- Image Two, is our own Milky Way Galaxy



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
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Message from the President

In September 2011, I wrote the first of some sixty four- (64) Presidents Message's over the past five years. This December 2016 Message will be my last.

Details of the plan will be revealed in the next week on 'what' you can do to help achieve this 'next objective'. *The Board has already made progress with pledges and cash donations*. Bob Williams was appointed to the Board in September 2011 and has served as director and first vice president. Bob is an architect. He has served as chairman of the Clay Township Phragmities Management Advisory Board and is involved with conservation and stewardship projects. Bob and his wife Sue reside in Berkley Michigan and are the owners of the Stewart Farm Ecology Center located on Stewart Road. Bob has a much longer resume of community participation. He and Sue were named "Michiganians of the Year" in 2011. We look forward to Bob leading The Society to future goals and objectives established by the Board.

Own Our Museum Campaign



We Have an Opportunity to Own Our Museum - We Need Your Help Now.

The Harsens Island St. Clair Flats Historical Society has come a long way since its first meeting in 2009. After just two years we rented the 1938 Fire Hall and opened our history museum. In our fourth year we were able to make a down payment on a land contract to purchase the building. In that time we have received over 900 items for our collection of Island memorabilia, and visitors have enjoyed the Museum every Saturday and Sunday each summer. The Society's popular lecture series has brought many regionally recognized speakers to the island. We have conducted three Tashmoo Day events to bring to life the history of our island.

Today the status of the purchase of the building is as follows:

- 55% of the cost is already paid
- 30% is being held in our savings accounts
- 15% additional is needed to own our building

Recently the sellers offered a substantial discount to the remaining balance if we pay off the land contract in the first few months of 2016. Additionally, the sooner we pay off the balance, the less interest we will pay in the long run. The Board of Directors would like to take advantage of this opportunity to reduce the total cost and place the building completely under our control. If in the next few months we can raise the remaining \$20,000 needed to complete the purchase it will assure our financial security and sustainability going forward. The discount offered combined with the elimination of future interest makes each dollar donated at this time worth about \$1.30.

We hope to make a database of our memorabilia available at the Museum and online. A secondary benefit to paying off the building is that more volunteer time can be focused on the collection.

To help us meet our goal, please consider making a generous donation before the end of the year. If in the past you considered a donation to the building fund, purchasing a Building Brick or upgrading to a lifetime membership, this is the time. We need your help now.

The increase of diversity in the U.S.:

The U.S. has traditionally been a Protestant Christian nation. However Protestants are believed to have become a minority for the first time during 2006. 4 Meanwhile, according to the national ARIS study, about 75% of American adults currently identify themselves as Christians -- a number that is decreasing by about 0.8 percentage point per year. If this rate continues, Christianity will become a minority religion in the 2030s. Most Americans will then either have no religious affiliation or will identify themselves with a non-Christian faith.

A number of influences have been responsible for these changes. Some are:

- The major loss of membership by mainline and liberal Christian denominations in recent decades, compensated by
- a rise in attendance at conservative congregations;
- The influx of immigrants who follow non-Christian religions, like Buddhism, Hinduism, and Islam;
- The rise of Agnosticism, Atheism, Humanism, freethinking, and secularism;
- The increasing membership in new religions, like New Age, Wicca, etc.
- A return by many Native Americans to the Aboriginal faiths of their ancestors.

America is clearly becoming more religiously diverse. Canada, Europe and some other countries are following the same trend.

Reflecting this increase in religious diversity, there are now many religious celebrations widely observed during the month of December in North America. Many are related to the day when the winter solstice occurs -- between DEC-20 and 22. This date has the shortest daytime and longest nighttime of the day, in the Northern Hemisphere:

- Bodhi Day by Buddhists. This recalls the date when Buddha attained enlightenment.
- <u>Christmas</u> by <u>Christians</u>. The ancient Christians took over Saturnalia, an ancient Roman Pagan seven day festival of Saturn which started on DEC-17 and used it to commemorate the birth of Yeshua of Nazareth (Jesus Christ). <u>Internal evidence</u> in the Bible indicates that he was born in the Fall between 4 and 7 BCE.
- The **Day of the Return of the Wandering Goddess** has also been observed by followers of Kemetic Orthodoxy, the religion of ancient Egypt, since about 4500 <u>BCE</u> This celebrates the return of the Goddess Hathor to her father Ra and the healing of their relationship. It is synchronized to the Winter Solstice
- Hanukkah (a.k.a. Chanukah, Festival of Lights, & Festival of Rededication) by <u>Jews</u>. It is an eight day holiday that begins on the 25th day of Kislev which can occur in very late November or during December. Rabbi Allen Maller has donated an essay for this web site titled "Why Hanukah is for Muslim Jews."
- **Id al-Fitr** by <u>Muslims</u> for a few years before 2006. Between 2006 and 2008, it was <u>Id al-Adha</u> (a.k.a. the *Feast of Sacrifice* or *Day of Sacrifice*). During 2009 and 2010, it is **Ashura**:

For Sunni Muslims, *Ashura* is a day of fasting that was originally observed by Jews to recall when God saved the Children of Israel from the Pharoah in Egypt. Muhammad made it compulsory for Muslims as well.

For Shiite Muslims, *Ashura* recalls an event circa 680-OCT-20 <u>CE</u> in Iraq when an army of the Umayyad regime martyred a group of 70 individuals who refused to submit to the Caliph. One of the martyrs was Imam Husain, the youngest grandson of Prophet Muhammad.

- <u>Winter Solstice</u> is celebrated by some <u>Native Americans</u> and Aboriginals in the rest of the world.
- Many Atheists, at least in North America, have begun to celebrate the Winter Solstice.
- Saturnalia by Nova Romans (a.k.a. Romana). 1,2 These are <u>Neopagans</u> who worship the ancient Gods of Rome and who celebrate the ancient Roman holy days.
- Yule by Wiccans and some other Pagans

This month also includes a number of cultural celebrations. Three are:

- **Festivus**, a celebration "for the rest of us". It is as a simple, rather humorous family alternative to Christmas with a minimum of commercialization.
- **Kwanzaa** (a.k.a. Kwanzaa, Quansa) is a week-long, inter-faith celebration -- a cultural holiday celebrating African-American heritage.
- Omisoka is a very popular end-of-year celebration in Japan.
- **Shabe-Yalda**, an Iranian inter-faith celebration in honor of the sun's rebirth.
