Our special exhibit this year focuses on the history and heritage of Harsens Island. One of the fun parts of the exhibit involves the huge 56' long 'tapestry' of the Jacob Harsen Family Tree hanging from the ceiling. If you think you may be a distant relative, here's your chance to confirm it. If you locate your relatives, we hope you can give us a picture of them to place on the Tree.

We also have trees from a number of the old-line families. Cathy Yax in particular did a splendid job chasing down the Yax (Yacques) Family back to the 1700's. We're connecting pictures of the relatives to their tree location with twine on all the tree layouts. Come check it out and help us "connect the dots". Bring your old family heirloom pictures for our Heritage Wall. See page two for a message about these photos from our president, Bob Williams.

Just received a call from Lisa Miller in Lauderdale by the Sea, FL inquiring about her family summer home on the Island back in the 1920's and 1930's. Family name was Sloman, and their house was known as "Villa Eden". Using our archives of maps, we were able to confirm the location of Sloman property and incorporate photos into our archives.

Sue Wrobel's June presentation on the Walpole Island First Nations Reserve was a wonderful complement to our Heritage exhibit and provided an introduction to our July program that welcomes the French-Canadian Voyageur Re-enactors from the Saginaw Valley Historical Society to the Museum July 23-25th. Their camp at the Museum, along with their 30' canoe, will demonstrate what life was like during the late 1700's and early 1800's, when the fur trade was the dominant driver for commerce and settlement in our area. It was the fur trade that brought Jacob Harsen to the Island.

Also in July Daniel Harrison from Henry Ford Dearborn Community College will speak about his ongoing research into the location and identification of the shipwrecks around the St. Clair Flats. Titled "If These Waters Could Talk", he will present on July 14th at 3 PM at the Schoolhouse Grille. Reservations with Chuck Miller are requested. Tashmoo Timeline Project Update

The Tashmoo Timeline project, headed by Michele Komar, is an ongoing newspaper research project that encompasses the almost daily events at Tashmoo Park and other White Star Line venues, ships and people from 1896 (when the park property was purchased) to 1951 when the park was closed for good. Over 600 pages of transcriptions have been completed for the years 1896-1907. Many of the articles are only available in a poorly scanned format and every effort is being made to transcribe them into easily readable text. Right now, we have four members tirelessly tapping the keys to make this happen and we cannot thank them enough for their ongoing efforts. Below are some comments from our transcribers on their experience:

Steve Nichol – “It’s been interesting to learn more about the Flats and Russell Island history, I started going there 45 years ago and never heard how it started as a resort area.”

Diane Innis – “I can tell you that I have learned a lot of history from retyping the articles. Very interesting!”

Dianne Owen – “I have learned much about the history of the steamers and resorts of this area while typing the articles. It’s fun to imagine the way of life during the turn of the 19th to 20th centuries. Because I am a stickler about spelling, punctuation, and grammar, some of the old printing does make me a little “batty,” but, I enjoy the task and look forward to the complete publication.”

Pam Wilson – “It's been very interesting to transcribe the various newspaper articles about the steamers coming and going up and down river to take happy customers to resorts and outings at Tashmoo Park and other venues. The reporters have been very enthusiastic in reporting the happenings at the outings which were very well organized. The newspapers of that time were the only way the people could find out date, time, place, group holding an outing as well as the steamers' schedules.”

The Memoirs of Aura P. Stewart

In recent issues we printed a portion of Aura Stewart's memoirs as originally published in "*The History of St. Clair County* by A.T. Andreas & Co. 1883." Below are more of his reminiscences from the early 1800's.

"The first boat built in our county was owned and commanded by Samuel Ward, called the St. Clair, which was built in the year 1820, for lake navigation. After the Erie Canal was opened, Capt. Ward freighted his boat at Detroit for New York City, and took on board two horses to tow her through the canal. On arriving at Erie he took down his masts, stowed them snugly on deck, entered and towed safely through the canal; arrived at the Hudson he shipped the mast, bent the sails, and soon came to anchorage at the Metropolis. Procuring a full freight back, he returned, but was somewhat disappointed upon being required to pay toll. Capt. Ward not only calculated on getting through the canal free of toll but expected to receive a premium, as his was the first boat from the lakes. The St. Clair was the first boat built at Marine City, which is to-day the most extensive ship-building town in the State except Detroit.

*The first vessel built at the town of St. Clair was the Grand Turk, owned by the father of Capt. Alex St. Barnard; she was about forty tons burden, Barber, the master-builder, was a very ordinary workman, and the vessel, when completed, was a rough-looking concern, and, perhaps, "Grand Turk" was the most appropriate name for her. To look at her -- "She seemed to dare the elements to strife!" but under a press of sail, did not -- "*walk the waters like a thing of life!" However, in her day, she carried many a load of lumber and shingles to Detroit.*

The first vessel Clay produced was built by Capt. Amos Henkly and R. Newhall, about the year 1824; she was about fifty tons burden and was called the Savage, of Detroit. She was used as a trader, and ran to Mackinac and Green Bay. She was the first vessel that entered and wintered in St. Joseph River. Henkly, on his return to Detroit, represented it as a fit place to build a flourishing town, and, when the site was secured, he claimed an interest in the lands as his possessory right, he having built the first house on the premises. In 1834 he died on his boat and was buried in the sand on the Canada shore. The following winter, Mr. William Brown had the body raised and properly interred on the American side of the river. Mr. Brown had a perfect likeness of Capt. Henkly which he carefully preserved, and it is now in the possession of some of his family.

Within the past two decades, a multitude of boats and vessels have been built at Marine City, but the first vessel built on Bell River was the Pilot, and was owned by Capt. Andrew Wesbrook and Capt. A. B. Henkly. The owners disagreed about the management of the vessel, and to settle the difficulty the boat was sold to Mr. Newberry, of Detroit. A full history of the ship-building of St. Clair River, together with a sketch of the lives of the different commanders, would make a large and interesting book."
