BADGER BOYS STATE

YEAR-AROUND SERVICE: BADGER BOYS STATE AT 80!

The 80th session of Badger Boys State occurs June 11th to 17th at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire campus. One hundred and fifty volunteers make this Americanism program of the American Legion work each year. Some of the volunteers are present on campus during the week and have assigned roles for just the session week. Behind the scenes is a group of people who work literally twelve months a year to make the program a success. Today let's meet four volunteers who contribute much to the program:



Ryan Ramsden is a Navy Veteran, a graduate of the ROTC program at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Deployed to the Mid-East he helped to dispose of explosive ordinance. A banker these days in Richmond Virginia, Ryan has 12 years on the Boys State staff. Ryan was a 2001 citizen of BBS and helps today administer both the citizen orientation program and transportation. "I keep coming back to Boys State,"



he says, "because of the opportunity to catalyze important growth in Wisconsin's youth."

Jacob Stollfus from Sun Prairie was a 2001 citizen and for 23 years has been a counselor and a staff member at BBS. Employed by a large retailer, he manages technical computer services. He does planning and administrating for

this youth program. As Assistant Director of Government Simulation and Curriculum he oversees general assembly's putting in countless hours on curriculum and schedules. Jacob's job is to make BBS deliver a quality up to date program for our 800 citizens.

Austin Evans was a citizen at Boys State in 2000 and will have

13 years in the program this June. A Corporate Attorney in San Diego, Austin is building the BBS University program which will in 2024 provide college level credit to Boys State citizens. He also works at BBS to coordinate the program parts and make it run as a unified effort." He writes, "I love getting to know our amazing citizens. I have worked with several graduates of our program as they have begun their careers as lawyers."

Chad Plenge has streamlined the registration process and implemented many programs that support the "back of the house" BBS operations. A graduate of West Point, Chad was a 2006 Boys State citizen and has 16 years on the BBS staff. Today Chad is a consultant in the Midwest but recalls helping out with Boys State administrative details on his off duty time while deployed to Afghanistan with the Army. Chad sums up what these and the other volunteers think about this American Legion program when he says, "What brings me back each year is the impact the program makes on the citizens. We may see them for a week, but the seeds we plant grow throughout their lifetime.'

These four men are typical of the quality people (150 strong) that volunteer every year in this American Legion youth program. Badger Boys State is in very good hands.

THE FUN I HAD: 18 YEARS WITH THE WISCONSIN LEGION RIDERS

My family and I moved to Wisconsin in 1993 from St. Louis. After moving, rumor had it that in order to file your State taxes as a "resident" you had to own a Harley and at least three pieces of Packers memorabilia. I considered joining the Harley family but told myself to get real, I was over 50 years old and hadn't ridden a bike in 30 years. Not too long thereafter I read about Rolling Thunder and their Memorial Day ceremonies for 500,000+ Veteran bikers for a great cause, POW/ MIAs. I REALLY wanted to be a part of this. Accordingly, I went out and bought a Harley (2003 100th anniversary, silver and black. Sweet). One of my first rides was the Milwaukee "Support the Troops" annual ride on Armed Forces Day. During the ride I noted we were being led by a significant number of bikes carrying American flags. Very cool. When we parked at our destination I went to the head of the line and walked up behind a gentleman who had a patch on the back

of his vest that said "American Legion Rider"... "Whoa, what is this? I'm a Legionnaire and I ride. What's going?" I introduced myself, was filled in on the Riders and joined on the spot. One of the best decisions I've ever made.

During the next 18 years I got to: lead my hometown parade; ride in the Veterans Day Parade with my son (a SAL member) right behind me; pace a falcon at eye level on the highway; participate in literally 100s of parades; had the honor to perform funeral escorts for Veterans, and participate in literally dozens of other fun, unique and patriotic events. But, best of all, was the lifetime friends I made with other Riders. I'm 77 and retired from the Riders now, but wouldn't have missed these days for the world. Marri asked if she needed the Heimlich Maneuver, and Judy, a retired nurse, nodded yes. Marri attempted the maneuver but did not have the strength to dislodge the food. The situation was grim, and

Judy was close to passing out.

Marri called out for help, and the only person in the room to come to her aid was Reverend Dan Seehafer. Dan immediately came to Judy's aid and again attempted the Heimlich Maneuver. After about 15 powerful thrusts, the food was dislodged.

Marri described Reverend Dan's reaction as quick and calm. Despite sore ribs for a few days, Judy fully recovered. Now, Marri is very close to Judy but affectionately calls Judy her "evil stepmother." She thanked the good Reverend for his quick actions. But in reference to her "evil stepmother" nickname - Reverend Dan didn't miss a beat when he responded, "Should I not have?" Non-articulating trailers are now included as a category of approved automobile adaptive equipment. Note - The Veterans Hospital Administration will prescribe the trailer based on the type of mobility devices required by the eligible Veteran.

Additionally, ten years after enactment of the bill, eligible persons become entitled to an additional automobile allowance if ten years have elapsed since their most recent receipt of automobile allowance and can be reused thereafter once every ten years. The law applies to both Veterans and Servicemembers. A Veteran or Service member must have one of the following disabilities to qualify for the automobile grant: • Loss, or permanent loss of use, of one or both

or both hands • Permanent vision impairment in both eyes to a certain degree • Severe burn injury that precludes effective operation of an automobile • Diagnosis of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS).

The additional use of the automobile allowance is incredible! Before the passing of this Act, the allowance was only available once during the life of the eligible person. Any subsequent vehicle purchase was entirely out of pocket. FYI — The current automobile allowance is \$24.115.12.


Note: Though having ankylosis of one or both knees or one or both hips does not qualify for the Automobile allowance, it does qualify for adaptive equipment for the automobile.

Most of the expansions to educational assistance benefits require a qualifying emergency. Some items covered are the extension of certain stipends, extension of certain education assistance bill eligibility time periods, and an effective restart of benefit eligibility in certain emergent circumstances. There are also changes affecting apprenticeship or on-job training requirements, approval of certain study-abroad programs, and Post 9/11 Educational Assistance eligibility of certain individuals who received sole survivorship discharges.

The law also makes changes to a military member's spouse residence for tax purposes, allowing them to elect between the residence of the servicemember, the residence of the spouse, or the permanent duty station of the servicemember. Another change allows portability of professional licenses of members of the uniformed services and their spouses that relocate because of military orders for military service to a location that is not in the jurisdiction of the licensing authority that issued the covered license.

I often receive inquiries from posts on ways to increase membership, specifically by attracting new members. On the Wisconsin Legion site (wilegion.org) under "Members" there is a site to click on entitled "Public Relations Kit." On the site there are an array of resources to promote your post, and you are able to edit and customize them to meet the specific needs and culture of your local post.

But don't rely only on this, instead use your imagination, creativity, and research to also assist you. Last Fall, Alma Post 224 created its own "Member Handbook" which was an impressive marketing tool. The post had held a discussion in one of its monthly meetings last year when new members came on board. New members were introduced and spoke about themselves to their fellow Veterans. But no real document was given to the new members to introduce them to the American Legion family.

Merlyn Klebig and John Hadley, members of Alma's post membership committee, decided to look into a membership handbook to be given to new members. They searched the National American Legion website for suggestions and ideas, but wanted something more. They then searched the internet and found examples of member handbooks developed from local legion posts on the East and West coasts. They presented to membership the final handbook and it was approved to go to a local printer and then to be distributed to future members. The handbook contains a welcome page from Post 224, a short history of the post, information on uniforms and governance and the officers' roles, post goals, the preamble, and a list of locally sponsored programs and fundraising events. If you want to see a copy of it, let me know.

Greetings Legionnaires,

You may recall that in my last column, I shared that Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers' 2023-25 biennial budget outlined significant investments in continuing to deliver benefits, and services, and protecting the well-being of those Veterans who need help the most.

As the Governor has declared 2023 the Year of Mental Health in Wisconsin, I was excited to see the expansion of our Veteran Outreach and Recovery Program (VORP) become a reality this Spring with an increase from 11 to 16 outreach coordinators. The expansion of this was a direct result of the recommendations provided by the Blue-Ribbon Commission on Veteran Opportunity given to the Governor's office last year. Simply put, this expansion means more access to lifesaving services for Veterans by having more dedicated, caring individuals on our team. WDVA has hired three of the five new positions, and we anticipate having all these positions filled by the end of summer.

In May, we rolled out the first in a series of Veteran Mental Health Grants. The first is for community-based nonprofit organizations that promote and engage in positive mental health through activities, programs, and services that enhance the emotional, psychological, and social happiness of Wisconsin Veterans. These grants are part of a \$4 million investment in the well-being and

health of Wisconsin Veterans and families. We hope to announce the next open period of grant applications soon, so please stay tuned to the WDVA website and our social media pages for when that is happening.

As we welcome more servicemembers transitioning from active duty to civilian life this year in Wisconsin, these Veterans need our collective community more than ever. The American Legion and its members are an important link in this transition period to help gauge their mental health needs in addition to assisting them in finding rewarding careers, homes, and a community to live in.



Anyone wanting to go on a roller coaster ride just has to try to keep up with the legislative actions of the U.S. Congress from week to week. Just when it looks like the Basic Allowances for Housing is going to pass, along comes the GOP Debt Ceiling Plan.

The 2023 Limit, Save and Grow Act to steeply cut federal domestic spending in exchange for raising the debt ceiling passed in the House on a 217-215 vote. If passed into law, there would be an over 20% reduction in federal spending for FY24 (when costs continue to climb), plus it would limit spending growth to 1% a year for a decade. This won't pass because, according to the Appropriations Committee, non-discretionary spending (SS, Medicare) and Department of Defense take up the majority of the federal budget. That leaves too few dollars for Veterans' benefits, education, border security, healthcare, policing across the country, etc.

After another ride, the Elizabeth Dole Home Care Act remains a stand-alone bill: S.141. The American Legion (TAL) urges everyone to contact their legislators in support

of this bill. This demonstrates the need for as many voices as possible to speak up advocating for Veterans, responding to Action Alerts, calling and emailing, or visiting face-to-face with legislators. Join TAL family members and friends. Sign up for Action Alerts at www. amlegionauxwi.org and Legislative Updates at www.legion.org/legislative; take an active role in support.

Summer months bring community festivals and parades. Frequently, especially in election years, candidates are out greeting people in their area. This is the perfect time to get to know your legislators and to address Veterans' issues. Take every chance you get to interact with leaders at local, state and national levels of government.

FYI: Wisconsin legislators are working to pass the UW MIA Identification and Recovery Program Funding Bill and the Disabled Veteran Surviving Spouses Property Tax Credit Bill. Both bills have the support of the Governor

June 14 is a day set aside to fly and honor the symbol of our country, the American flag. It was adopted as the symbol of our country on June 14, 1777 by the Second Continental Congress.

It is imperative that the flag be properly displayed and also be reverently disposed of after it has finished its glorious time of flying high. As many are aware, the flag should be flown during daylight hours, unless it is illuminated. All other flags should be below it on the same flag pole or on a slightly lower pole. It is the center of all flags being flown. It would be exceptional if individuals or groups held some sort of flag raising or lowering ceremony to show our loyalty to our country.

Guidelines for flying and handling the flag are found in the Federal Flag Code, Public Law 94-344, or by googling flag etiquette on the internet. In 1989 the Flag Protection Act was enacted by Congress. It provides that anyone who knowingly desecrates the flag may be fined and/or imprisoned for up to one year. However, this was challenged in 1990 that this act violated the First Amendment free speech protections. Many people dislike the use of the flag symbolisms on clothing and the like and this 1990 challenge protects that usage.

Americans should always be respectful of the flag and what it represents by standing at attention with their right hand over their hearts or saluting, if entitled to, while the flag is being raised or lowered. This practice should also be followed when the flag passes in review during a parade. All should stand and be respectful of the flag during the national anthem, also. These are signs of our many freedoms that were earned for us through the sacrifice of those who have served and are still serving.

It should be an honor to teach our children proper respect for our flag by our example. How will they learn how to handle and respect the flag if we do not lead the way? If
