BADGER BOYS STATE

80TH SESSION - 2023

BBS REMEMBERS THE PAST AND LOOKS TO THE FUTURE

Fascism was on the march in Europe! The probability of another world war was facing all Americans. The "American Great Economic Depression" was hanging on into the late 1930s. The world and our nation were anxious about the future. In the midst of all of this uncertainty, Val W. Ove and the Wisconsin American Legion had a vision. Establish an annual program of citizenship to train our future leaders to embrace our constitution, rights and responsibilities. A few years before the Illinois American Legion had created the model which was adapted to Wisconsin by Ove and his leadership group of Legionnaires. The focus was to be on intense instruction in the principles of American, state, county, and local government. It was intended to be learning by doing and it worked.



In 1939, only a few weeks before the war in Europe began, Badger Boys State met for its first session at St. John's Military Academy in Delafield. Four hundred eighty-four high school juniors attended. The program continued at Delafield until 1941 when it moved to Ripon College.

World War II forced the suspension of the program in 1943, 1944, and 1945. The Boys State experience in Wisconsin continued at Ripon College until 2022 when the program moved to the campus of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire. The COVID-19 pandemic caused the cancellation of the 2020 and 2021 sessions.

The 80th session will meet at Eau Claire from June 11 to June 17. Over 800 high school boys are expected to be at the session along with about 140 volunteer staff. Young men from

across Wisconsin will hear from our Wisconsin governmental leaders and will experience for themselves what it means to be a leader. Americanism, which is the preservation of our liberties and constitutional rights, will be promoted during the week. Leaders will be developed and these young people will return to their communities prepared to build a future for themselves, and our nation.

For many years the Boys State program has honored the men and women of our country who have to a week that will last a lifetime."

For 68 years Korean War Veteran John Young has been an active member of The American Legion. In these almost 7 decades he had served Post 220 in Soldiers Grove as Sergeant of Arms, Adjutant, Membership Chairman and Post Commander. John has also served as Financial Officer for Crawford County Legion since 1981, was 1st Commander of the 3rd District Legion, and a member of the Legion Honor Group 40&8. Over the past 40 years the unit has participated in twelve Dept. of WI American Legion Color Guard Competitions and won ten consecutive years. 

The first week in May we will start the long process of Camp opening. This starts with our water crew com-



★ LEGISLATIVE CHAIR

Not all legislative activity takes place in Washington D.C. The reality is the policies set at the state and local levels have a bigger effect on each of us. On March 30 the Assembly Ways and Means Committee held a public hearing on AB-102. This bill lowers the threshold for disabled Veterans and surviving

spouses to claim this valuable tax credit from 100% to 70%. The Governor has a similar proposal in the budget submitted to the legislature. The American Legion, Disabled Veterans of America, and Veterans of Foreign Wars have been working on this policy for at least five years.

The legislative Fiscal Bureau estimates that adoption of this bill will increase state spending by \$18.5 million.

While that is a substantial sum of money, we must consider that at the household level. As we examine the current recipients, we see that they reside in all 72 counties. 67% of the recipient households have an adjusted gross income of less than \$30,000. In other words, approximately \$10,000 over the federal poverty level for a family of two. This is half the median income in Wisconsin. In 2020 the average credit was \$3,205.

The Veterans receiving this credit in general have the greatest need. They will put this money back into the local economy. It buys food, gas for the car, or maybe keeps the lights on. While \$18.5 million is a large increase in the program, it is a matter of survival for some Veterans.

You can help by telling your state legislator to support AB-102.

THERE IS MORE TO THE PACT ACT THAN MEETS THE EYE

I wrote an article about the PACT Act and how the law expands VA health care and access to other benefits. I added another

with more information on the VA health care special enrollment period that started October 1, 2022 and ends October 1, 2023. This article is reaching out to those who may be unwittingly missing their benefits (especially surviving spouses of Veterans).

With the concession of so many added areas and presumptive disability benefits for exposures to radiation, Agent Orange (AO), and other toxins, this immensely expands the pool of who qualifies to receive benefits. Knowing they qualify is another thing altogether. To

file a claim is easy for the Veteran who knows they were exposed to a toxin and has a new presumptive disability on the list. The evasive claims are harder to recognize. What about disabilities not on the list? What about those left behind, who don't get the word? What about Veterans who passed away from something that was caused by something on the list?

There are disabilities on lists that could lead to other disabilities. Example, hypertension (Newly added to the AO presumptive list) is known to cause several maladies, including strokes and aneurysms. There are more...

Here is a refresher on some of the expanded areas granted by the PACT Act. For Agent Orange exposure, added areas are any United States or Royal Thai base in Thailand from January 9, 1962,


to June 30, 1976, Laos from December 1, 1965, to September 30, 1969, Cambodia at Mimot or Krek, Kampong Cham Province from April 16, 1969, to April 30, 1969, Guam or American Samoa, or in the territorial waters thereof, from January 9, 1962, to July 31, 1980, and on Johnston Atoll or on a ship that called at Johnston Atoll from January 1, 1972, to September 30, 1977.

The PACT Act added, Afghanistan, Israel, Egypt, Turkey, Syria, and Jordan to the Persian Gulf Veteran definition, which was Iraq, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, the neutral zone between Iraq and Saudi Arabia, Bahrain, Qatar, the United Arab Emirates, Oman, the Gulf of Aden, the Gulf of Oman, the Persian Gulf, the Arabian Sea, the Red Sea, and the airspace above these locations. It also changed the requirements for qualifying Persian Gulf illness to "became manifest to any degree at any time".

For (airborne toxins) burn pits and other toxic exposure for GWOT Veterans it concedes exposure to those who served in any of these locations on or after September 11, 2001: Afghanistan, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, Uzbekistan, Yemen, The airspace above any of these locations or on or after August 2, 1990, in any of these locations: Bahrain, Iraq, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, The United Arab Emirates (UAE), The airspace above any of these locations.

The law also expanded acceptance to radiation exposure to certain Veterans who were part of the Cleanup of Enewetak Atoll from January 1, 1977, to December 31, 1980 or an on-site participation in the response efforts concerning United States Air Force B–52 bomber mishaps that caused the release of thermonuclear weapons in the vicinity of Palomares, Spain, during the period of January 17, 1966, to March 31, 1967 and in the vicinity of Thule Air Force Base, Greenland, from January 21, 1968, to September 25, 1968. The radiation disability list is extensive and basically includes all cancers.

I understand, this is a lot of technical information. Bottom line, if you or someone you know served in the military or are a surviving spouse of a Veteran, check with your local CVSO or our Service Office to see if you are missing out on benefits.



Did you know thousands of military families experience "low food security" because of the way Defense Department and Agriculture Department programs are constructed, causing service members to be ineligible for either program? Contact your legislators to correct this.

The American Legion Auxiliary supports the 2023 priorities adopted by TAL: Adequate Funding for

- U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA): programs and services.
- · Housing and Urban Development: permanent supportive housing program for homeless Veterans (HUD-VASH).
- Labor: Veterans' Employment and Training Services (VETS).
- State Veterans Homes: Veterans' long-term care facilities.

Healthcare

- · Availability: Ensure modern, geographically distributed VA facilities and care communities.
- Quality: Monitor healthcare provided by the VA.
- Treatment for Women Veterans: Ensure adequate and qualified staff and settings.
- Post-Traumatic Stress, Traumatic Brain Injury, Military Sexual Trauma: Improve Veterans' access to mental health and substance use services.

- Caregiver Support: Expand current caregiver benefits to Veterans of all eras.

- VA Benefits Claims: Eliminate the backlog in processing of claims and appeals.
- Concurrent Receipt: Eliminate deduction of disabled Veterans' disability pay from their military retirement pensions. (Concurrent Receipt is a real sticking point with career Veterans. Veterans with some degree of disability are required to use their personal retirement money to pay for their disabilities rather than receiving disability pay from the government as others do).
- Medical Record Sharing: Expedite implementation of an information system for electronic sharing of medical records between the U.S. Departments of Defense and VA.

Education and Employment

- Education Benefits: Ensure proper administration and Veterans' utilization of VA education benefits.
- · Credentialing: Incentivize states to recognize education and skills gained during military service as sufficient for state occupational credentials.
- Federal Preference: Monitor federal agency application of Veterans' preference in hiring and contracting.

Troops and Family Support

- · Defense Funding: Provide for military operations, equipment, maintenance and facilities, servicemember pay and benefits, and retiree healthcare.
 - Housing: Ensure that Basic Allowance for Housing keeps pace with housing costs.
- Transition Assistance: Ensure opportunities for servicemembers and families participating in pre-deployment, pre-separation, and transition assistance briefings and services.
- VA Benefits Claims: Eliminate the backlog in processing of claims/appeals for Veterans' benefits.
- · Medical Record Sharing: Expedite implementation of information system for electronic sharing of medical records to reach Veterans no matter where they reside.


