The J.B. Ford was a steamship that saw service for over 100 years. She left active service in 1985, but continued as a cement storage and transfer vessel until 2006. The owner, LaFarge, deferred scrapping her while efforts to preserve her continued until 2014. She was sent to scrap in October 2015.

The solid brass whistle stands over 6 feet high and weighs in the neighborhood of 300 pounds!

Special thanks go out to Bobby Bryson for his considerable help in working with museum staff to bring the whistle and its special air compressor from Grand Haven. Planning for the installation of the whistle on the


