Thomas Crapper was an English plumber. He held nine patents, three of them for toilet improvements such as the floating ballcock that regulates water filling the tank after a flush. Mr. Crapper was known for the excellent quality of his products and received several royal warrants for them. It has often been claimed in popular culture that the profane slang term for human bodily waste, "crap", originated with Thomas Crapper because of his association with lavatories. American servicemen stationed in England during World War I saw his name on cisterns and used it as Army slang, i.e., "I'm going to the crapper". (Source: Wikipedia)
