PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department now has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti will not use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

NEW YEAR'S EVE SAFETY TIPS



Message from Councilwoman Ann O'Brien

In a response to two letters sent to the Department of Justice (DOJ) via the City's outside counsel, and likely as a result of my op-ed and last week's AZCentral article, the DOJ has doubled down on their refusal to provide the City sufficient time to review the findings before forcing us to commit to an agreement in principle (AIP).

Assistant Attorney General Kristen Clarke of the DOJ's Civil Rights Division told us in a November 29th letter, "In certain circumstances, we may decide to provide a short time for jurisdictions to read the findings report prior to public release – for example, where those jurisdictions commit to an agreement in principle to enter into a consent decree with an independent monitor."

In the past, the "short time" given to jurisdictions who sign an AIP has been 24-48 hours to review, research, and respond back. I am uncertain about how this speaks to the transparency and collaboration the DOJ prides itself on.

As a reminder, the City of Phoenix has opened its doors to the DOJ, knowing we have nothing to hide. We have turned over more than 179,000 documents, 20 terabytes of data, over 22,115 body-worn camera videos, and 220 recordings of 911 calls. We have coordinated more than 200 hours of ride-alongs, 130 interviews with police department and city staff, and allowed our Police Chief and City Manager to be interviewed by the DOJ. We have been transparent and collaborative.

Something AAG Clarke agrees per her letter, stating "The [DOJ] appreciates the cooperation with our investigation . . . we have received from city and police department officials."

But now, when the DOJ is asked to be transparent and collaborative, Assistant Attorney General Clark says, "it is not our practice to provide such pre-release access" and "[w]e do not plan to change our practices regarding any findings report."

It's clear the DOJ's only end game is for all jurisdictions it investigates to enter into a consent decree. In fact, the agreement in principle Louisville committed to and the agreement in principle Minneapolis committed to are word for word — minus the paragraphs related directly to the accusations for each city.

I remain steadfast in my statement that I will sign no documents without first getting to review, research, and respond back to the findings report. 24 to 48 hours is not an adequate amount of time to review – which is why I'm asking for a minimum of 30 days.

Phoenix has been transparent and collaborative, now it's time for the DOJ to do the same.



BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 - 3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

CRIME TIPS:

GIVE GENEROUSLY TO CHARITIES... NOT CRIMINALS

Americans contributed a record \$319.04 billion to charity in 2022, according to the Giving USA Foundation's annual report on U.S. philanthropy. That generosity supports many amazing organizations that put those billions to work for health care, education, environmental protection, the arts and numerous other causes, but it also puts you at risk of giving money to criminals.

HOW IT WORKS

You get a phone call, an email, a direct mail piece or even doorto-door solicitation collecting money for veterans, animals, children in need, victims of natural disasters or other causes.

You may receive a "thank you" email, letter or phone call making you think that you have contributed to a particular cause in the past.

You feel pressured to contribute on the spot.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Sham charities proliferate when big crises appear in the news—whether it's war, famine, climate disaster or other tragedies, all of which happen to be in abundance today.

Many fake charities have legitimate-looking names and websites, making them hard to discern as fraudulent.

While some charity scams are outright fake, others are registered nonprofits but devote little of the money they raise to the programs they raise funds for.

Legitimate charities are not going to ask for gift cards, wire transfers or cryptocurrency as a form of payment.

Legitimate charities welcome contributions and will give you time to think about it rather than pressure you to contribute right away.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Research the charity on sites such as the BBB's give.org, CharityNavigator.org or CharityWatch.org to ensure its legitimacy and to find out how much of the donations are actually used to serve its stated mission versus overhead and fundraising.

Don't give personal and financial information like your Social Security number, date of birth or bank account number to anyone soliciting a donation.

Use a credit card when making your contribution—it's easier to keep track of it and if your card is misused, you have protection from loss.

Pay attention to the charity's name and web address. Criminals often mimic the names of familiar, trusted organizations to deceive donors.

Be wary of links in unsolicited email, text and social media fundraising messages; they can unleash malware on your device.

TRENDING SCAMS WE SAW IN 2023

At the close of each year, AARP Fraud Watch Network looks back at the most prevalent scams. Criminals are always taking advantage of new opportunities. While their tactics evolve, if something proves effective, it tends to stick around.

Here's a rundown of trending scams in 2023 and tips to help steer clear of them.

Identity Fraud

Identity fraud, the fraudulent use of stolen personal information for personal gain, has been a top concern for a third year in a row according to the Federal Trade Commission.

Criminals steal mail, hack corporate databases or use deceptive emails, texts, websites and phone calls designed to convince people to share their information.

They may sell your data to the highest bidder or misuse it to open new accounts in your name, take over existing accounts, or file for federal benefits.

Safeguard yourself by not sharing sensitive information with unsolicited contacts, avoiding clicking on email and text links, and considering setting up fraud alerts or <u>credit freezes</u> on your credit reports.

Impostor Scams

Impostor scams once again come in among the most common scams of this past year

These scams generally start with an unsolicited call, email, text or social media message posing as someone you trust—your bank, a business you know, or even a government agency.

Criminals play on our emotions by creating fear or excitement—your Social Security payments have been paused, there is an issue with your account or you just won a big prize. When we are in this heightened state of emotion, it is hard to access logical thinking.

Don't trust caller ID or links in email or text messages. If you think it might be legitimate, contact the entity using a trusted number.

Investment Fraud

Investment scams were also prevalent, with a burgeoning crime involving human trafficking to enslave frontline "workers" in an investment scam.

This fraud is dependent on striking up friendships online or even through what seem to be texts sent in error and using that contact to methodically build friendship and trust.

Then comes the payoff: They've shown their luxurious lifestyle and explain they can teach you how to invest and make a lot of money, too (whether it's cryptocurrency or gold futures).

The investments are completely fraudulent, and the victims only know this when they fail to be able to withdraw their investment and earnings.

Knowledge gives you power over scams. The <u>AARP Fraud Watch Network</u> equips you with reliable, up-to-date insights and connects you to our free fraud helpline so you can better protect yourself and your loved ones. We also advocate at the state, federal and local levels to enact policy changes that protect consumers and enforce laws.

Community Assistance Program Mission Statement

The City of Phoenix Fire Department Community Assistance Program (CAP) is committed to providing the highest level of on scene crisis intervention, victim advocacy/services, and behavioral health assistance for our community. We strive to provide the best possible service to our internal and external customers. We achieve this by providing comprehensive, quality, crisis intervention and behavioral health training through a collaborative effort with public and private organizations within Maricopa County. Mayor and City Council approved \$15 million in Fiscal Year 2022-2023 to expand the Fire Department's Community Assistance Program (CAP) to add nine Behavioral Health Units and to expand the Crisis Response Units from five units to 10 units to meet the needs of Phoenix residents experiencing a mental health crisis. Additionally, Mayor and Council approved \$10 million in one-time, ARPA grant-funding to expand ongoing mental health resources and services provided to Phoenix residents.

Internship

Internship opportunities are currently being offered to Arizona State University School of Social Work students. CAP offers paid internship for students who successfully apply, complete an interview process, and are selected for the position. Interns must pass the City of Phoenix Fire Department background check. Applications for internships are excepted for Casework Aide positions during specific times of the year. City of Phoenix Lockbox Pilot Program

Residents of Phoenix City Council District One are eligible to participate in the Lockbox pilot program. The City of Phoenix Lockbox Pilot Program allows firefighters to gain entry to your home in case of emergency without causing any damage to your residence. This is done by utilizing a key that you provide in a secure lockbox attached to your entryway.

The Phoenix Area Association of Realtors, in coordination with Councilwoman O'Brien, has generously provided 100 lockboxes to be installed FREE of charge for city of Phoenix residents. The available lockboxes will be distributed on a first come, first served basis to Phoenix residents with special needs, and mobility issues ONLY.

Your information and the code to the lockbox is provided only to firefighters in the event there is an emergency call to your home. You will need to provide the appropriate key or keys to put in the lockbox at the time of the delivery.



People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

State highways closing for the winter in December

The Arizona Department of Transportation is advising drivers of the following state highways that are closing for the winter:



- State Route 67 that leads to the North Rim of the Grand Canyon – Monday, Dec. 4.
- State Route 473 between State Route 260 and Hawley Lake in the White Mountains – Thursday, Dec. 7.
- State Route 261 between Eagar and Big Lake in the White Mountains – Friday, Dec. 29.
- State Route 273 between Sunrise Park and Big Lake in the White Mountains – Friday, Dec. 29.

These highways are subject to close sooner depending upon the amount of snowfall in the weather forecast. ADOT will send out notification as soon as possible in that case.

ADOT closes these state roadways annually as part of the agency's winter shutdown schedule due to the significant amounts of snowfall these parts of the state typically receive.

2024 will be a busy year for Phoenix-area freeway projects

Two Loop 101 widening projects to start; I-10, I-17 work will advance

The Arizona Department of Transportation will start as well as continue making progress on several

continue making progress on several Phoenix-area freeway construction or maintenance projects during 2024.

The new year will see the launch of two Loop 101 widening projects as well as advancements on improvement projects that are underway along Interstate 10 near the Broadway Curve and along Interstate 17 north of Phoenix.



The following are among the major freeway projects ADOT will work on in 2024:

- Loop 101 (Pima Freeway) Improvement Project between Shea Boulevard and Princess Drive/Pima Road in Scottsdale. The project is scheduled to start on Jan. 5 and include the addition of a lane in each direction within a 4.5 mile work zone. Crews also will convert the Loop 101 interchange at Frank Lloyd Wright Boulevard into a diamond configuration to improve traffic flow. The project is scheduled to be completed in approximately two years. More information: azdot.gov/Loop101PrincessToShea
- Loop 101 (Agua Fria Freeway) Improvement Project between I-17 and 75th Avenue in the northwest Valley. The two-year project is scheduled to start in fall 2024 and include the addition of a lane in each direction. Other work will include interchange and cross-street improvements at 75th Avenue. More information: azdot.gov/Loop101West75thToi17
- I-10 Broadway Curve Improvement Project between the I-17 "Split" and Loop 202 in Chandler. The largest freeway reconstruction project in ADOT's history started in fall 2021 and is slated for completion near the end of 2024. Crews will finish elevated ramps providing direct connections between I-10 and State Route 143 (Hohokam Expressway) and complete lanes carrying local traffic in areas between Baseline Road and 40th Street. The project improves travel on 11 miles of one of the Valley's busiest stretches of freeway. More information: i10broadwaycurve.com
- I-17 Improvement Project between Anthem Way and Sunset Point north of Phoenix. Work on the 23-mile project started in fall 2022. Crews are adding third lanes in each direction between Anthem Way and Black Canyon City as well as a unique 8-mile flex lanes system north of Black Canyon City. Improvements are scheduled for completion by late 2025. More information: improvingi17.com
- I-10 Gila River Bridges Project southeast of Riggs Road. The project, which will reconstruct the outdated existing I-10 bridges crossing the Gila River, is scheduled to start in spring 2024 and take approximately two years to complete.
- I-17 Resurfacing Project between Happy Valley Road and State Route 74 in north Phoenix. A project to improve pavement conditions along I-17 is scheduled to start in spring 2024 and take approximately seven months to complete.

ADOT plans and constructs new freeways, additional lanes and other improvements in the Phoenix area as part of the Regional Transportation Plan for the Maricopa County region. Many projects are funded in part by Proposition 400, a dedicated sales tax approved by Maricopa County voters in 2004.
