. Paycheck Fairness Act by the U.S. House of Representatives in March. AAUW has trained over 102,000 women nationwide, to ask for the salary they deserve either through Work Smart online or in-person workshops thanks to a large grant from Coca-Cola.

It was very inspiring to come together to hear what other branch members are doing and motivate each other for exciting programming and to carry out AAUW's vision for a bold future!


