OUR MISSION

Our mission is to participate in parades and other ceremonies that are in keeping with the aims and purposes of The American Legion. Promote motorcycle safety and provide a social atmosphere for American Legion members who share the same interests while promoting and supporting the programs of The American Legion.

MEMBERSHIP

To be eligible for membership riders must:

 Be a current member or eligible member of the American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, or Sons of the American Legion. Membership eligibility in the Riders (and the Legion) now includes all veterans who have honorably served at least one day of federal active duty since Dec. 7th, 1941 to the present. Spouses and daughters of eligible veterans may join the Auxiliary and sons may join the SAL.



- Be a registered owner (member or spouse) of a motorcycle of at least 500 cc
- Hold a current motorcycle endorsement (member or spouse). The motorcycle must be operational upon renewal or as determined by the Executive Board.

All new applicants should be sponsored by a fellow American Legion Rider or seek membership from the ALRA's Executive Board. Upon approval of appointment, annual dues must be paid.

Anyone meeting the above requirements that would like to share our enthusiasm and interests are more than welcome to contact us.

WHAT WE DO

We participate in parades and ceremonies throughout the state including providing a motorcycle color guard for the annual motorcycle run to the Wisconsin Veteran's Home in King, WI and their open house. Spending some time with our veteran brothers and sisters is always well worth it.

Our group conducts a "Fall Ride" to Tomahawk in support of Wisconsin's Camp American Legion. This ride raises thousands of dollars annually to provide resources for the veterans rehabilitation programs offered at Camp. We show support of our military personnel who are committed to protecting our country's freedoms. We financially support the Wisconsin Honor Flight program, allowing veterans of WWII, Korea, and Vietnam to visit their memorials in Washington, D.C.

Since its inception as a national program, the Association raised many thousands of dollars to contribute towards the American Legion Legacy Scholarship Fund endowment for the benefit of children of veterans deceased since 9/11.

We were invited by Rolling Thunder in Washington, DC to ride with over 600,000 other motorcyclists in support of an accounting for our POW/MIAs. As a special honor, a member of ALRA of WI was chosen to be one of the representatives to take part in a "Laying of the Wreath" ceremony at The Tomb Of The Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery.
