Pastor Dan Weyand-Geise

"The sun shines bright in the old Kentucky home..." April showers have indeed brought May flowers. Along with the flowers comes a month filled with Mother's Day gatherings, graduations, May festivals, Flying Pig marathons, Hunger Walks, and the Indy 500.But the month begins with Derby Day, which happens to be a really, really big deal for lots of folks, especially those in the Commonwealth.

The Stephen Foster tune "My Old Kentucky Home" is the state song. The melody and lyrics hold a sentimental place in the hearts of millions through the generations. Foster wrote it in 1852. It has a precarious place in our American history. It was used in both the Abolitionist cause to fight for the end to slavery; and at the same time, the song was used to reinforce stereotypes of African- Americans and perpetuate the realities of slavery and white supremacy. Foster's own beliefs aren't quite clear, but it is likely that Harriet Beecher Stowe's "Uncle Tom's Cabin" had an influence on Foster. It is said that African American abolitionist Frederick Douglas said the song promotes and popularizes the cause of abolishing slavery. "It is a heart song," Douglas said. "It can make the heart sad as well as merry, and can call forth a tear as well as a smile. It awakens the sympathies for the slave in which anti-slavery principles take root and flourish."

As we head into May, it seems to me that this song captures the mood of our country these days. With political candidates who clearly divide many; a war that rages on in Ukraine; Israel's war against Hamas; even discussions on traffic control and bike lanes in College Hill, we long to find a place we can call home. We look for a place where all can be "merry, happy, and bright" as the song anticipates. We dream of a time when there will be no more tears, where the "corn top's ripe and the meadows in the bloom. "The song, like our mood today, has a melancholy and longing for something better. It is a song that evokes a vision of beauty, a place to call home. (continued on next page)

I. Call to Order -- June called the meeting to order.

II. Devotion -- Pastor Dan

Pastor Dan talked about Sunday's Sermon and reflection on Jesus in the Temple. Jesus cleared the Temple of the money changers, but would bless the Rummage Sale as it is not about the money, but the community and the fellowship which are done while there.

- III. Recording Secretary's Report (Bruce) The February report was accepted with one change in the Facility Management section. The word "cover" was changed to "include." Motion: Tom Second: Darrell Accepted: all approved
- IV. Treasurer's Report (Christy): The February reports were accepted. Pastor Dan did clarify the deposit for the Golf Outing in August, as it came from Team For The Need. Motion: Milt Second: Tom Accepted: All in favor

Christy then presented the BILLS for the month to be paid.

Motion: Ruth Second: Darrell Accepted: All in favor

- V. Financial Secretary's Report (Darrell) Darrell reported the income for the month. Motion: Milt Second: Tom Pending Question from report and the difference from Treasurer's report
- VI. Pastor's Report Pastor Dan deferred to President June Bronnert so she might share information on the topics pertaining to a Church Board retreat. The topics ranged from Board leadership, communication, mission, and energy of the church.

While the Church Board is elected leadership positions, there are established infrastructures, such as committees, to support the work of the church. It is time to revisit the established infrastructures, especially post-pandemic to continue to evolve and grow.

The church is growing and there is much positive energy.

We are here to create new energy in the church. The affects not only how the meeting goes but how we speak to each other in and out of our meeting. She also emphasized that we are not to carry all the burden of what happens in and around the church. Now, we

There was then a period of discussion about the committees and how they are both too many committees and now not enough members to deal with all the things from the past. Pastor Dan and Bruce S. then talked briefly about the way the revised Constitution and Bylaws will regroup and downsize this concern. Pastor Dan will send a copy of the updated Constitution and Bylaws within the week.

Jean K. then said she had often volunteered for some committees but was never contacted or followed up on her interest. We need to find out where our members interests are and make sure we follow up. Our structures lie in committees. Jean then shared that when she was President of C.A.I.N. she was able to help implement a program from Microsoft called SHAREPOINT. This program allowed them to put everything online and share among the committee members and officers. Members are given permission only to areas they need to have access to. Jimmy is now in contact with Microsoft to get First U.C.C. a non-profit organization's copy of the programs we will need.

We also discussed how we might promote more of our mission partners and it was suggested that like our "Stand Up" moments, we might have a "Mission Moment" stand and allow a member who volunteers to speak about the mission of our partners. Pastor Dan asked about a MARCC meeting and some did not know about it and would have attended had they know about it. We then suggested that all meeting be promoted more so that all members might be informed of it.

Pastor Dan and June then asked each of us to consider where our interests lie and this would be promoted among all members. We might even find some new interests that need to be explored. Ed was then asked if he will continue to promote the Hunger Walk.

Being a little after 8 pm we felt we were ready to adjourn
