
Also, upcoming - our Anniversary event on August 28th and on September 4th we'll be represented in the Labor Day Parade – so come out and have some fun with us!

Interesting Steamboat History



For those of you who are fascinated by steamship history I highly recommend you purchase a copy of the Steamboat Bill available for sale at the Historical Museum. Here are some excerpts from this magazine which I found interesting.

Page 263

"From the earliest times, ships passed between Lake St. Clair and the St. Clair River through Anchor Bay and a North Channel skirting the mainland on the edge of marshes of a river delta we know as the St. Clair Flats. Captain Sam's *Pearl* and Captain Eber's *Ruby* made the passage each way between Detroit and Port Huron on alternate days. Now Captain Sam learned to speak Chippewa language so he could wood up his steamer for fuel at Walpole Island Indian community. The Walpole Island Indians preferred to travel the South Channel of the Flats (the international border between Canada and the United States) whose shoals hardly troubled their canoes. One day, an Indian friend piloted Captain Sam's *Pearl* through a route staked out to avoid shoals in this South Channel. *Pearl's* resulting fast time astonished Captain Eber until he learned the secret. When Captain Eber's *Ruby* tried the South Channel, however, Captain Sam's Indian friends had moved the stakes. *Ruby* got stuck in the shallows and had to be towed off. Captain Eber and his *Ruby* did not reach port unit the next day, and he was furious. (Detroit *Free Press*, July 21, 1886)."

Page 270 - 271

"After the clubs and hotels came the cottages. A subdivision for cottage sites on Harsens Island (toward the upper end of the South Channel of the Flats) was advertised in Detroit papers in April 1890. The Harsen family had settled in the Flats before 1800, but the village of Sans Souci grew up only in the nineties. Just downstream from it was built the white wooden Victorian Gothic St. Mark's Roman Catholic Church. Back downstream, clustered just below the Star Island House, had already appeared a pair of private clubs, the Rushmere and then the Mervue. About that time, the Harsen and Dickenson heirs tried to claim title to what had seemed worthless land only a dozen years before. They lost out to the State of Michigan, which became landlord to the Flats, happy to have people improve state property with cottages, hotels, and clubs. A survivor of the hotel era is the Idle Hour in Southeast Bend, once the Riverside Hotel and rebuilt after a fire in the thirties.

It is now a private club.

Getting to the Flats could be a challenge. A line of electric interurban cars ran along the North Channel on the mainland to Algonac at the turn of the century, turning north to continue to Port Huron. Until then, the steamers and other craft were the only transportation, and remained so in the Flats itself. Numerous lake vessels clogged the South Channel even when traffic moved properly. Many old lake steamers and schooners had been cut down into barges. Tugs might tow a string of schooners or barges through the river as many as half a dozen or more at one time. Ships too deeply laden might go aground and hinder traffic. In 1888 the steamer *New Orleans* disobeyed protocol and ran aground, "and for a while rooted around like a mad bull, tearing up everything within her reach. In trying to work herself off, she turned completely around twice and did considerable damage to the sides of the canal as well as throwing up banks of sand in all directions". In 1891 came the log raft. The steamer *J.H. Wade* struck one raft in 1894, scattering its logs throughout the Flats, while logs jammed and damaged wheels and engines of tugs tending the raft. At season's end in 1894, contracts were let to deepen the Ship Canal to twenty feet."

Page 278 – 279

"Like the *Kirby, Tashmoo* was a "line boat" meeting trains at her destination; the Grand Trunk at Sarnia or the Northern Navigation boats for the Lake Superior lakehead, for example. Besides broad decks for excursionists who would get off at Tashmoo Park, she needed fine appointments for her through travelers. Aft on her main deck was a dining room in mahogany with marble columns, seating 114 with a dozen more in a private dining room (all with table clothes and silverware). The main salon filled the deck above, flanked by ten parlors, each having a bay window. Two grand pianos, brocaded armchairs and late Victorian *tete-a-tetes* fitted up the main salon. The smoking room above was in chestnut stained dark green with wicker chairs and a cuspidor at each chair.




