Crane featured Navy researchers in an innovation showcase

Naval Surface Warfare Center, Crane Division (NSWC Crane) featured Navy researchers in the annual Naval Innovative Science & Engineering (NISE) End of Year Showcase on October 2-3 at NSWC Crane. More than two hundred people participated, including attendees from academic and industry partners.

"The NISE End of Year Showcase gives researchers, who are working in critical navy technology areas, visibility from coworkers, academia, and industry," says Brant Ackerman, the Director of NISE Program at NSWC Crane. "In some cases, the researchers have been working on their projects for years within their own teams or departments. The

showcase provides researchers, especially those working in similar or overlapping technology areas, an avenue to come together, learn from each other, and build on their research."

The NISE program provides funding for Basic & Applied Research, Technology Transition, Workforce Development, and Laboratory Revitalization within the Department of Defense (DoD) laboratories to grow internal technical capabilities of the workforce and build critical infrastructure. Ackerman says that at NSWC Crane, the NISE program provides funding for warfighter challenges within Crane's mission areas and thrust technology areas.

"We've seen good things come from successful NISE research projects," says Ackerman. "There are opportunities to patent something new and novel and get a new capability fielded. It's exciting to see all of these projects together in one place."

Dr. Jonathan Dilger, the Director of Research at NSWC Crane, says a portion of NISE provides learning opportunities for the workforce.

"Along with the research projects themselves, a portion of NISE also funds (See 'CRANE' on page two)

Loogootee man arrested for dealing methamphetamine

On Saturday evening October 20, a Martin County Sheriff's Office investigation led to a narcotics interdiction in Loogootee. Plain clothed deputies observed Adam Salmon, 35, allegedly selling suspected methamphetamine in a parking lot. Reserve Deputies Josh Harmon, Jason Greene, Cameron Ochs, Deputy Rob Lents, and Corporal Tyler Reed arrived on scene and detained Salmon. Seized methamphetamine field tested positive. Salmon was arrested and transported to the Martin County Security Center without incident.

The following day, a search warrant was requested through the Martin County Prosecutor Aureola Wright and granted by the Honorable Senior Judge Kenneth Lopp. ISP Trooper Andrew Beaver, Martin County Sheriff's Office Major Keller, and Deputy Lents served the search warrant at Salmon's residence. An additional small amount of methamphetamine and paraphernalia

was found and seized. Salmon is currently being held at the Martin County Security Center on the following charges: dealing in methamphetamine, a Level 4 Felony; possession of methamphetamine, a Level 6 Felony; and possession of paraphernalia, a Class A Misdemeanor.

All suspects are presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

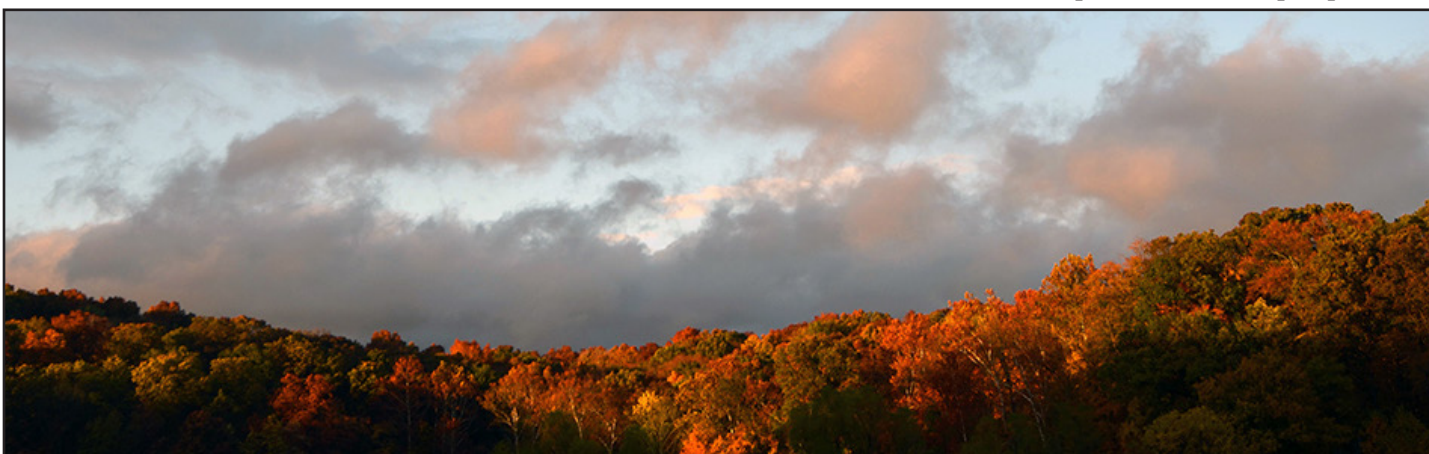

the workforce to pursue advanced degrees while working on novel technology," says Dr. Dilger. "NISE funded research also allows new Crane employees the opportunity to be mentored as they work alongside national technical experts. They are able to work in state-of-the-art technology in thrust areas such as artificial intelligence, machine learning, and advanced microelectronics."

NISE research funds more than seventy projects per year and involves more than 400 employees at NSWC Crane. More than twelve percent of the NSWC Crane workforce was involved in NISE research for FY19. 124 employees that worked on NISE projects have been with Crane for less than three years. NISE guiding policy tells the engineering laboratories to get new employees involved in cutting edge work utilizing NISE funds.

Dr. Dilger says NISE funding gives NSWC Crane the ability to innovate.

"NISE allows us to develop research with uninhibited innovation," says Dr. Dilger. "The output of research is knowledge, which gives the workforce the capacity to create new capabilities for the warfighter. Through events like the Innovation Showcase, we are creating a way to share this knowledge, further collaboration, and better support the warfighter."

Shoals Parent Association to host vendor fair this Saturday

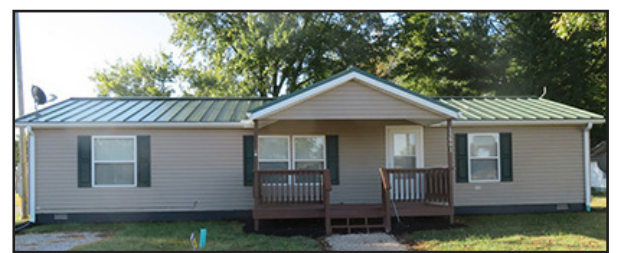

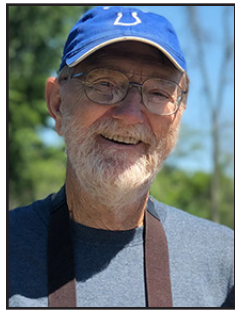
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NEIL CONOVER

AG Curtis Hill warns Hoosiers to be cautious of open-enrollment scams in which private companies offer Medicare to eligible seniors

The open-enrollment period for Medicare coverage in 2020 is October 15, 2019, to December 7, 2019. Attorney General Curtis Hill is warning Hoosiers to take precautions in order to avoid becoming victims of Medicare-related scams.

Here are a few tips to avoid scams this open-enrollment season:

-Government agencies will rarely, if ever, call you. If they do, it will be after they send you a letter – or to return a call you made to them.

-Anyone who tries to sell you Medicare insurance while claiming to be an "official Medicare agent" is a scammer. There are no Medicare sales representatives.

-Be vigilant for mailers that appear to be government communications but are actually advertisements for private companies. These documents sometimes will have a disclaimer, but the disclaimer will be in tiny font. Read carefully!

-The Medicare prescription drug plan (also known as Part D) is voluntary. Ignore anyone who calls saying you must join their prescription plan, or you will lose your Medicare coverage.

-Never give anyone who unexpectedly calls or approaches you, information such as your Medicare, bank account, credit card or Social Security number. Scammers can use your information, steal your identity, get credit in your name, and take your money. Anyone who tells you that you must provide personal information to keep your

coverage is a scammer.

-Don't trust caller ID. Scammers use technology to hide their real numbers and instead show numbers that seem legitimate. So, if the caller ID shows a 202 area code or says "government" or "Washington DC," don't take that at face value. It could be anyone calling from anywhere.

If you need help with Medicare, call 1-800-MEDICARE or go to www.medicare.gov/.

When you receive scam calls, hang up and report the call.

Report Medicare impostors at 1-800-MEDICARE or go to Ftc.gov/complaint.

As always, consumers who believe they are the victims of scam attempts are also asked to report them to the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division by calling 1-800-382-5516 or going online at www.in.gov/attorney-general and clicking the "File a Complaint" box at the bottom of the page.

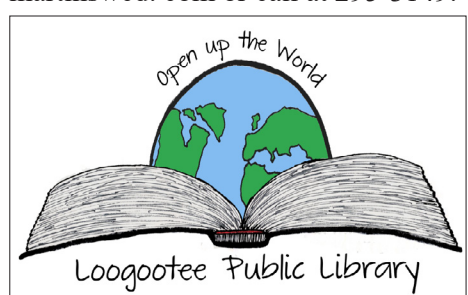

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In the Garden

The weekend rains brought down a lot of leaves. As expected, this has hardly been a banner year for fall color and many leaves have simply fallen without changing color. Still, there have been a few pockets of color to enjoy. The sumacs and maples over the cliff at Sandhill Gardens have provided a beautiful backdrop for some breath-taking sunsets recently.

The next question is what to do with all of those leaves. When I see the piles of leaves, I think of mounds of organic matter to be added to the soil in the many planting beds at Sandhill Gardens. Most of the trees in the gardens are maples, birches and ornamental fruit trees, so the leaves are small and will break down rather easily. I speed up decomposition by chopping them up with the lawn mower and then blowing them into the planting beds. This is the easy way to dispose of fall leaves as long as there are not a lot of walnut trees. Walnut leaves contain juglone, a chemical that inhibits growth in many plants, so walnut leaves should not be used as mulch. Most of the towns in the area will pick up leaves with a vacuum if you rake them to the curb. The day of bagging leaves and hauling them to the dump is over. It is a waste of space in the landfills and a waste of valuable organic matter that would enrich the soil.

Before and after the rains, I managed to get a lot of planting done at Sandhill Gardens. I had purchased many shrubs and perennials on the fall clearance sales and managed to get most of them planted over the weekend. I recently mentioned that I have been using a granular organic fertilizer formulated for stimulating root growth when planting. This formula specifically promotes mycorrhizae. This is a symbiotic association between cer-

tain fungi and the root systems of plants. Scientists are just beginning to understand this complex plant association, which may actually link many different plants in an area in a way that is beneficial to all. Inn mycorrhizal activity, the fungi actually colonize the roots of the host plant. Although we most often associate fungal growth as a bad thing that results in plant diseases of the leaves, the mycorrhizal fungi are very beneficial. The host plant, through photosynthesis, provides certain nutrients for the fungi and the fungi provide many benefits for the host plants.

Although scientists have known about this relationship since the mid-1800's, the study of mycorrhizal associations is a relatively new science, and much of the association is still a mystery. The fungi help the roots to take up certain trace minerals and also make it easier for plants to absorb water. The fungi also seem to be able to remove some pollutants from the soil. The fungi even seem to allow plants in an area to communicate. In some way, a plant that is attacked by an insect or pathogen manages to send a signal to other plants in the mycorrhizal association and they secrete chemicals to guard against the attacking pathogen.

I do not pretend to fully understand mycorrhizal activity, but I have noticed that using this fertilizer when planting has resulted in less transplant shock and better establishment of newly-planted trees and shrubs. It does not take much. I use about a quarter of a cup for each shrub or tree, so a small bag goes a long way. I still use the liquid root stimulator to mix with the water to water the plant at planting time. I believe this combination has resulted in better establishment of plants and getting plants off to a healthier start. I highly recommend this course of action in your garden.

Channel catfish to be stocked across Indiana by November

This fall, DNR will stock over 80,000 channel catfish across Indiana by November.

Stocked catfish will be 8-10 inches in length. District fisheries biologists determine the number of fish to be stocked by the size of the lake and management strategy. These stockings occur annually, or every other year based on expected harvest rates and how many catfish are available.

Channel catfish have strong senses of smell and taste. Common methods of targeting them include cut bait, stink bait, and worms. Channel catfish can also occasionally be caught on artificial lures and minnows.
