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#### Financial Report by Joyce Hassen

During 2011, The HISCF Historical Society held a number of community, historical education, and fundraising events. The Society is establishing itself in the community as a new and viable organization and is managing to raise the funds to support it.

We have an exceptionally hard working Board and membership. Their diligence, support, and generosity made 2011 a successful year, and 2012 is promising to be even better. We are in a good position financially for a new organization, and have set an ambitious goal of raising enough funds to purchase the Old Fire Hall and maintain our museum by March 2013, when the lease once again expires.

As of March 31, 2012 we have assets of over \$47,000 with \$26,700 specifically dedicated to the building fund.

Maintaining accurate financial records is critical to any organization, especially to the HISCF Historical Society. In January we made an investment in financial software and a cash register for the museum. The software will help with maintaining the books, creating reports and financial statements, tracking inventory, automate our banking, etc. etc. etc. Complete financial reports are presented at every Board meeting and are available to any member upon request.

The cash register is small, but will enhance the record keeping and security of cash handling at our museum. We have a number of items for sale, including new historical books of the area....so come in and make a purchase and hear that new register ring!







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#### **Pictures From The Attic**

#### The Garden

My grandparents, Bill and Minnie Harm, bought 28 acres at the back of the Tashmoo Park property in 1942. It was located at the northwest corner of Bar Harbor and M-154. Grandpa and Grandma and their daughter (my mom), Dolly, lived in the superintendent's house at the back of the park as my grandfather had held that position since 1921. In

1946, the same year my mom graduated from Algonac High, they were told they had to move off of the park property and bought the Raether house on S Channel between LaCroix and Sans Souci.

The Garden was so named because of the many fruit trees, grapevines and seasonal vegetables planted there. Grandma preserved much of the produce for the family but a lot of it was sold at a stand in front of their home on S Channel during the 1950-60s. I helped wash and sort the smaller produce into 1-quart or 1-pint wooden produce baskets and then took it out to the table near the road under the shade of the tree. There were small wooden signs for each type of

vegetable that could be hung up on a display board depending on the produce picked fresh that morning. In season, there were green beans, yellow beans, cucumbers, tomatoes, melons, green peppers, radishes, onions, potatoes and corn. For a while they had quite a trade selling strawberries.

There were several outbuildings on the property. Most were used for storage but the most interesting building was called the bunkhouse. In an earlier time it housed the crew that worked at Tashmoo Park but in my time it housed the best junk ever! The building was in two parts with a connecting door between them. There were windows along the sides but many of them were boarded up. That allowed little light to penetrate the gloom and a flashlight was a necessity if you wanted to explore the "treasures" within and avoid the spiders lurking in every corner. Along the side walls in both sections were built-in cupboards full of dishes, small teapots, paper goods like straws, cups and napkins. Park furniture was piled floor to

ceiling with a small pathway from the main door on the left side to an access door at the opposite end. There were arcade games like pinball machines and skeeball. All of them broke and in various stages of disrepair.

Inside the first section of the bunkhouse was a fortune teller arcade machine that scared both my younger brother and I when we were quite young. It contained a life-size mannequin of "Grandma". When working, she waved her hands over some cards and dispensed a "fortune"; she may have

even moved her head! She wasn't plugged in as there was no power in the building but we lived in fear that she would come alive and start moving all on her own. When we were in the building I would run past her and my younger brother would never go past her at all. If my brother was being a pest I told him "Grandma" would get him! Grandpa sold "Grandma" in the late 60s to a Detroit bar called the Dirty Helen Saloon in the Leland Hotel in downtown Detroit. Her current location is unknown.

By one of the sheds was what my mom called "the chopping block". Back in

the day my grandparents raised chickens to feed the hungry crowds at the park. She related many stories of when she was young and Grandma chopped off the chicken's head and the chickens would flap wildly around the yard. Believe me, I gave that chopping block a wide berth! I didn't want to see the blood stains I was sure were there from all those poor chickens.

A nightly ritual was to take any table scraps and put them in an old pan. Grandpa would drive us over around dusk and it was my job to put the pan with the treats under an old table next to one of the sheds and take the empty one. Grandpa said we were feeding stray cats but I wonder. Grandpa was known to shoot the raccoons as they raided the vegetables.

Some of my fondest memories are about the Garden and all its hidden treasures. I sure was a lucky kid!
