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Defense demand signals job growth at Crane

Naval Support Activity Crane, one of Southern Indiana's largest employers with about 6,000 workers, released hiring plans for fiscal year 2019 that include adding over 400 new jobs above attrition for both government and contract employees across multiple disciplines.

The base's two largest commands, Naval Surface Warfare Center, Crane Division and Crane Army Ammunition Activity, will each add to their workforce to meet the demand from the Department of Defense for key activities unique to the technical capabilities, facilities and expertise found at Crane.

Crane Army's vital work in countermeasures, logistics, production and demilitarization of ammunition; coupled with the upcoming opening of the new Crane Flexible Manufacturing Complex later this year means an increased demand for advanced manufacturing workers who receive specialized training for the Army work.

"Due to a large increase in expected workload in both production and logistics operations, CAAA is looking to increase its blue-collar workforce by approximately 45 personnel. The new employees will go through our onboarding process. CAAA doesn't send employees to production lines without an adequate amount of safety and rudimentary ammunition training," said Crane Army's Chief of Staff Joe Mikac.

On the Navy side, NSWC Crane is experiencing a significant increase in workload within each of its mission areas that include Expeditionary Warfare, Electronic Warfare and Strategic Missions, and plans to add 368 new employees in the coming year and backfill 187 jobs based on anticipated attrition. Careers range from engineers and scientists to technicians and business administration.

This increased capacity is a direct result of demand signals from National Defense and Naval strategies that call

on the technical expertise at NSWC Crane, the state's only federal research laboratory, to expand its role in mission-critical challenges facing the U.S. military.

"With our workload on the rise, we are looking for the best and brightest to add to our team," said NSWC Crane Director of Corporate Operations, Dr. Angela Lewis. "Our work is vital to national security, and our staff has proven time and again that Crane has the resources, capabilities and adaptability to meet mission demands-not just for today, but for what's on the horizon."

NSWC Crane will increase its work with Strategic Systems Programs that support the Navy's submarine and missile technologies through engineering and system architecture for power and energy, guidance, navigation and control and also includes imperative work for the nation's new super-speed Hypersonic Missile Program.

Other growth areas include the Surface Electronic Warfare Improvement Program, which provides enhanced capabilities to existing and new ship combat systems to improve missile defense, counter targeting and counter surveillance as well as the rapidly growing field of Counter-Unmanned Aerial Systems that serve to detect, track and defend against drone and other unmanned aircraft.

"As the economic development partnership for the region, we view Crane as a key catalyst for economic growth," said Radius Indiana President and CEO Jeff Quyle. "Adding high-wage, high-skilled jobs makes direct impact on our area's economy, but the way in which Crane engages partner organizations, private industry and academia as part of its collaborative, working team means that growth at the base is only the first wave of positive impact we will see in our region and across the state."

Director Danielle Chrysler of the Indiana Office of Defense Development said the state is actively working to increase awareness of all of its defense assets, "This increase in jobs is evidence of the strong defense sector here in Indiana. The outstanding efforts of the leadership and workforce at Crane strengthen our opportunities on a national level."

Public Law 109-2005 requires Indiana residents to present a government-issued photo ID before casting a ballot at the polls on Election Day.

NOTE: An ID issued by the US Department of Defense, a branch of the uniformed services, the Merchant Marine, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (or Veterans Administration), or the Indiana National Guard is not

required to have an expiration date or may state that the document has an "Indefinite" expiration date.

In most cases, an Indiana driver license, Indiana photo ID card, Military ID or U.S. Passport is sufficient. A student ID from a private institution may not be used for voting purposes. For more Information for College Students visit <https://www.in.gov/sos/elections/2626.htm>. If you are unable or unwilling to present ID meeting requirements, you may cast a provisional ballot. If you cast a provisional ballot, you have until noon 10 days after the election to follow up with the county election board and either provide the necessary documentation or affirm one of the law's exemptions applies to you. 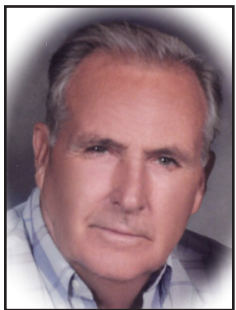

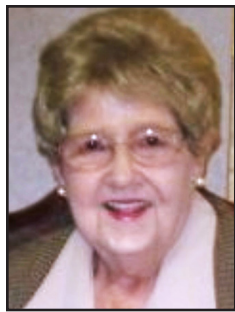
He was a member of the First Methodist Church, in Bedford.

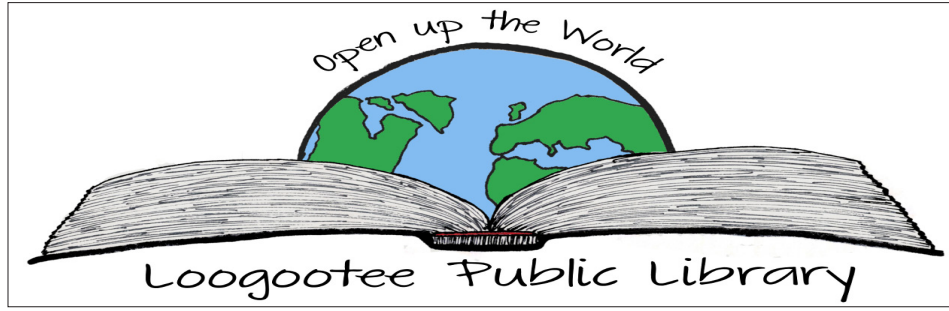

We should hit the peak of fall foliage color this week. As I drove home from church on Sunday, I marveled at the reflection of Tillery Hill in Patoka Lake. It is one of my favorite places to view fall colors.

Actually, most of those beautiful reds, yellows and oranges have been there all summer. The chlorophyll that gives most leaves their green color masks other compounds that have been present in the leaves. As the chlorophyll dissipates, the other compounds show through and we see the colors of autumn. In a few cases, there are some chemical reactions triggered by the cooler temperatures that result in the formation of some new color-giving pigments. That is especially true of the deep purples and burgundies that we enjoy.

In recent columns, we have taken a look at small trees and shrubs that can provide fall color in the home garden. I am happy to report that Sandhill Gardens is ablaze with color right now. Not only are the trees and shrubs party to the show, but many perennials contribute foliage color also.

One of my favorite perennials for fall color is amsonia, also known as Arkansas blue star. This herbaceous perennial acts almost as a shrub. Since spring, it has grown to nearly three feet tall and wide in a nicely rounded

shape. The lime green foliage spotted with blue star-shaped flowers in the spring has now morphed to a lemony yellow. The foliage is feathery, reminiscent of asparagus, so it adds to the garden in both color and texture.

My absolute favorite perennial for fall color is the autumn fern. This hardy fern is appropriately named. Thick mounds of green fronds grace the shade garden all summer. These ferns seem oblivious to the summer weather, surviving hot temperatures and dry spells that decimate most ferns. However, it is in autumn that this fern really shines. The fronds become a beautiful orange and then slowly turn to a rich bronze. Since not all of the fronds change at the same time, there are several autumn shades in a clump at the same time. These wonderful ferns are great plants to repeat throughout a garden to tie the landscape together. They can anchor shade beds or perform as foils to the broad foliage of hostas and hellebores.

Speaking of hostas and hellebores, these perennials also provide fall color. Most hosta leaves turn to a deep gold. Hellebores seem to get even darker green as the temperatures cool. The deep green makes the more traditional fall colors pop just a little bit more.

In recent years, many new varieties of coral bells have been developed. Some of them have colorful foliage throughout the year but fall brings some changes that are fun to see. Our native geraniums also provide splashes of deep red, especially a cultivar known as bloody cranesbill.

Fall foliage color is fleeting, so be sure to get out this week and enjoy the beauty.

I was saddened recently to learn of the death of a dear friend and garden pal, Marcia Killough. Marcia had dared to turn her town lawn into a wildflower garden and we often traded seeds and plants. She also was fond of hens and chicks and had several different varieties to share with friends. For many years, she kept her fruit and vegetable scraps for my compost bins. I will truly miss her. There is no better tribute to Marcia than to plant more wildflowers in my meadow.

Make reserved-hunt reservations through new online application

The Indiana DNR's reserved-hunt applications can now be made through the Division of Fish & Wildlife's online-services application at: <https://secure.in.gov/apps/dnr/portal/#/home>.

You can use the same website to purchase hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses, use the Check-in Game system, get a HIP Registration number, make a donation, or purchase a gift certificate.

You do not have to log in to an account to register for a reserved hunt or to purchase a put-and-take pheasant hunt — just click on “Register Now” on the reserved-hunt link. If you wish to use a gift certificate to help pay for a put-and-take hunt or see the full histo-

ry of your past reserved-hunt registrations, you will need to have an online account.

As in the past, registering for a reserved hunt still requires the applicant to have a valid hunting license.

For draw-hunt results, there is a “Click Here” link on the home page, or you can log in to your account to see the results. The link from the home page (without logging in) will only show hunts that you have registered for when the date of the hunt is still upcoming.

Scientists, high school students find new pathogens hiding in Indiana ticks

Almost anyone spending time outdoors knows about the link between ticks and Lyme disease. But there may be far more lurking in tick bites than previously thought, including a number of pathogens that have recently come to light and hundreds of bacteria that could play significant roles in bite victims' health and outcomes.

“Climate change is expanding tick ranges, and we're spending more time in tick habitats all the time,” said Cate Hill, a Purdue professor of entomology and vector biology. “As we come into more contact with ticks, we increase the likelihood of being bitten and contracting a tick-borne disease. We're finding that it's not just one microbe these ticks could pass on to us. It's like a little microbe party in there, and we need to figure out how their interplay can affect human health.”

To build that understanding, Hill and scientists in her lab have created the Tick INsiders program, which involves collecting Indiana ticks throughout the year to map not only the bacteria and viruses at one point in time, but to track how these change throughout the year and throughout the state. Thirteen high school students have been trained to help with the project and have been collecting ticks since the spring of 2018.

They've found three types of ticks — the blacklegged deer tick, the lone star tick and the American dog tick. Those arachnids are capable of transmitting nine different pathogens that cause human illnesses, though not all have not been diagnosed in the state. The Indiana State Department of Health reports more

than 100 cases of Lyme disease each year and dozens of cases of Ehrlichiosis and Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

Scientists suspect that the severity of illnesses and human immune response can vary based on the cocktail of microbes — bacteria, viruses and pathogens — passed from tick to bite victim. It has been estimated that about 25 percent of ticks are co-infected with the bacteria and parasites that cause Lyme disease and Babesia, for example. And other pathogens maybe in the mix in those or other ticks.

“It's not ‘one tick bite, one disease,’” Hill said. “It's one tick bite with a unique complement of different microbes and pathogens, and we need to understand that diversity. We don't know which of these pathogens and how many are transferred when ticks bite, how our bodies react, and how the interplay between our immune system and multiple microbes might affect disease outcome.”

So far, the Tick INsider program's collections have identified hundreds of bacteria. These may include pathogens known to cause human illness, including several bacteria that cause Lyme disease. Scientists are looking at as many as 100 different bacteria that may be pathogenic.

“We already know that there is risk of contracting Lyme disease around the state — in any of Indiana's 92 counties,” Hill said. “We're looking for all the stuff that hasn't been found yet but may show up at some point.”

Knowing what's out there, and in us, may be useful for doctors who need to know the best way to treat tick-borne illnesses that affect patients in sometimes unique ways.

“This deep dive will help us to design comprehensive diagnostics that test for hundreds of potential pathogens and enable doctors to prescribe patient-specific treatment regimes — that is personalized medicine for tick-borne diseases,” Hill said.

Eight student scientists involved with the Tick INsider program spent Friday (October 19) on campus learning about the analysis done on the ticks they find. They toured labs that perform DNA analysis of each tick, identifying the types of viruses and bacteria present, as well as the Purdue Bioinformatics Core, where the data are analyzed.

The Tick INsider program will take application for new students in early January. And Hill said she hopes soon to expand the program so that any Indiana resident can become trained to collect and send in ticks.
