There is never enough room on a plant tag to put everything. Many names and terms are shortened. Here is a list of the basic ones.

It gets more complicated with intergenerics, the man-made genera that are the results of crosses of plants from different genus, sometime more than two genera are involved. For example, breeding Miltonia with other genus: Mtad. = Miltada = [Ada x Miltonia]

Mtadm. = Miltadium = [Ada x Miltonia x Oncidium]

Mtta. = Miltarettia = [Comparettia x Miltonia]

- Mtssa. = Miltassia = [Brassia x Miltonia]
- Mtst. = Miltistonia = [Baptistonia x Miltonia]
- Mtd. = Miltodontrum = [Miltonia x Odontoglossum x Trichocentrum]

Mnt. = Miltoncentrum x = [Miltonia x Oncidium x Trichocentrum]

Basics of Orchid Names From the American Orchid Society

Understanding orchid names enhances the pleasure of this hobby. Initially, it is easy to talk with friends using common names like moth orchids and lady's-slipper orchids. But eventually one needs to come to grips with botanical names. Though perhaps intimidating at first, mastering the simple Latin of scientific names will eliminate the twist from the tongue and enable everyone to talk about orchids with confidence.



For example:

Paphiopedilum Jim Kie 'Springwater' HCC/AOS, tells four things about this plant: •

- 1. It is a member of the genus Paphiopedilum
- 2. It is a hybrid (or grex) named Jim Kie
- 3. 'Springwater' is its clonal name

4. And it has received a Highly Commended Certificate (HCC) from the American Orchid Society for its flowers, which scored from 75 to 79 points on a 100-point scale.

Parts of a Name

To elucidate an orchid's name, pick up a catalog or plant label from one of your plants. Most likely, the name will consist of at least two words. The first word is the name of the genus (plural: genera). It is usually printed in italics because, as Latin, it is a foreign language, and begins with a capital letter (Cattleya, Epidendrum, Zygopetalum). Botanists abbreviate generic names with the first letter (such as C. for Cattleya and E. for Epidendrum), while horticulturists often use short abbreviations, such as Epi. for Epidendrum and Phal. for Phalaenopsis.

JUNE GROWING FROM DR MOTES

The early and dramatic start to the rainy season behooves us to stringently apply the basics of orchid culture and use every avenue at our disposal to dry our plants out as guickly and as thoroughly as conditions permit.

First and always most important is light. Every type of orchid is best grown in Florida in the brightest light that it will tolerate. Plants grown in bright light are harder and inherently more disease resistant. Bright light also adds heat which hastens drying. It is never too early to consider trimming trees that might be vulnerable in a storm and which are adding unwanted shade to our orchids.

Air movement is also critical to drying. Velocity of air movement increases markedly

with height. The higher off the ground that our plants are, the more quickly they dry. Now is a good time to consider whether larger plants might be better off hanging. Though growing large specimen plants is one of the great joys of S. Florida, consider reducing an abundantly large plant by taking a division or two to allow it, with less volume, to dry more quickly. Those divisions are also insurance that those favorite plants will always be with you. Added insurance lies in giving a division to a friend. Often in this uncertain world, the only plants we keep are those we give away.

At the opposite end of the spectrum, seedlings and miniature plants require extra attention to ensure they are not overshadowed by larger plants. In S. Florida, an orchid grower does well to have a cat, who should be able to move among the plants without knocking them over.

At least for the foreseeable future, most of our orchids will need no extra water beyond that which falls from the heavens. We should relish every opportunity to allow them to dry as thoroughly as possible. This is also a year in which the disease preventive spray program set forth in Florida Orchid Growing is particularly valuable.

Happily, the fierce rain has driven away both mites and thrips but alas, snails have found a wet highway which has

allowed them to travel great distances to our orchid collections. Remember, very light but fairly frequent applications of snail bait give the best control.

While presenting some hazards to our orchids, rain cools the atmosphere remarkably, making South Florida one of the coolest places in the US for much of the time in summer. Savor the coolness! As a very young, but very perceptive Bartholomew Motes noted "Rain sweet as honey".
