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What would Tiger Woods' handicap index be?

Technically, Tiger Woods hasn't had an official handicap since he was 20 and playing off +8.

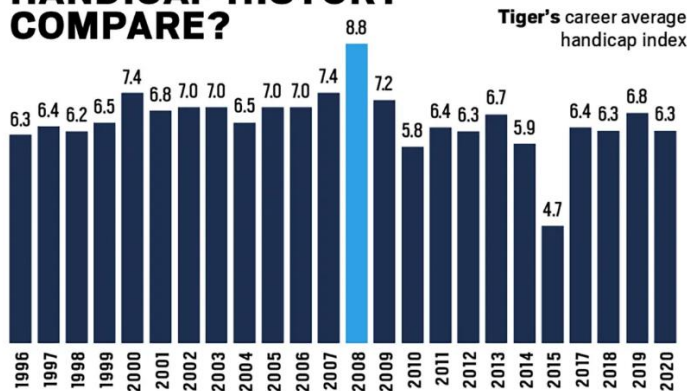
But using the 'old' USGA method where the best 10 of 20 scores count for handicapping purposes (the new World Handicap System will use the best 8 of 20), Lou Stagner, of Decade Golf, spent his lockdown calculating a differential for every round Tiger has ever played as a pro.

He then kept a running tally of what Tiger's index would have been had he submitted his scores for handicap.

That index was playing from 7200 yards on some of the most difficult courses in the USA and elsewhere around the world.

Imagine if Tiger and I competed at Redhawk Golf Course and Tiger played the Gold Tees and I played the Combo Tees. According to the USGA Handicap Rules, he would play to a +6 or +5 playing handicap and I would play to a 9. He has to give me 14 strokes. As Charlie Brown would say.... AAUGH!!! No way I am going to win!

HOW DOES YOUR HANDICAP HISTORY COMPARE?



As the table above shows, Tiger's average index, from 1996 through to the present day, is +6.7 which is lower than any other pro's average between 2016 and 2020 on the PGA Tour.

Dustin Johnson, Jordan Spieth and Brooks Koepka are tied at the top of that list with a +6.5 index, while Rory McIlroy's is +6.0.

Tiger's current index stands at +6.5, but his best season was in 2008 when he won four times in six events and his average index was +8.8. Not even winning nine PGA Tour titles, including three Majors, in 2000 could beat that!

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Rules Corner: How do you handle a ball that comes to rest on a bridge over a penalty area?

While most golfers are aware of how to proceed when a ball comes to rest in a penalty area, what do you do when you find your ball at rest on a bridge or walkway *within* a penalty area?

One thing to remember is that even though your ball may be easily playable, it's still located within the confines of the penalty area, and needs to be treated as such. So even though the bridge is generally considered an immovable obstruction, you aren't entitled to free relief.

The good news? You can play the ball as it lies, right off the bridge. Thanks to the governing bodies' [most recent changes to the Rules of Golf](#), you are also now allowed to touch or move loose impediments and touch the ground with a hand or club (such as grounding the club right behind the ball) for any reason within a penalty area. The only thing you can't do is improve conditions for your stroke.

If you aren't happy with your lie in the penalty area, you can also opt to take a one-stroke penalty and seek relief outside the penalty area. For a red-staked penalty area like the one in the video above, you have three options: stroke-and-distance relief, in which you would replay your shot from the original spot where your previous stroke was made; back-on-the-line relief, in which you note the reference point of where your ball entered the penalty area, go back on a line that extends straight back from the hole, and drop a ball within two clublengths of that spot; and lateral relief, in which you identify the spot where your ball last crossed the penalty area and drop a ball within two club lengths of that spot, no closer to the hole

If, for some reason, the penalty area isn't well defined (missing stakes, etc.) a player should use the following definition of a 'penalty area' as clarity.....

"the edge of that penalty area is defined by its natural boundaries (that is, where the ground slopes down to form the depression that can hold the water)."
