Eagle Place Apartments set to open in October

Eagle Place Apartments, in the former Loogootee Elementary East building, are scheduled to start accepting tenants in October of this year. The 20 units, 10 downstairs and 10 upstairs, are an equal combination of one- and two-bedroom and range from 700 to 1,100 square feet.

Eagle Place Apartments are designed for senior citizens and are owned by Hoosier Uplands. The building also had a community room, grandkids play room and gym on the first floor. There will not be an elevator installed so stairs will have to be utilized by upstairs residents.

The downstairs lockers and trophy case will be kept intact and the name "Loogootee Elementary East" out in front of the building will remain along with the cross on the left, front of the school.

These scholarships give preference to helping a student begin or return to college or trade school, years after leaving high school. The two scholarships and criteria are below.

Martin County Non-Traditional Scholarship

This scholarship is for non-traditional students who meet the following criteria:

Must be a resident of Martin County Must have graduated or left high school at least one year prior to applying for the scholarship

Must seek to further their education at an accredited college, university, vocational or trade school

Must demonstrate a need for assistance.

The Second Door Scholarship is named after the saying "When one door closes, another one opens..."

This scholarship is for non-traditional students who meet the following criteria:

Must be a resident of Martin County Must have graduated or left high school at least two years prior to applying for the scholarship

Must demonstrate a financial need
The scholarship cannot be used for
GED test fees

The scholarship cannot exceed the cost of course and course materials

Applicant must provide evidence of program acceptance

Program must be administered by a qualified institution/organization.

Each apartment is equipped with its own laundry area, kitchen (with energy efficient appliances), and closets. The floors will remain as they were in the school except for areas where the floor had to be dug out or leveled. Vinyl floor will be put down in those areas.

According to David Miller, Chief Executive Officer of Hoosier Uplands, they have already started receiving inquiries from senior citizens interested in leasing an apartment. Miller said that the monthly rent has not been decided however the rent amount is determined by the government, based on income. Each unit will have their own electric meter and residents will be responsible for utility bills.

Hoosier Uplands purchased Elementary East from the Loogootee School Corporation for \$110,000 in 2014. Hoosier Uplands did not receive the gymnasium in the sale and it will remain in possession of Loogootee Schools, to be used for school sports and activities. The renovations for Eagle Place Apartments will cost around \$2 million and is partially funded through a \$500,000 grant from the Federal Home Loan Bank of Indianapolis, received in 2015, with the remaining from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Investment Partnerships Program.

Hoosier Uplands, based in Mitchell, also owns Larkin Apartments in Loogootee along with apartments in Paoli, Salem, Mitchell, Orleans, Campbellsburg, Bedford and Marengo.

Hoosier Uplands is a non-profit agency that serves as an Area Agency on Aging, Community Action Agency, licensed Home Health Care and Hospice agency, and Community Housing Development Organization.



Extension food safety specialist: Consumers can be confident about Indiana melon crop

Following the recall of pre-cut melon products sold in eight states - including Indiana - due to possible Salmonella contamination, Scott Monroe, Purdue Extension food safety educator, is reassuring consumers about the safety of the state's melon crop.

"The recalled melons were grown elsewhere," Monroe said. "The 2018 Indiana cantaloupe and watermelon crops are planted and growing in the southwestern part of the state, but are not yet ready for harvest."

Indiana producers take food safety very seriously, he added.

"There are a variety of practices that reduce the risk of contamination at the farm level," Monroe said. "Among these are testing irrigation water, use of sanitizers in wash water, and employee training programs."

Amanda Deering, clinical assistant professor in Purdue's Department of

Food Science, noted that most Indiana watermelons and cantaloupes are produced on farms where food safety practices are monitored by third-party audits.

"Growers are audited annually to ensure that they are implementing and maintaining aggressive food safety programs on their farms," she said. "In most cases, the requirements of the third-party audits are more stringent than current Food and Drug Administration guidelines."

Monroe said Hoosier melon producers were looking forward to safe, bountiful crop.

"Our Indiana growers are doing everything they can to reduce the risk of on-farm contamination by a foodborne pathogen to the lowest possible level," he said. "In spite of the recent recall, watermelon and cantaloupe lovers across the state will be able to purchase and enjoy Indiana melons with confidence once the 2018 crop is ready for harvest."

Participants sought for DNR Community Hunting Access Program coordinator training

The DNR is seeking people to participate in training on July 11 to become a coordinator for the Community Hunting Access Program (CHAP).

CHAP is an initiative through the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife to increase hunting opportunities for deer in urban and suburban areas. Doing so can help alleviate human-deer conflicts. CHAP provides community partners with financial and technical assistance to administer hunting programs in their communities.

As part of the program, managed hunts are administered by a certified CHAP coordinator trained in hunting safety, deer biology and public relations. The community partner determines when and where managed hunts occur, what hunters can participate, and which certified CHAP coordinator they use or contract.

Training for people interested in becoming a certified CHAP coordinator will take place on July 11. Before attending training, those interested in becoming a CHAP coordinator must complete the following prerequisites:

- 1) Any state-sponsored Hunter Education certification.
- 2) Any DFW-Approved Firearms In-

structor Training. Examples include: National Rifle Association (NRA) Firearm Instructor Training, Indiana Hunter Education Instructor Academy, 4-H Shooting Sports Instructor Certification, etc.

3) Any DFW-Approved Formal Deer Hunting Training. Examples include: NRA Hunter Clinic Instructor Program Certification, QDMA Deer Steward 1 Certification, etc.

4) Provide name and birthdate for routine DNR background check.

June 18 to 24 has been proclaimed as Pollinator Week. The fact that pollinators get a whole week of recognition shows just how important they are. Many of our food crops and virtually all of the flowers we enjoy depend on pollinators to produce seed. In the past couple of years, there has been a lot of publicity about pollinators. Much of this publicity comes from various studies that indicate that the number of pollinators is in decline. That is of concern not only for gardeners, but for everyone who eats.

Pollination is the act of carrying the pollen from the anther or male part of a flower to the stigma or female part of another flower. The creator has encoded within every plant the goal of reproducing itself. Pollination is necessary to reach that goal, causing the plant to form seeds, which will germinate and result in the next generation of plants.

In some plants, the pollen is easily released into the air. The pollen is then carried on the wind and enough reaches the desired destination to complete the pollination process. This is the type of pollen that causes the runny noses and itchy eyes that many of us have been experiencing. In general, these plants do not have flowers that are showy. Many trees and all grasses and grain crops are pollinated in this way. That is why it is important to plant corn in blocks instead of one straight row. The block increases the likelihood that the pollen of one plant will reach the stigma of another.

Plants that have showy flowers do not normally release pollen into the air. The pollen of such plants is generally larges than that of wind-pollinated plants and is usually sticky, requiring a pollinator to carry it to another plant. Pollinators take many forms. When you walk through the garden, pollen may stick to you and you may unconsciously transfer it to another plant. Any animal that passes through the garden may do the same. However, the most common pollinators are birds and insects

In general, plants are either monoecious or dioecious. On dioecious plants, all of the flowers are either male or female, so it is absolutely imperative that a pollinator carry the pollen from the male plant to the female to com-

plete pollination. The most known of these dioecious plants in southern Indiana are persimmons and all types of holly. To get fruit on the persimmons or berries on the female hollies, there must be a male plant in the vicinity. Fortunately, plants are not monogamous and a single male plant will produce enough pollen to pollinate several females. Since some pollinators travel relatively long distances, you may not need to have the male yourself as long as there is one in the neighborhood.

Monoecious plants produce both male and female flowers on the same plant or produce perfect flowers. Perfect flowers contain both anthers (male) and stigma (female) parts in a single flower. They are sometimes referenced as bisexual flowers. Pollination in these flowers may occur within a single flower or within different flowers on the same plant. In perfect flowers, the anthers are usually longer than the stigma, which allows the pollen to drop down without the help of a pollinator. However, to keep a population healthy, it is necessary to have some inter-plant pollination. Some plants are choosy about the pollen they accept and will only complete pollination with other plants of the same species. Others are more promiscuous and will accept pollen from other related plants within the same genus or even from closely-related genera. This is important to plant breeders, who use this to create new and more showy plants for our gardens.
