


Mays' Speaker: Omar Gonzales <u>Big Blooming Cattleya Orchids You Can Grow</u>

We are so happy to welcome back Omar Gonzales, who will share his extensive knowledge of growing orchids with us. A quality control chemist by trade and his interest in orchids started when he moved to Miami. He became friendly with David McLean, the late native plant horticulturist from Broward, who introduced him to orchids – vanilla, stanhopea and other species.



As Omar's interest in orchids grew, he amassed a wealth of knowledge going to shows, attending meetings and learning as much as he could from local growers. He took a trip to visit his sister in California and extended his travels to Hawaii to meet with Sheldon Takasaki from Carmela Orchids. Omar also volunteered at Bonnet House and has developed an interest in flasking. Currently, Omar is focusing on Brazilian Cattleyas and orchids of Central America. He is a valued member of the Fort Lauderdale Orchid Society and is eager to share his orchid expertise with all of us. His topic this month will be on orchid hybrids of the Cattleya Alliance.



An incredibly wet April has in effect ushered in the beginning of the rainy



season a few weeks early. This means that disease pressure may well mount more quickly than usual. We need to take advantage of the extremely low humidity that the super fronts brought in their aftermath to be sure to dry our plants out completely and thoroughly before applying additional water.

We also commence the preventive maintenance program set forth in *Florida Orchid Growing* as soon as possible.

For those whose lawn flooded, extra caution is required as several pathogens which affect orchids also affect St. Augustine grass. Most deadly and dangerous of these is Southern Blight, whose characteristic pale pustules are pictured in *Fla. Orchid Growing* and its control described.

While all orchids grown outside are vulnerable to the pathogens which blossom after heavy rain, vandas in bright airy places also have benefited from the extra rain which washed excess fertilizer salts from their roots and plumped them out. They are now primed for additional application of liquid fertilizer. Peters XCell 15-5-15 with Cal/Mg is highly recommended. High temperatures and extremely low humidity behooves us to mist our vandas in the afternoon. Usually around 4:00 PM on days when rain is not in the offing and skies are clear.

Thrips, too, are enjoying the warm dry weather which is starting the month. They are ready to attack both new root tips and emergent flower spikes which have been stimulated by the wide swings of day to night temperatures. Best practices for controlling *Thrips* are detailed in *Fla. Vanda Growing*.

As if it were needed, another reason to protect those flower spikes and buds is the upcoming Redland International Orchid Festival judging for which begins registration at noon on May 18th. Prizes are given for best in class in multiple categories in addition to Grand and Reserve Champion.

The 2023 Redland International Orchid Festival is May 19-21, 2023!

ORCHIDS AND THE SECRET SERVICE



Did you know there is a tradition of naming orchid varieties after First Ladies, which dates back to 1929 beginning with the <u>Mrs. Herbert</u> <u>Hoover orchid</u>—Chadwick & Sons Orchids has been responsible for the creation of the last five, <u>Barbara Bush</u> to <u>Melania Trump</u>.

In 2009, orchid grower and connoisseur <u>Arthur E. Chadwick</u>, owner of Chadwick & Son Orchids, arrived at the Harrison Opera House in Norfolk, Virginia. He was there to meet the then-First Lady Michelle Obama at a private reception. In his arms, he was juggling an arrangement of five gorgeous orchids with blooms in hues ranging from lavender to fuchsia.

But to Chadwick's dismay, Secret Service agents would not permit the flowers into the reception without first scanning them for explosives, and worse—no scanning equipment was available. After much negotiation, a compromise was reached. Chadwick was permitted to select two of the blooms for the formal presentation to the First Lady. Though the two blooms were comically spare in contrast with the original bouquet, Obama was delighted. "She thought it was great, she really did," says Chadwick, who also presented the First Lady with a certificate from <u>Royal Horticultural Society</u>, declaring the flower's official international registration.

The above orchid C. Michelle Obama takes a full seven years to grow from seed to a mature plant, but the flower lasts for six weeks. "The color is really spectacular—just a beautiful, glistening magenta, and the fact that the flower just lasts forever, that's unheard of for cattleyas," says Chadwick, adding that the flower is accessible as well as elegant, much like the first lady herself. "It's a compact grower, it's something that anyone could put on their windowsill."
