
## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

on a paved driveway, is a large source of the problem. This lifestyle is not only a source of climate change, but has led to a consumer- economy/society not

ecologically minded.

Another aspect of our lifestyle is the ubiquitous plastic water bottle. When did the need for constant hydration become another American Dream? Was it just a marketing scheme? If it is in fact true that we do require that much water, why does it have to be bottled in plastic? And what's wrong with FREE tap water? It was not so long ago, in 1973, that the Polyethylene terephthalate (PET) bottle was patented, the first plastic bottle to withstand the pressure of carbonated liquids. Since then, PET plastic has replaced glass as preferred material for single-purpose water containers, detergent bottles, shampoo, etc. Now, dozens of shoppers load cartons of plastic-wrapped goods into their carbon producing vehicles. Since only 5% of all the plastic we diligently recycle is actually recycled, where does the rest go? Have you seen the vast wasteland of plastic islands in the ocean? Some progress - we eliminated the single use plastic bag, mostly.

What else can we do?

Let's resolve to stop the use of nearly all plastics - drink tap water, don't buy any product in a plastic bottle. If we buy the alternatives, we ill reduce the demand for such things as salad dressing or cleaning agents or drinks in plastic containers, and persuade manufacturers to stop using them.

Let's also resolve to re-think the American Dream. We can still dream of owning our own home but it needn't be a single family home in the middle of a huge grassy lawn. Consider native plantings. Consider a condo or an ADU (accessory dwelling unit) where an adult child, or an aging parent can live nearby.

Lastly for 2024, let's resolve to consume a plant- based diet a few times a week as the most effective way to reduce greenhouse gases from raising meat. Ann Huber
